

# CAMPBELL

## OF BARCALDINE

**PATRICK CAMPBELL, 1<sup>ST</sup> OF BARCALDINE**, succeeded to his father's lands of Innergeldie and is mentioned in a letter of 29 November, 1639, as having been appointed donator to the escheat goods of his deceased brother James Campbell of Ardeonaig.<sup>1</sup> He had a Tack of the lands of Barcaldine for the duration of his life from Sir Robert Campbell of Glenorchy on 15 December, 1642,<sup>2</sup> and fought in the army of Argyll during the civil wars and was wounded at the battle of Inverlochy in 1645. He *m.* Bethia, daughter of Patrick Murray, 7<sup>th</sup> of Ochtertyre, *d.* on 25 March, 1678,<sup>3</sup> and was father of :

1. John Campbell, 2<sup>nd</sup> of Barcaldine, (*see below*).
2. Colin Campbell, 1<sup>st</sup> of Achnaba, styled as brother to Duncan and Donald Campbell, sons to Patrick Campbell of Innergeldie, when he appears as witness to a Discharge by these brothers on 7 June, 1664, and appointed Minister at Ardchattan.<sup>4</sup> He obtained the lands of Achnaba, *m.* Margaret, daughter of Sir John Campbell, 4<sup>th</sup> Baronet of Glenorchy, and *d.* on 13 March, 1726. He was father of :

2a) Patrick Campbell, 2<sup>nd</sup> of Achnaba, had a Precept of Clare Constat as heir to his father in the 8 merklands of Achnaba on 8 August, 1740, and granted a Disposition for 200 merks yearly to Beatrix Campbell, his spouse, in 1742. He was father of :

2b) John Campbell, 3<sup>rd</sup> of Achnaba, styled as eldest son to his parents in a Disposition by his father to his mother in 1742 in which he was confirmed as heir to his mother in her liferent right to half the town and lands of Achnaba. He commanded one of the Argyleshire Companies at the battle of Culloden in April of 1746 and was father of :

2c) Colin Campbell, 4<sup>th</sup> of Achnaba, succeeded his father.

- 2c) Dugald Campbell, became a Writer and had an Assignment of Heritable Bond granted by John, Earl of Breadalbane, to Patrick Campbell of Achnaba, his grandfather, on 9 July, 1766.<sup>1</sup>
- 2b) Elizabeth Campbell, *m.* on 8 June, 1773, to Angus Gregorson, son of James MacGregor *alias* Graham in Corrichen, second son of John Graham, of Corarklet, and *d.* in 1819. They had issue.
- 2a) John Campbell, alluded to in a letter by his brother Patrick Campbell, of Achnaba, dated 20 January, 1724, as being “*every day weaker.*” He had issue,
- 2b) Alexander Campbell, a natural son who had a Bond of Provision from his father for 500 merks on 1 February, 1724.<sup>2</sup>
- 2a) Donald Campbell,
- 2a) Alexander Campbell, a Physician.
3. Donald Campbell, styled as brother to John Campbell, fiar of Innergeldie, when he, with his brother Duncan Campbell, had a contract of Wadset for the lands of Achalader from this brother on 1 March, 1657. He *m.* firstly, Barbara Campbell with whom he had a wadset for the lands of Glentendill, in the Lordship of Lorn, on 28 May, 1664,<sup>3</sup> and secondly, Mary, daughter of Archibald MacCorquedale, in Corrichane, (*c/m* 7 May, 1670, with a Tocher of 1200 merks Scots<sup>4</sup>). He obtained the Wadset of the lands of Inverinan and had issue :
- 3a) Patrick Campbell, became a Writer in Edinburgh and had a Wadset of the lands of Auchinryre and Aucha from John, Lord Glenorchy, on 30 April, 1700, which he assigned to Patrick Campbell, younger of Barcaldine, on 22 July, 1707, in which he is styled as son of the deceased Donald Campbell, Wadsetter of Inverinan.<sup>5</sup> He *m.* at Edinburgh on 14 April, 1697, Bethia, daughter of William Cleghorn, Merchant in Edinburgh.
- 3a) Colin Campbell, to whom his brother Patrick Campbell, Writer in Edinburgh, was retoured heir on 7 May 1707.
4. William Campbell, studied at St. Leonard’s College, St. Andrews, and was appointed Minister at Balquhidder. He *m.* firstly, Anna, daughter of Colin Campbell of Fornoct, (she was widow of

Duncan Campbell of Edinchip, by whom she had issue<sup>1</sup>), and had issue ; and secondly, Mary, daughter of Mr. Donald Lindsay, Minister of Balquhidder, (she *d.* on 13 June 1784).

5. Duncan Campbell, styled as brother to John Campbell, fiar of Innergeldie, when he had a contract of Wadset of the lands of Achalader from this brother on 1 March, 1657. He entered into a contract of Wadset for the lands of Blarcherin with John Campbell, younger of Glenorchy, on 23 May, 1664,<sup>2</sup> and had issue.

6. Alexander Campbell, styled as son to Patrick Campbell of Innergeldie in a Discharge by his father of an annualrent of 2,500 merks in favour of Sir John Brown of Fordell dated at Crieff on 21 December, 1648,<sup>3</sup> and entered into a contract of Wadset with John Campbell, younger of Breadalbane, for the 3 merklands of Achcachyna on 1 June, 1674. He *m.* Mary Campbell and had issue :

6a) Colin Campbell, all of which sons are mentioned in the contract of Wadset for the lands of Achcachyna on 1 June, 1674.

6a) John Campbell,

6a) Duncan Campbell,

6a) Patrick Campbell,

7. Margaret Campbell, *m.* John Campbell, 3<sup>rd</sup> of Kinloch, (*c/m* in June of 1648), and had issue.

8. Jean Campbell, *m.* in around 1650 to Archibald Campbell, 6<sup>th</sup> of Lix, and had issue.

9. Margaret Campbell, *m.* Duncan Cameron, in Torramoir, (*c/m* 15 September, 1653<sup>4</sup>).

10. Giles Campbell, *m.* Colin Campbell, 3<sup>rd</sup> of Bragleen, and left issue.

11. Elizabeth Campbell, *m.* Donald MacIntyre, in Corries, and had issue.<sup>5</sup>

12. A daughter, *m.* Donald Campbell of Barrafoil.

13. A daughter, *m.* Colin Campbell, younger son of John Campbell, 2<sup>nd</sup> of Ardchattan.

**JOHN CAMPBELL, 2<sup>ND</sup> OF BARCALDINE**, had a charter from his cousin James Campbell of Fintullich for the lands of Innergeldie on 17 July, 1637, and, with his father, entered into an agreement with John Campbell of Glenorchy that they would exchange their lands of Innergeldie, Dalmarkglen, Easter Ardeonaig, and others for those of Barcaldine on 5

May, 1677.<sup>1</sup> He *m.* firstly in 1647, Margaret, daughter of James Campbell, 3<sup>rd</sup> of Clathick,<sup>2</sup> and had issue ; and secondly, Isabel, daughter of John Cameron, fiar of Lochiel, and sister to Sir Ewen Cameron, 17<sup>th</sup> of Lochiel, (*c/m* 17 November, 1657<sup>3</sup>). He was father of :

1. Alexander Campbell, 3<sup>rd</sup> of Barcaldine, (*see below*).
2. Colin Campbell, 1<sup>st</sup> of Balliveolan, a son by his father's second marriage who obtained the lands of Balliveolan by 29 September, 1703, (*see Campbell of Balliveolan*).
3. Duncan Campbell, witness to a Bond by his brother Robert Campbell, styled brother german to Colin Campbell of Belliveolan, to Mr. John Campbell, brother of the Earl of Argyll, for 500 merks, on 27 May 1700.
4. Robert Campbell, granted a discharge for 400 merks to his brother Colin Campbell of Balliveolan on 1 June, 1705, and obtained the lands of Dalmally.
5. Allan Campbell of Inverveich, granted a Bond for 500 merks to William Campbell, Minister at Balquhiddy, on 5 January, 1716, in which he is styled as brother to Colin Campbell of Balliveolan and obtained the lands of Innerverch. He *m.* Margaret, daughter of John Oig MacFarlane, in Auchtertyre, (*c/m* 25 June, 1696<sup>4</sup>), and had issue. (*see Campbell of Inverveich*).
6. Isobel Campbell, *m.* John Cameron of Kinlochleven, and had a bond for 100 merks Scots from her brother Colin Campbell of Balliveolan, on 29 September, 1703. They had issue.
7. Margaret Campbell, *m.* Alexander MacDougall, of Corriellorn.
8. Barbara Campbell, *m.* Patrick Campbell, son of Alexander Campbell of Aucharn, and had issue.
9. Catherine Campbell, *m.* Archibald Campbell, son of James Campbell of Leeks.
10. Annabella Campbell, *m.* Alexander Stewart, son of Alexander Stewart of Ballachulish, (*c/m* 20 March, 1679<sup>5</sup>).

**ALEXANDER CAMPBELL, 3<sup>RD</sup> OF BARCALDINE**, infeft in the lands of Fintullich and Innergeldie by his father John Campbell, fiar of Innergeldie, and grandfather, Patrick Campbell of Innergeldie, on 15 January, 1657, and is then styled as a son by the deceased

Margaret Campbell.<sup>1</sup> He had a Disposition for the 8 merk lands of Kingarth on 17 March, 1674, *m.* Mary, daughter of Colin Campbell, 5<sup>th</sup> of Lochnell, (*c/m* 29 April, 1676<sup>2</sup>), and *d.* in 1720. He was father of :

1. Patrick Campbell, 4<sup>th</sup> of Barcaldine, (*see below*).
2. James Campbell of Raray, had a Bond from his father for 1000 merks Scots in 1716 in which he is styled as his second son and obtained the lands of Raray. He had issue :
  - 2a} John Campbell, of whom his father wrote of on 18 October, 1737 that "*little Johni is gravely ill of the spotted fever.*"
  - 2a} Ann Campbell, *m.* John Campbell, son of Colin Campbell of Invergannan, (*c/m* 20 November 1735).
3. Alexander Campbell, had a Bond from his father for 500 merks Scots on 21 June, 1715, in which he is styled as his third son.
4. Colin Campbell, who *d.* young in 1693.
5. Colin Campbell, had a Bond from his father in 1716 in which he is styled as his fourth son. He *m.* Isobel, daughter of John Campbell, Bailie of Lochnell, (*c/m* 7 April, 1720<sup>3</sup>).
6. John Campbell of Corries, obtained these lands and had issue.
7. Isobel Campbell, *m.* Alexander Campbell of Clenamakrie, (*c/m* 23 October, 1700<sup>4</sup>).
8. Mary Campbell, *m.* Duncan Stewart of Invernahyle, (*c/m* 31 July, 1705<sup>5</sup>), and had issue.

**PATRICK CAMPBELL, 4<sup>TH</sup> OF BARCALDINE**, *b.* in 1677 and succeeded his father in the lands of Barcaldine. He *m.* firstly, Anna, daughter and heiress of James Campbell of Kilmun, (*c/m* 7 August, 1700<sup>6</sup>), by whom he had issue ; and secondly, to Lucy, daughter of Sir Ewen Cameron, 17<sup>th</sup> of Locheil, (*c/m* 2 April, 1707<sup>7</sup>). He *d.* in 1738 and was father of :

1. **JOHN CAMPBELL, 5<sup>TH</sup> OF BARCALDINE**, was a child by his father's first marriage and is styled as such in a Disposition by his father to the sons of his second marriage to Lucy Cameron in 1735.

He succeeded his father, *m.* Jean, daughter of David Campbell, 8<sup>th</sup> of Keithock, (*c/m* 5 November, 1728,<sup>1</sup>) and was compelled through mounting debts to sell the lands of Barcaldine to his half-brother Duncan Campbell. He *d.* at Crieff on 12 April, 1777,<sup>2</sup> and had issue :

1a) Alexander Campbell, attained the rank of Colonel in the 48<sup>th</sup> Regiment and was appointed Colonel-in-Charge of Fort George. He *m.* at Edinburgh on Thursday 28 July, 1765, to Helen, daughter of Sir George Sinclair of Ulbster,<sup>3</sup> (she *d.* at Edinburgh on Thursday 12 April 1787<sup>4</sup>), *d.* on 22 April 1779, and was father of :

1b) Patrick Campbell of Barcaldine, *b.* at Barcaldine on 9 May, 1766, and *dsp* at his sister Jean's house in Edinburgh on 4 December, 1825.<sup>5</sup>

1b) James Campbell,

1b) Janet Campbell, *bap.* at Ardchattan on 27 May 1767, *m.* at Edinburgh on 15 February, 1787, Æneas MacKay of Scotstoun, and *d.* on 15 October, 1787. They had issue.

1b) Matilda Campbell, *d.* unmarried.

1b) Jean Campbell, *m.* on 2 January, 1784, James Sinclair, 12<sup>th</sup> Earl of Caithness, (he *d.* on 16 July, 1823), *d.* on 2 April, 1853, and had issue.

1b) Mary Campbell, *d.* unmarried on 14 October, 1787.

1b) Isobel Campbell, *b.* in 1773.

1a) David Campbell, became a Writer to the Signet and settled in New York in 1775 where he practiced as a Notary Public. He *m.* firstly to a woman whose name is unknown and secondly in March of 1756, Jean, daughter of Archibald Campbell, and had issue :

1b) Archibald Campbell, entered the army as Ensign in the 71<sup>st</sup> Fraser Highlanders and was afterwards promoted to Captain. He served in the American War, *m.* Margaret, daughter of Robert Philip, and was *k.* at the battle of Videaur Bridge on 3 January, 1782. He had issue.

1b) Colin Campbell, *b.* at Inverary in June of 1752, became a Notary Public and settled at Shelburne in Nova Scotia. He *m.* firstly to the widow of Colonel Samuel Campbell, North Carolina, (she *d.* in 1797), and secondly at Shelburne on 15 November, 1796, Elizabeth, daughter of Richard Hardy. He had issue,

1c) John Campbell, *b.* on 16 August, 1797, and *dsp* in 1870.

- 1c) Colin Campbell, *b.* on 28 October and *bap.* at Shelburne on 30 November, 1798. He *m.* Maria, daughter of Colin John Taylor, *d.* in 1878 and had issue,
- 1d) Charles McCartney Campbell, *b.* in 1830, was appointed Registrar for Digby Co. and *d.* in 1907.
- 1d) Colin Campbell, *b.* in 1848 and *m.* on 4 December, 1874, to Christina MacDonald. He *d.* on 5 October, 1896, and had issue.
- 1d) Maria Elizabeth Campbell, *m.* in 1853 to James Leslie Jone, and had issue.
- 1b) Alexander Campbell, *b.* at Inverary in 1753 and entered the army as a cadet in the 71<sup>st</sup> Fraser Highlanders.
- 1b) Mungo Campbell, *k.* at New Orleans in the 2<sup>nd</sup> American War 1812-14.
- 1a) Patrick Campbell, who, with his brother Colin, was witness to their sister Margaret's contract of marriage with John Campbell of Danna in 1757. He attained the rank of Captain in the 88<sup>th</sup> Highlanders. He was father of,
- 1b) Mary Campbell, a natural daughter who was baptised on 2 December 1759.
- 1a) Colin Campbell, admitted an Advocate and *dsp* prior to 1770.
- 1a) Duncan Campbell, apprenticed to John Balfour, Surgeon in Edinburgh, on 2 April, 1760, and is said to have *dsp*.
- 1a) George Campbell, an Ensign in the 42<sup>nd</sup> Regiment of Foot and was *ksp* at Martinique prior to 30 September 1762.
- 1a) Margaret Campbell, *m.* John Campbell, 6<sup>th</sup> of Danna, (*c/m* 3 November 1757), and *dsp*.
- 1a) Ann Campbell, *m.* Captain Alexander Trapaud, Deputy Governor of Fort Augustus.
- 1a) Matilda Campbell, *m.* Captain Neil Campbell of Duntroon, (*c/m* at Crieff on 9 May, 1760<sup>1</sup>).
2. Colin Campbell of Glenure, had a Disposition of part of the lands of Glentindall from his father in 1735 in which he is styled as the eldest son by his second marriage and was appointed Government Factor on the forfeited Jacobite estates of Appin and Ballachulish, following the failure of the Jacobite rising of 1745/46. He *m.* at Edinburgh on 30 April, 1749, to Janet, daughter of John Hugh MacKay of Bighouse, (she *m.* secondly to Captain Charles Baillie, of Rosehaugh, and thirdly at Edinburgh on 9 November, 1760, to Archibald Hart, Merchant,) and was shot dead by an undisclosed assailant while in Appin on 14 May, 1752. He had issue,
- 2a) Louisa Campbell, *m.* on 11 June, 1768, to George MacKay, of Islandhanda, (he *d.* at Scotston on 6 September, 1798) and succeeded to her maternal grandfather's estate of Bighouse upon his death in 1770. They had issue.

- 2a) Colina Campbell, *b.* in 1752 and *m.* at Edinburgh on 26 April, 1772, to James Baillie, M.P. for Ealing Grove. She *d.* in 1831 and had issue.
- 2a) Elizabeth Campbell, *dsp* in 1762.
- 2a) Isobel Campbell, a natural daughter.
- 2a) Jean Campbell, a natural daughter who *m.* John MacIntosh, of the City Guard in Edinburgh.<sup>1</sup>

- 3a) Mary Campbell, a natural daughter. She *m.* Lieutenant Alexander Campbell, natural son of Duncan Campbell, 6<sup>th</sup> of Barcaldine.
4. Donald Campbell, had a Disposition of part of the lands of Glentindall from his father in 1735 in which he is styled as the third son by his second marriage served as a Surgeon in the Royal Navy and *d.* in the West Indies.
5. Duncan Campbell, 6<sup>th</sup> of Barcaldine, (*see below*).
6. Archibald Campbell, had a Disposition of part of the lands of Glentindall from his father in 1735 in which he is styled as the fifth son by his second marriage a Major in the 43<sup>rd</sup> Regiment and *dsp* in Galway in 1755.
7. Allan Campbell, had a Disposition of part of the lands of Glentindall from his father in 1735 in which he is styled as the sixth son by his second marriage. He served as an officer in the Hanovarian army, was taken prisoner by the Jacobites at the battle of Prestonpans in 1745 and *dsp* at London on 13 November, 1794.
8. Robert Campbell, had a Disposition of part of the lands of Glentindall from his father in 1735 in which he is styled as the seventh son by his second marriage and became a Merchant in Stirling. He *m.* at Stirling on 8 June, 1755, Catherine, daughter of Cunningham of Boglas, (she *d.* in 1814), *d.* on 30 October, 1776, and had issue,
- 8a) David Campbell, *bap.* at Stirling on 26 March, 1756, and *d.* in 1792.

- 8a) Patrick Campbell, *bap.* at Stirling on 7 April, 1757, and served in the North America Campaign. He *dsp* in India on 12 May, 1784.
9. Anna Campbell, *m.* Charles Campbell of Ardchattan, (*c/m* 3 November, 1719.<sup>1</sup> He *d.* on 8 December, 1721), and had issue.
10. Isobel Campbell, *m.* John Campbell, 6<sup>th</sup> of Achalader, (he was *bap.* at Killin on 13 March, 1715, and *d.* on 15 August, 1791), and had issue.
11. Mary Campbell, *m.* Alexander MacDougall, eldest son and heir of John MacDougall of Dunnollie, (*c/m* 15 September, 1737.<sup>2</sup> He *d.* in 1801), and had issue.
12. Annabel Campbell, *m.* Archibald Campbell, 14<sup>th</sup> of Melfort, and had issue.

**DUNCAN CAMPBELL, 6<sup>TH</sup> OF BARCALDINE**, had a Disposition of part of the lands of Glentindall from his father in 1735 in which he is styled as the fourth son by his second marriage and purchased the lands of Barcaldine from his half-brother. He *m.* Mary, daughter of Alexander MacPherson, drover in Glenfyne, (*c/m* 26 August, 1743<sup>3</sup>), *d.* on 14 November, 1784, and was father of :

1. Alexander Campbell, 7<sup>th</sup> of Barcaldine, (*see below*).
2. Patrick Campbell, attained the rank of Major in the 42<sup>nd</sup> Regiment and *m.* on 1 January, 1781, to Sarah, daughter of Thomas Pearsall, New York, (she *d.* on 17 November, 1793). He *d.* at Success, Long Island, on 1 September 1782<sup>4</sup> and was father of :

2a) Duncan Pearshall Campbell, *b.* on 25 December, 1781, *m.* at Trinity Parish Church, New York, on 12 May, 1808, to Catherine, daughter of William Bayard, New York, (she *d.* in 1813<sup>5</sup>). He *d.* in 1861 and had issue :

2b) Thomas Pearshall Campbell, *b.* on 17 December, 1820, *m.* firstly at Hudson, New Jersey, on 6 June, 1867, to Catherine, daughter of Isaac Hearsey, and secondly, at Newark, New Jersey, on 26 April, 1892, to Mary Amelia Wilde. He *d.* at Newark, New York, on Sunday 26 November, 1906,<sup>6</sup> and had issue :

- 2c) Maria Lillias Campbell, *d.* unmarried in 1911 leaving an estate estimated to be comprised of \$2,000,000 which became the subject of litigation due her step-mother and several others attempts to claim shares.<sup>1</sup>
3. James Campbell, served as a Captain in the 77<sup>th</sup> Atholl Highlanders and *d.* in 1782.<sup>2</sup>
4. Colin Campbell, *bap.* at Killin on 30 January, 1755, and attained the rank of Captain in the 42<sup>nd</sup> Regiment. He *m.* in 1789 to Elizabeth, daughter of Colonel Hungerford, *d.* at Bandon, near Cork, in November of 1809<sup>3</sup> and had issue,
- 4a) Alexander Patrick Campbell, *dsp* in 1818.
- 4a) Lucy Campbell, *m.* to her cousin Thomas Hungerford.
- 4a) Mary Campbell, *m.* to her cousin Richard Hungerford.
