

# CAMPBELL

## OF DUNEAVES

**JOHN CAMPBELL, 1<sup>ST</sup> OF DUNEAVES**, was second son of Duncan Campbell, 4<sup>th</sup> of Glenlyon, and served as Tutor to his nephew Robert Campbell of Glenlyon during his minority. He *m.* at Kenmore on 30 September, 1647, Margaret, daughter of John Menzies, in Tullochcoul,<sup>1</sup> with whom and with their children, he was infeft in the lands of Kenknock on 18 August, 1658.<sup>2</sup> He *d.* by 29 May, 1681, and was father of :

1. Duncan Campbell, 2<sup>nd</sup> of Duneaves, (*see below*).
2. Archibald Campbell, 1<sup>st</sup> of Roro, referred to as “the old fox.” He had the command of the “Watch” on the Breadalbane estates both in Perthshire and Argyleshire and received a payment for such from the Earl of Breadalbane on 29 March, 1681, in which he is styled as son to the deceased John Campbell, Tutor of Glenlyon.<sup>3</sup> He is styled as second son to the deceased John Campbell, Tutor of Glenlyon, when he had a wadset of the lands of Roro from John Campbell of Breadalbane on 29 May, 1693, and *m.* firstly, Janet Cameron. He *m.* secondly, Christian Campbell, and *d.* prior to 1 November 1721. He was father of :

2a) John Campbell, 2<sup>nd</sup> of Roro, styled as eldest son of his father in a Bond by himself to Duncan Stewart, son of the deceased William Stewart of Drumcharry, on 29 November, 1706, and *m.* Agnes, daughter of Duncan Campbell, 2<sup>nd</sup> of Duneaves, (*c/m* in March of 1707<sup>4</sup>). He *d.* in 1730 and was father of :

2b) Archibald Campbell, 3<sup>rd</sup> of Roro, was served heir to his father on 24 February, 1733, and *m.* Christine Campbell. He *d.* in 1739 after “being cast away at sea”<sup>5</sup> and was father of :

2c) John Campbell, 4<sup>th</sup> of Roro, succeeded his father and is styled as heir to his father Archibald Campbell of Roro, his grandfather John Campbell of Roro,

and his great grandfather Archibald Campbell of Roro, in the sum 10,500 on 30 September, 1740. He *m.* Ann Campbell and was father of :

2d) Archibald Campbell, 5<sup>th</sup> of Roro, was served heir to his father on 13 February, 1747, and *dsp.*

2d) Robert Campbell, 6<sup>th</sup> of Roro, is styled as only child in life to his father and heir to his deceased brother Archibald Campbell of Roro in a Renunciation of the lands of Mains of Roro in his favour by Duncan Campbell MacGregor, residenter in Perth, on 1 April, 1760.

2b) Mungo Campbell, resided at Milton of Roro and was cautioner to his sister Christian in her contract of marriage with Robert MacGregor alias Campbell of Glencarnock, in 1730.

2b) Christian Campbell, *m.* Robert MacGregor, *alias* Campbell, younger of Glencarnock, (*c/m* 2 April, 1730<sup>1</sup>).

3. James Campbell, named with his father and siblings in the contract for the lands of Kenknock in 1658, and was educated at St. Andrews University from where he graduated MA on 24 July 1675. He was admitted Minister at Dunoon in 1686, and was removed in 1690 for not adhering to revolution settlement and praying for William and Mary. He *d.* prior to December of 1697 and was father of :

3a) Robert Campbell, served heir to his father on 21 December 1697.<sup>2</sup>

3a) Anna Campbell,

4. Margaret Campbell, named in the contract for the lands of Kenknock in 1658 and *m.* her cousin Colin Campbell, brother to Robert Campbell, 5<sup>th</sup> of Glenlyon.

5. Susanna Campbell, named in the contract for the lands of Kenknock in 1658 and *m.* James MacPherson of Strathmashie.

6. Christian Campbell, *m.* firstly, Patrick Campbell, 1<sup>st</sup> of Corriecharmick, and had issue ; and secondly in 1687, John MacGregor, 6<sup>th</sup> of Glengyle, (he was widow of Margaret, daughter of James Drummond, 2<sup>nd</sup> of Comrie, whom he had *m.* in 1684, and by whom he had no apparent issue. He *d.* in 1700), and had issue.

7. Agnes Campbell, named in the contract for the lands of Kenknock in 1658.

**DUNCAN CAMPBELL, 2<sup>ND</sup> OF DUNEAVES**, succeeded his father and was one of the Tutors of James Menzies of Culdares. He *m.* firstly in 1680, Grissel, daughter of William Ramsay of Lethendy, by whom he was father of :

1. John Campbell, 3<sup>rd</sup> of Duneaves, (*see below*).
2. Neil Campbell, styled as second son when witness to a Bond by his father to John MacDiarmid in Craig and Christian MacKerracher, his spouse, dated 17 May 1700.<sup>1</sup>
3. David Campbell, *m.* at Dull on 24 October, 1714, Margaret, daughter of Alexander Stewart, 2<sup>nd</sup> of Wester Cluny, and was father of :
  - 3a) Robert Campbell, *bap.* at Dull on 18 August, 1721, and *d.* young.
  - 3a) Alexander Campbell, *bap.* at Dull on 25 March, 1723.
  - 3a) Duncan Campbell, *bap.* at Dull on 14 July, 1725.
  - 3a) Archibald Campbell, *bap.* at Dull on 28 December, 1726.
  - 3a) Robert Campbell, *bap.* at Dull on 7 October, 1729.
  - 3a) John Campbell, *bap.* at Dull on 25 January, 1731.
  - 3a) Jean Campbell, *bap.* at Dull on 25 January, 1728.
  - 3a) Mary Campbell, *bap.* at Dull on 16 November, 1732.
4. Duncan Campbell, served as an officer in the Atholl Brigade of the Jacobite army during the uprising of 1745/46<sup>2</sup> and *m.* Janet, daughter of Alexander Robertson, Minister of Fortingall, (*c/m* 12 August, 1715). He was father of :
  - 4a) Archibald Campbell, attained the rank of Lieutenant in Lord George Murray's Regiment and *m.* at Edinburgh on 5 February, 1764, Margaret, daughter of Captain James Small, factor on the forfeited estate of Struan. He was father of :
    - 4b) Duncan Campbell, *bap.* at Fortingall on 13 November, 1764.
    - 4b) James Campbell, *bap.* at Fortingall on 10 June, 1766.
    - 4b) Sir Archibald Campbell, 1<sup>st</sup> Baronet, of Garth, *b.* on 12<sup>th</sup> March and *bap.* at Logierait on 10 April, 1770. He was raised to Lieutenant-General in the army and took part in the Peninsula War and for his good services was created a Baronet 30 September 1831. He *m.* on 6 July, 1801, Helen, daughter of John MacDonald of Garth, (she *d.* on 12 October, 1848), *d.* at Edinburgh on Friday 6 October, 1843,<sup>3</sup> and had issue :
      - 4c) Archibald Campbell, *d.* unmarried in 1831.

4c) Sir John Campbell, 2<sup>nd</sup> Baronet, *b.* on 14 April 1807, and attained the rank of Major-General in the army. He *m.* at Blackness House on 21 July 1841, to Helen Margaret, only child of Colonel John Crow, H.E.I.C.S.,<sup>1</sup> (she *d.* on 6 May, 1883), and was *k.* at the Redan, Sebastopol, 18 June, 1855. He was father of :

4d) Sir Archibald Campbell, 3<sup>rd</sup> Baronet, of Gibleston, *b.* on 27 January, 1844, and *m.* at the parish church, Buckingham, on 6 January, 1876, Henrietta Ellen Hutton Dawson, eldest daughter of Rev. Eusebius Andrews Uthwatt, Rector of Foxcott,<sup>2</sup> (she *d.* on 15 August 1911<sup>3</sup>). He *d.* on 30 March, 1913,<sup>4</sup> and was father of :

4e) John Archibald Andrews Campbell, *b.* on 11<sup>th</sup> June and *d.* on 6 September, 1877.

4e) Sir Archibald Augustus Ava Campbell, 4<sup>th</sup> Baronet, *b.* 5 December 1879, and succeeded his father on his death in 1913. At the outbreak of WWI, he and his brother William were farming in South Africa but both returned home to enlist. He served as Lieutenant in the Cmaeron Highlanders and and was *ksp* in action on 10 May 1916.<sup>5</sup>

4e) Sir William Andrews Ava Campbell, 5<sup>th</sup> Baronet, *b.* on 11 December, 1880, and succeeded his brother on his death in 1916. He served in WWI. being wounded in action on 6 November 1917, and afterwards returned to South Africa where he *dsp* at Bloemfontein on 5 October 1949.<sup>6</sup>

4e) Henrietta Helen Ava Campbell, *d.* unmarried on 26 October 1906, when at the Fife Ball. It was reported that she was of a general weak constitution but felt well enough to attend the ball, only to collapse and die of heart failure.<sup>7</sup>

- 4e) Mary Maragret Ava Campbell, *m.* at Cape Town in November 1916, to Gurth Edelsten of Vaalkral.<sup>1</sup>
- 4d) John James Ava Campbell, *b.* on 21 April, 1845, and served as a Lieutenant in the Royal Navy. He *d.* on 23 March, 1885.
- 4d) Augustus Almeric Ava Campbell, *b.* on 19 June, 1846, and *d.* unmarried at Westfield, near Cupar, in September of 1918.<sup>2</sup>
- 4d) Blenheim Ava Campbell, *b.* on 30 March, 1848, and resided at Westfield, Cupar. He *d.* unmarried in a nursing home in Edinburgh on 7 April, 1925, while recovering from an operation for an infection in his throat.<sup>3</sup>
- 4d) Angus William Ava Campbell, *b.* in 1853 and went to America in 1878. He *dsp* at New York on 17 May 1890,<sup>4</sup> although it was generally believed that he had married there and left children who were called in the process of the winding up of the estate of James Kirkcaldy of Balgillo House, to whom, via his mother, he was one of the beneficiaries. Notices requesting his heirs to come forward were widely published and circulated however with no responses forthcoming, on 2 June 1903, Lord Low decided the case with the proviso "for aught yet seen."

- 4b) Elizabeth Campbell, *b.* in Canada in 1850.
- 4d) Maria Campbell, *b.* in Canada in 1852.

5. Catherine Campbell, *m.* Colin Campbell, 2<sup>nd</sup> of Ardeonaig, (*c/m* 21-28 December 1710.<sup>1</sup> He *d.* on 4 February, 1745), and had issue.
6. Helen Campbell, *m.* Alexander Campbell, 2<sup>nd</sup> of Corriecharmick, (*c/m* 19 October, 1710).
7. Agnes Campbell, *m.* John Campbell, eldest son and heir of Archibald Campbell, 1<sup>st</sup> of Roro, (*c/m* in March of 1707<sup>2</sup>), and had issue.

He *m.* secondly, Beatrix, daughter of Mr. Alexander Robertson, Minister of Kenmore, (*c/m* 28 July, 1710<sup>3</sup>), and, by her he was father of :

8. Susanna Campbell, *m.* on 24 March, 1737, Mr. John MacVean, Minister of Glenorchy, (he *d.* on 17 May, 1764), and *d.* on 12 February, 1775, having had issue.

**JOHN CAMPBELL, 3<sup>RD</sup> OF DUNEAVES**, styled as eldest son of the deceased Duncan Campbell of Duneaves in a Discharge by Robert Campbell of Fonab dated 2 July 1736.<sup>4</sup> He attained the rank of Captain in the 42<sup>nd</sup> Regiment. He was renowned as one of the best swordsmen of his day and with a fellow officer, Gregor MacGregor of Inverardran, he was chosen to display the Highland technique of the use of a highland targe and broadsword to King George II. He later served in the American Wars and was *k.* at Ticonderoga on 8 July, 1758.<sup>5</sup> He was father of :

**ARCHIBALD CAMPBELL, 4<sup>TH</sup> OF DUNEAVES**, succeeded his father in the lands of Duneaves and *m.* Margaret Rigg, (she *d.* on 17 May 1777). He *d.* at Duneaves on 2 June 1777,<sup>6</sup> and was father of :

**WILLIAM CAMPBELL, 5<sup>TH</sup> OF DUNEAVES**, was infeft as heir to his father in the lands of Culdares on 13 September, 1785, and was appointed one the Trustees on the Glenlyon

estate for Dr. David Campbell. He sold the lands of Duneaves to Menzies of Bolfracks in 1792, *m.* Jean Reid and *d.* on 16 June 1798.<sup>1</sup> He was father of :

1. Archibald Campbell, *b.* at Edinburgh on 20 June 1779, and was apprenticed to John Campbell, Writer in Edinburgh, on 19 June, 1812. He *dsp* at his house in Dundas Street, Edinburgh, on 28 January 1823.<sup>2</sup>
2. John Campbell, *bap.* at Edinburgh on 30 April 1782.
3. Mally Campbell, *bap.* at Fortingall on 10 October 1780.
4. Ann Garden Campbell, *bap.* at Fortingall on 10 January 1782, and *m.* firstly at Edinburgh on 22 December 1806, Duncan MacIntyre, eldest son and heir of James MacIntyre, representer of Glennoe, and had issue ; and secondly at Edinburgh on 24 February 1818, Captain Hugh Stevenson.
