

CAMPBELL

OF ARDEONAIG, INNERGELDIE & CLATHICK

JOHN CAMPBELL, was sixth son of John Campbell, 3rd of Lawers, and is styled as brother to James Campbell, 4th of Lawers, when witness to a charter by John Ross of Craigie for the lands and barony of Craigie in favour of Robert Ross, his son, on 11 July, 1597.¹ He had a charter from John Napier of Merchiston for the lands of Ardeonaig on 3 December, 1611,² had a charter for the lands of Innergeldie following upon a resignation made in his favour by John MacGregor *alias* Drummond, of Innergeldie, on 26 November, 1618,³ and obtained the lands of Clathick from John, Earl of Perth on 21 November 1628.⁴ He *m.* first, Margaret Donaldson, by whom he had issue :

1. John Campbell, *bap.* at Stirling on 18 June 1590.
2. James Campbell, 2nd of Ardeonaig and Fintullich, (*see below*).
3. Patrick Campbell, 1st of Barcaldine, succeeded to his father's lands of Innergeldie and is mentioned in a letter of 29 November, 1639, as having been appointed donator to the escheat goods of his deceased brother James Campbell of Ardeonaig.⁵ He had a Tack of the lands of Barcaldine for the duration of his life from Sir Robert Campbell of Glenorchy on 15 December, 1642,⁶ and fought in the army of Argyll during the civil wars and was wounded at the battle of Inverlochy in 1645. He had issue, (*see Campbell of Barcaldine*).

He *m.* secondly, Margaret, daughter Duncan Menzies of Comrie, to whom, as his future spouse, he granted a Charter for the half-lands of Innergeldie on 24 December, 1618, and by her he was father of :

4. Beatrix Campbell, *m.* firstly, William Napier of Wright's Houses from whom she had Sasine for these lands on 9 January, 1643, and secondly, Robert Menzies, 1st of Glassie.

JAMES CAMPBELL, 2ND OF ARDEONAIG, FINTULLICH AND CLATHICK, was a son by his father's first marriage. He *d.* prior to 18 March 1643, having *m.* firstly, to Jelian, daughter of John Kennedy of Blairquhan, (*c/m* at Comrie on 15 November, 1622¹), and, by her, he was father of :

1. Jean Campbell, *m.* Patrick Comrie, 7th of Ross, (*c/m* at Crieff on 14 November, 1646, with a Tocher of 2,500 merks.² He survived her and *m.* secondly in 1662, Anna, daughter of David Murray of Buchanty), and had issue.
2. Julian Campbell, was served heir to her father on 21 March, 1657, and is mentioned in a discharge of 14 April, 1657, in reference to outstanding debts owed by her father to John Burdon, son of the deceased Duncan Burdon in Torrichane. She *m.* by 21 March, 1657, to Patrick Campbell, 2nd of Murlaggan and Edinchip, and had issue.
3. Margaret Campbell, *m.* in 1647, John Campbell, 2nd of Barcaldine, (he *m.* secondly, Isabel, daughter of John Cameron, fiar of Locheil and had issue), and had issue.

He *m.* secondly, Elizabeth, daughter of Alexander Fleming, 3rd of Moness, (*c/m* at Dunkeld on 15 January, 1635³), and was father of :

4. James Campbell, 3rd of Ardeonaig and Clathick, (*see below*).
5. Archibald Campbell, became a Writer in Edinburgh and was admitted a Burgess of Edinburgh on 27 September, 1671. He *m.* at Edinburgh on 3 October, 1672, Agnes Jameson.
6. Mungo Campbell, 1st of Burnbank, styled as brother to James Campbell of Clathick, in a Charter of Feu granted in his favour by James Drummond, Earl of Perth, for the lands of Pittentian, on 5 November, 1672, and for which lands he granted Disposition in favour of James Drummond of Comrie on 30 September, 1674. He became an Advocate, obtained the lands of Burnbank and *m.* at Edinburgh on 19 August, 1669, Jean Schaw. He *d.* in October of 1707 and was father of,
 - 6a) James Campbell, of Burnbank, *bap.* at Edinburgh on 10 May, 1677, and was retoured heir to his father on 16 March, 1708. He *m.* Margaret, daughter of James Cathcart of Carbiston, and was father of :

6b) Jean Campbell, *bap.* 5 February, 1701.

6a) Jean Campbell, *m.* at Edinburgh on 20 April, 1692, Mr. David Ramsay of Murthly, (he survived her and *m.* secondly, on 39 June 1699, to Eupham, daughter of Michael Elphinstone of Quarrell by whom he had further issue), and was buried in the Greyfriars, Edinburgh, on 26 May 1696, having had issue.

6a) Anna Campbell, *m.* at Edinburgh on 7 April, 1700, James Ramsay, Writer in Edinburgh.

6a) Mary Campbell, *m.* at Edinburgh on 1 July, 1707, George Drummond, Lord Provost of Edinburgh, and had issue, (he *m.* secondly at Edinburgh on 2 July, 1721, Catherine, daughter of Sir Colin Campbell, 3rd of Aberuchill, and thirdly at Edinburgh on 21 January, 1739, to Hannah Parson, who was the widow of Major Livingstone. He *d.* in 1766 and had issue. (*See Drummond of Blair Drummond*).

JAMES CAMPBELL, 3RD OF ARDEONAIG AND CLATHICK, succeeded his father and served as an officer in the Perthshire Regiment during the Civil War. He *m.* Isobel, eldest daughter of Andrew Tosheoch of Monzievaired (*c/m* 15 November, 1662.¹ She *d.* in October of 1690²), *d.* in January of 1680³ and was father of :

1. John Campbell, 4th of Clathick, (*see below*).
2. Mungo Campbell, became a Writer in Edinburgh by 1703 and was a witness to a Bond by James Campbell in Dalrioch to John Comrie in Mewie on 3 January, 1711.
3. James Campbell, apprenticed to James Loch, Merchant in Edinburgh, on 16 August, 1682. He was entered a Burgess of Edinburgh on 8 January, 1696, and is then styled as a Merchant in London.

JOHN CAMPBELL, 4TH OF CLATHICK, *b.* in around 1665, succeeded his father and was appointed a Commissioner for the Peace in Perthshire under the new Government of William and Mary in 1690. He obtained the lands of Easter and Wester Lochlan from

John Murray of Strowan in 1692, *m.* Catherine, daughter of Mr. William Douglas of Barro, (*c/m* at Edinburgh on 19 June, 1693¹), and *d.* in 1695.² He was father of :

JEAN CAMPBELL, 5TH OF CLATHICK, was the only child of her father and is named in his Testament in 1695. She *m.* at Skirling on 27 November, 1718, Archibald Coates, Merchant and Provost of Glasgow, who by right of his wife, assumed the surname of Campbell and succeeded to the lands of Clathick. They had issue :

1. John Campbell, 6th of Clathick, (*see below*).
2. James Coates *or* Campbell, *bap.* at Glasgow on 16 July, 1723, and *d.* in infancy.
3. James Coates *or* Campbell, *bap.* at Glasgow on 21 February, 1725.
4. Archibald Coates *or* Campbell, *bap.* at Glasgow on 6 August, 1728.
5. Anne Coates *or* Campbell, *bap.* at Glasgow on 19 June, 1720, *m.* in 1743, John Glassford of Duddingston, and *d.* in 1751.
6. Katherine Coates *or* Campbell, *bap.* at Glasgow on 24 November, 1726.

JOHN COATES OR CAMPBELL, 6TH OF CLATHICK, *bap.* at Glasgow on 12 October, 1721, and had a Charter of Confirmation for the lands of Clathick on 12 February, 1752. He was elected Lord Provost of Glasgow, *m.* at Glasgow on 23 November, 1755, Agnes, daughter and heiress of Lawrence Colquhoun of Killermont, (she was retoured heir to her father in the lands of Killermont on 9 August, 1771), and *d.* on 23 August 1804. He was father of :

1. Archibald Campbell, 7th of Clathick, (*see below*).
2. Elizabeth Campbell, *bap.* at Glasgow on 19 May, 1758, and *m.* at Glasgow on 15 November, 1782, to John Riddell, Provost of Glasgow. They had issue.
3. Jean Campbell, *bap.* at Glasgow on 17 September, 1759, and *d.* young.
4. Agnes Campbell, *bap.* at Glasgow on 17 November, 1760, and *d.* young.
5. Ann Campbell, *bap.* at Glasgow on 19 November, 1763, and *m.* on 7 June, 1791, William Murray of Touchadam, (he was widow of Margaret, daughter of John Callander of Craigforth, by whom he had issue. He *m.* thirdly at Saint Ninians on 8 October, 1805, Grace, daughter of Alexander Speirs of Elderslie, and *d.* in 1814). They had issue.

6. Margaret Campbell, *bap.* at Glasgow on 26 June, 1765, and *m.* on 8 January, 1787, John Campbell of the Citadel.
7. Jean Campbell, *bap.* at Glasgow on 12 August, 1768, and *m.* at Killermont on 27 December 1790, to Wiliam Hoziel, younger of Newlands.¹

ARCHIBALD CAMPBELL, 7TH OF CLATHICK, *bap.* at Glasgow on 6 September, 1756, and had a Charter of Confirmation for the lands of Clathick in which he is styled as an only son dated 3 July, 1779. He had a charter of Confirmation for the lands of Cardross on 21 December, 1801, succeeded his mother in the lands of Killermont and on doing so assumed the additional surname of Colquhoun. He was later appointed to the offices of Lord Advocate of Scotland and Lord Clerk Register and *m.* at Edinburgh on 14 September, 1796, Mary Ann, daughter of William Erskine, Minister at Muthill,² (she *d.* at Rothsay on 15 May 1833³). He *d.* on 8 October, 1820, and was father of :

1. John Campbell-Colquhoun, of Killermont, (*see below*).
2. William Laurence Campbell-Colquhoun, 8th of Clathick, *b.* on 4 March, 1810, and to whom his father conveyed the lands of Clathick. He *m.* at Walcot Church, on Wednesday 5 April 1837, to Louisa, fourth daughter of Wadham Locke, of Rowdeford House, Wiltshire,⁴ (she survived him and *m.* secondly, at New Alresford, on 26 May 1864, to James Dunlop of Tolcross⁵), and *d.* at Malta on 16 January, 1861.⁶ He was father of :
 - 2a) William Campbell-Colquhoun, 9th of Clathick, *bap.* at Monzie on 25 March, 1838, and succeeded his father in the lands of Clathick. He *m.* firstly at Bamborough on 16 June, 1868, Charlotte Emily Julian, second daughter of Rev. Leonard Shafto Orde,⁷ (she *d.* at Clathick on 28 February, 1876⁸), and had issue ; and secondly at St. James's Chapel, Stonehaven, on 12 October, 1880, to Mary, third daughter of William James Lumsden of

Balmedie,¹ (she *d.* at Crieff on 26 October 1923²). He *d.* at Clathick on 11 September, 1916,³ and had issue :

2b) Lawrence Shafto Campbell-Colquhoun, *bap.* at Monzie on 22 August, 1869, and became a Minister of the Church of England. He *m.* to Emily Ruth, daughter of daughter of Rev. Henry Bloxam Purton, Rector of Kinwarton, and *dsp* in an Edinburgh nursing home on 29 April, 1933.⁴

2b) Julian Campbell-Colquhoun of Clathick *bap.* at Monzie on 31 December, 1870, and entered the army receiving a commission in the Leinster regiment. He retired from service to take up the management of the family estate but on the outbreak of WWI. he rejoined his regiment and after action in the Dardanelles, he was promoted to Major. He was wounded in October of 1916 and had succeeded his father in his estate on his death the previous month. He *d.* unmarried at Harvieston Private Hotel, Borthwick, on 4 April, 1937.⁵

2b) Charlotte Selina Campbell-Colquhoun, *bap.* at Monzie on 16 April, 1872, and *d.* at Carnoustie on 16 June following.⁶

2b) Emily Catherine Campbell-Colquhoun, *bap.* at Monzie on 1 July, 1873, and *d.* unmarried at Melville Street, Portobello, on 5 October 1944.⁷

2b) Leonora Cecilia Catherine Campbell-Colquhoun, *b.* in 1875 and *d.* at Rosefield Avenue, Portobello, on 17 October 1943.⁸

2b) Frances Eva Locke Campbell-Colquhoun, *b.* in 1876 and *d.* at Portobello in 1941.

2b) William Henry Erskine Campbell-Colquhoun, *b.* at Lansdown Crescent, Cheltenham, on 6 August, 1881, and *d.* at Moorcroft, Wyoming, USA, on 14 June 1937.⁹

2b) John Locke Campbell-Colquhoun, *b.* on 12 December, 1883, and attained the rank of 3rd Lieutenant in the Highland Light Infantry in 1902 then serving in the South African war.

- 2b) Archibald Gordon Campbell-Colquhoun, *b.* on 26 January, 1887, and resided at Little Farm, Shepperton, Middlesex.
- 2b) Ernest Forbes Campbell-Colquhoun, *b.* on 9 July, 1889, and served as Second Lieutenant in the Royal Welsh Fusiliers. He *m.* at Bulwayo, South Africa, on 30 April 1913, to Dorothy Margerye, eldest daughter of Major Harold Cartwright, Zanzibar,¹ was *k.* in action in France during WWI. on 26 September 1918.²
- 2b) Philip Hugh Lumsden Campbell-Colquhoun, *b.* on 9 September, 1892, served as a Captain in the Black Watch, and was *k.* in action in France during WWI, on 18 September 1918.³
- 2a) Louisa Selina Campbell-Colquhoun, *b.* 7th July and *bap.* at Muthill on 10 August, 1840, *m.* at Muthill on 8 May, 1861, to James Cleland Burns, Glasgow,⁴ and had issue.
3. Agnes Campbell-Colquhoun, *bap.* at New Kilpatrick on 15 December, 1798, and *dsp.*
4. Mary Ann Campbell-Colquhoun, *bap.* at New Kilpatrick on 17 December, 1800, *m.* on 3 August, 1819, Walter Long, of Rood Ashton, (he survived her and *m.* secondly, on 15 April 1857, to Mary Bickerton, eldest daughter of Admiral Sir James Hullyar, and widow of Rev. Sir Cecil Auustus Bishopp, Baronet ; and *d.* on 31 January 1867⁵), and *d.* on 15 March 1856, having had issue.
5. Elizabeth Margaret Campbell-Colquhoun, *bap.* at New Kilpatrick on 27 December, 1801, *m.* at Steeple Ashton Church on 27 January, 1837, to Rev. Edward Fitzmaurice Boyle⁶ and *d.* at Wimbledon on 21 May 1870,⁷ having had issue.
6. Cornelia Jane Campbell-Colquhoun, *bap.* at New Kilpatrick on 4 January, 1804, and *dsp.*
7. Helen Christie Campbell-Colquhoun, *bap.* at New Kilpatrick on 2 February, 1805, and *dsp.*
8. Laura Campbell-Colquhoun, *d.* at Killermont on 16 November, 1824.

JOHN CAMPBELL-COLQUHOUN OF KILLERMONT AND GARSCADDEN, *b.* and *bap.* at New Kilpatrick on 23 January, 1803, and was retoured heir to his father, his cousins William Dalzell Colquhoun of Garscadden, and Jean Colquhoun of Garscadden on 24 October 1821. He was elected Member of Parliament for Newcastle Under Lyne in 1842,

and *m.* at Warrington on 10 September, 1827, Henrietta Marie, daughter of Thomas Powys, 2nd Lord Lilford,¹ (she *d.* on 21 January, 1870²). He *d.* at his residence in Chesham Street, London, on Sunday 17 April, 1870,³ and was father of :

1. **ARCHIBALD CAMPBELL COLQUHOUN OF KILLERMONT**, *b.* at the Cedars, East Sheen, Surrey, on 25 July 1828,⁴ succeeded his father and *dsp* at Nice on 20 March 1872.⁵
2. John Erskine Campbell Colquhoun, of Killermont and Garscadden, (*see below*).

JOHN ERSKINE CAMPBELL COLQUHOUN OF KILLERMONT AND GARSADDEN, *bap.* at Straughton on 17 June, 1831, and succeeded on the death of his brother. He *m.* at the parish Church of Great Amwell on 9 February, 1864, to Emily Agnes, daughter of Rev. David Barclay Bevan, of Amwellbury, Herts,⁶ *d.* at Eastbourne in January of 1917, and was father of :

1. William Erskine Campbell-Colquhoun, *b.* on 2 June, 1866, and *dsp.*
2. Laurence Archibald Campbell-Colquhoun, *b.* on 18 March, 1869, and *d.* on 6 January, 1870.
3. Archibald John Campbell-Colquhoun of Killermont and Garscadden, (*see below*).
4. Agnes Henrietta Campbell-Colquhoun, *b.* in 1865 and *m.* at Holy Trinity Church, Crockham Hill, on 24 June 1890, to Rev. Stanley Augustus Pelley, Vicar of Swanwick, Derbyshire.⁷ She *d.* at Tighnagreine, Comrie, on 26 March 1945.⁸
5. Alice Emily Campbell-Colquhoun, *b.* on 8 September, 1867, and *m.* in September of 1892, Lionel Arthur Bosanquet of Cleddon Hall. They had issue.
6. Rose Eleanor Campbell-Colquhoun, *bap.* on 18 March, 1871, and *m.* at Crockham Hill, Kent, on 22 November, 1915, Frederick St. Clair Farran, (he *d.* on 3 January, 1934). She *d.* at Finchampstead on 27 August 1937.⁹
