

CAMPBELL

OF EDINAMPLE

PATRICK CAMPBELL, 1ST OF EDINAMPLE, was the eldest son of Sir Duncan Campbell, 7th of Glenorchy, by his second wife Elizabeth, daughter of Henry, Lord Sinclair, and is styled as son of Sir Duncan Campbell in Letters of Remission under the Great Seal dated 12 May, 1627, to Sir Duncan Campbell, Colin Campbell, fiar of Glenorchy, Robert Campbell of Glenfalloch, Patrick Campbell, of Culdares, his lawful sons and Patrick Campbell his natural son for attacks on members of the Clan Gregor and the burning of the lands of Dewletter and the castle of Glenstrae in May of 1611.¹ He obtained firstly the lands of Culdares then those of Edinample and *m.* Margaret, daughter of Colin Campbell, 1st of Aberuchill, (*c/m* 19 November 1625²). He is stated to have been a Covenanter and to have been *k.* at the battle of Kilsyth in 1645 although there is no evidence for this. He was father of :

1. Colin Campbell, styled as eldest son and heir of his father when he had a charter for the lands of Glentarken, Fordew and Balmuik, on 11 July, 1642.³ He *dsp* soon after.
2. John Campbell, 2nd of Edinample, (*see below*).
3. Patrick Campbell, apprenticed to James Campbell, Merchant in Edinburgh, on 3 September, 1662, and acted as executor to his brother John Campbell of Edinample following his death in 1668. He was served as heir provisional in the lands of Edinample by his nephew John Campbell of Edinample, on 29 August, 1677.
4. James Campbell, apprenticed to Patrick Vauss, Merchant in Edinburgh, on 5 May 1652, and *dsp* by 20 June 1673, when his nephew John Campbell of Edinample was styled as his heir in a horning raised against him by Sir Henry Stewart of Grantully for payment of a Bond of 2200 merks granted by James on 13 June 1662.⁴

5. Jane Campbell, *m.* firstly, Archibald Campbell, fiar of Ardochattan, (*c/m* 23 April, 1654) and had issue ; and was abducted and forced to marry John Campbell, 2nd of Lerags, in 1665.

JOHN CAMPBELL, 2ND OF EDINAMPLE, succeeded his father and granted a Discharge for various documents and valuables previously in the possession of the deceased Patrick Campbell, of Edinample, his father, and the deceased Colin Campbell, eldest son and heir of the said deceased Patrick Campbell, and brother to the said John Campbell, now of Edinample, which had been given for safe keeping to Colin Campbell, of Mochaster, on 6 August, 1656. He *m.* Marjory, daughter of Sir Mungo Campbell, 5th of Lawers, (she *m.* secondly, by 30 March, 1687, Nicol Bontein of Ardoch, when she had a charter under the Great Seal for the lands Craigends), *d.* in December of 1668¹ and was father of :

1. John Campbell, 3rd of Edinample, (*see below*).
2. James Campbell of Kernoch, styled as second brother to John Campbell of Edinample when served a provisional heir to the lands of Edinample on 29 August 1677, and obtained the lands of Kernoch by 6 May, 1696, when he received an Inventory of Writs for Innergeldie and Kingarth from John Campbell of Barcaldine.² He was father of :
 - 2a) James Campbell of Kernoch & Glenample, succeeded his father in these lands and *m.* at Edinburgh on 18 November, 1705, Mary, daughter of Hugh Cunningham, Writer to the Signet. He had issue :
 - 2b) James Campbell, became a Merchant in Irvine and was retoured heir to his mother on 26 August 1740. He *m.* at Kilwinning on 29 April 1740, to Agnes, brother of James Parks of Dubbs, (she was retoured heir to her brother in the lands of Dubbs, in Ayrshire, on 26 March 1771), and was father of :
 - 2c) James Campbell, *b.* on 10 September 1741.
 - 2c) John Campbell, *b.* on 14 April 1745.
 - 2c) Mary Campbell, *b.* on 10 September 1741.
 - 2c) Jean Campbell, *b.* on 1 June 1743.
 - 2c) Margaret Campbell, *bap.* at Irvine on 15 February 1747.
 - 2b) Hugh Campbell, *bap.* at Edinburgh on 4 January, 1707.
 - 2b) John Campbell, *bap.* at Edinburgh on 13 January, 1715.
 - 2b) Marjory Campbell, *bap.* at Edinburgh on 26 November, 1707.

2b) Anne Campbell, *bap.* at Edinburgh on 21 March, 1709.

3. Duncan Campbell, was styled as third brother to John Campbell of Edinample when named as one of the provisional heirs to the lands of Edinample on 29 August 1677, and was father of,

3a) James Campbell of Stronslanny, obtained the 1/8 part of the lands of Gartnaferan called Stronslanny from Alexander Stewart of Gartnaferan on 13 December, 1729, in which he was infeft on 22 January 1734.¹ He served as a Captain in the army and was court-martialed and dismissed in 1748 for having proposed to duel with Lieutenant MacLean.² He *m.* by 3 November 1731, Mary, daughter of Alexander Campbell of Blaircherin, (she was widow of John Campbell, in Auchinshcallan, by whom she had issue, and was served heir to her brother Ronald, son of Alexander Campbell of Blaircherin, on 25 July, 1770, when she is styled as wife of Captain James Campbell of Stronslanny), when she granted a discharge to the tutors of her son Alexander Campbell, by her first marriage to John Campbell in Auchinshcallan.³ He *d.* between 25 July 1770 and June of 1775 and was father of :

3b) James Campbell of Stronslanny, was served heir to his father on 30 June 1775, became Tacksman of the lands of Letter of Auchraig and was infeft as heir to his father in the lands of Lanrick on 4 May, 1785. He was father of :

3c) Donald Campbell, a natural child by Ann MacKindly. He was *b.* on 12th and *bap.* at Callander on 18 August, 1767.

3b) Duncan Campbell, *bap.* at Balquhiddel on 12 December 1755.

3b) Arrabella Campbell, *bap.* at Balquhiddel on 21 December 1749, and *dsp* at Stronchriggeran in 1809.

3b) Anna Campbell, *bap.* at Balquhiddel on 8 March, 1751, and *m.* Duncan Campbell of Inverveich. She *d.* in 1821 and had issue.

4. Patrick Campbell, who, with his brothers James, Duncan and Mungo, had a Bond for 10,000 merks from John, Earl of Caithness, in which they are styled as sons of the late John Campbell of Edinample on 1 April 1681.⁴

5. Mungo Campbell, styled as fourth brother to John Campbell of Edinample when named as one of the provisional heirs to the lands of Edinample on 29 August 1677, and was apprenticed to William Cleland, Merchant in Edinburgh, on 20 February 1678.

6. Elizabeth Campbell, *m.* Duncan Campbell, 1st of Crumnachie, (he *d.* in November of 1699).

JOHN CAMPBELL, 3RD OF EDINAMPLE, succeeded his father and is styled as eldest son and heir to the deceased John Campbell of Edinample in an Inhibition by John Buchannan, Surgeon in Stirling, on 5 April, 1678. He was retoured heir to his father in the lands of Ardbechlorn and Glentarken on 15 August, 1683, *m.* by 29 August, 1677, Margaret, daughter of John Sempill of Fullwood, when he executed a procuratory for joint-infetment in favour of himself and Margaret Sempill, his spouse, in the lands of Edinample in which he entailed his lands upon his brothers.¹ By 1710 his estate was so heavily burdened with debt that he was imprisoned in the Tolbooth of Crieff and afterwards sold his lands to John, Earl of Breadalbane.² He was father of :

1. **JOHN CAMPBELL, YOUNGER OF EDINAMPLE**, (*see below*).
2. James Campbell, *bap.* at Kilmadock on 4 January, 1678.
3. Colin Campbell, styled as son to John Campbell of Edinample when witness to a bond by his uncle Duncan Campbell to Henry Brown in Dalginross on 14 January 1701.
4. Marjory Campbell, *bap.* at Kilmadock on 7 April, 1680.
5. Jean Campbell, *bap.* at Kilmadock on 29 June, 1683.

JOHN CAMPBELL, YOUNGER OF EDINAMPLE, *m.* by 1 May, 1700, Mary, only child and heiress of Duncan MacCorquodale of Phantilands, when she granted a Disposition that on the death of her father she would have herself served his heir in the lands of Phantilands and thereafter grant them to John, Earl of Breadalbane.³ He was charged with riot for having assembled an armed band of men and freed his father from Crieff Tolbooth on Monday 28 August, 1710, and stated in 1711 that he was "*going to carry a muskit in Flanders.*"⁴ He was father of :

PATRICK CAMPBELL, concerning whom his maternal grandfather, Duncan MacCorquodale, wrote to Campbell of Glenorchy on 3 December 1710, expressing

concerning over how the “child was to be nursed.” He was appointed Surveyor of Customs at Fort William on 11 March 1715, and *d.* on 15 January 1729, aged 30 years, being buried in The Craigs, Fort William.

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
