

CAMPBELL

OF LAWERS

JOHN CAMPBELL, OF AUCHREOCH, the founder of the House of Lawers, was fourth son of Sir Colin Campbell, 1st of Glenorchy, by his marriage to Margaret, daughter of Luke Stirling of Ratherns and Keir, and to whom his father conveyed the lands of Auchreoch on Lochtayside. He had a charter for the lands of Schian, in Glenquoich, from his brother Sir Duncan Campbell of Glenorchy on 16 April, 1513,¹ *m.* firstly, Agnes, daughter of Sir John Moncrieff of that Ilk, and had issue ; and secondly, Christian Ogilvy, (she *m.* secondly, Sir Patrick Hepburn, 1st of Beinstoun, and had issue). He was *k.* at the battle of Flodden 9 September, 1513,² and was father of :

1. James Campbell, 2nd of Lawers, (*see below*).
2. John Campbell, 2nd of Murthly, (*see Campbell of Murthly*).
3. Archibald Campbell, 1st of Murthly, obtained the lands of Murthly and was served heir provisional to his brother James Campbell in the lands of Lawers on 16 June, 1525. He *m.* Elizabeth, daughter of Robert Wedderburn, Bailie of Dundee, (she was widow of Alexander Lovell and Alexander Ogilvy, Provost of Dundee, and *m.* fourthly following the death of Archibald to Patrick Lyon, Merchant in Dundee,) and *dsp* before 10 April, 1545, when his brother John Campbell succeeded to his property and requested his widow to deliver all documents pertaining to the lands of Murthly.

JAMES CAMPBELL, 2ND OF LAWERS, had Sasine for the lands of Lawer Mor, Lawer Meannoicht and Auchreoch as heir to his deceased father on 3 November, 1513,³ and had a Charter under the Great Seal erecting the lands of Lawers into a free barony on 16 June, 1525. He had a charter of Confirmation for the lands Fordew, Glentarken and Balmuik, all in Strathearn, under the Great Seal on 29 January, 1526, to be held by himself in liferent and his son John Campbell. He had a charter of confirmation under the Great Seal

for the lands of Auchreoch, Duncrosk, with the Mill of Glenloch, Carwhin, with the Mill, the lands of Lawers, Fordew, Glentarken and Balmuik in Strathearn, the lands of Kinloch, Turbrox and Tichardy, in Glenquaich with the loch and fishing thereof, in the Lordship of Appin of Dull, which were erected into the Free Barony of Auchreoch and talzied upon his immediate family on 4 June, 1540.¹ He *d.* on 12 February, 1562, as a result of having “*broke all his bones on the stairs of the Inn at Perth.*”² having *m.* firstly, prior to 31 May, 1517, Marion, daughter of Sir Walter Forrester of Torwood, (she was widow of Sir Henry Schaw of Cambusmore. She *d.* at Fordew on 31 October 1527, and was buried in the parish church of Stirling at 7 p.m. on 31 October, 1527³), when they had a Precept for a charter for the lands of Blairnorrie, in the Lordship of Discher and Toyer,⁴ and had a Charter of Confirmation for the Three Lawers on 16 June, 1525. By her he was father of :

1. Archibald Campbell, fiar of Lawers, (*see below*).
2. John Campbell, served heir provisional to his brother Archibald Campbell in the lands of Lawers on 16 June, 1525.⁵ He had the fee of the lands of Fordew, Glentarken and Balmuik on 29 January, 1526,⁶ and was served heir provisional to the lands of Lawers on 4 June, 1540.
3. Duncan Campbell, served heir provisional to his brother Archibald Campbell in the lands of Lawers on 16 June, 1525, and was served heir provisional to the lands of Lawers on 4 June, 1540. He *d.* on 8 June, 1554.⁷
4. Edward Campbell, served heir provisional to his brother Archibald Campbell in the lands of Lawers on 16 June, 1525, and was served heir provisional to the lands of Lawers on 4 June, 1540.
5. Walter Campbell, served heir provisional to his brother Archibald Campbell in the lands of Lawers on 16 June, 1525, and was served heir provisional to the lands of Lawers on 4 June, 1540.

6. Margaret Campbell, *m.* Sir William Edmonstone of Duntreath, (he was widow of Agnes, daughter of Matthew Stewart, 2nd Earl of Lennox, by whom he had issue) and had issue.

He *m.* secondly, prior to 28 September, 1530, Janet, daughter of Andrew, 2nd Lord Gray, (she was widow of John Charteris of Cuthilgurdie, by whom she had issue ; and of Sir David Wemyss of that Ilk, and *d.* in October 1539), when they had a charter of confirmation for the lands of Auchreoch and Auchincroisk, in the Lordship of Glen Dochart,¹ by whom he had no apparent issue.

He *m.* thirdly, Elizabeth Hay,² (she was widow of Alexander Robertson, 1st of Faskally, and *m.* after the death of James Campbell of Lawers, to John Forret of that Ilk³), by whom he was father of :

7. Janet Campbell, *m.* Sir Alexander Menzies of Weem, (he *m.* secondly, Katherine MacGhie, and *d.* at Perth on 7 March, 1563, having left issue), and had issue.
8. Elizabeth Campbell, *m.* James Campbell of Ardkinglass, (*c/m* 12 September, 1564,⁴) and had issue.
9. Marion Campbell, who with her sister Elizabeth Campbell, were placed under the care of their paternal uncle John Campbell of Murthly and are styled as daughters to Elizabeth Hay on 31 July, 1566. She *m.* firstly, Alexander Reidheugh, fiar of Tulliechettill, and had issue ; and secondly, John Drummond, 5th of Drummonerinoch.

ARCHIBALD CAMPBELL, FIAR OF LAWERS, had a Charter of Confirmation under the Great Seal following upon a resignation made in his favour by his father for the middle-part of the lands of Lawers, on 29 May, 1542, and *m.* by this date, Agnes, daughter of John Ross, 5th of Craigie.⁵ He *d. vita patris* in 1546 and had issue :

1. Duncan Campbell, who is styled as heir to his grandfather in a contract entered into by his grandfather and John Masoun and John Kinglassy, masons in Perth, for certain stone in 1551.¹ He *dsp vita avus* prior to 11 September, 1559.
2. John Campbell, 3rd of Lawers, (*see below*).

SIR JOHN CAMPBELL, 3RD OF LAWERS, in whose favour a Precept of Clare Constat was issued by John Paterson, Prior of Srathfillan, on 21 June, 1564, for his infetment as his heir to his grandfather² and acquired the lands of Aberuchill, with the Mill thereof, from William Moray of Abercairney by charter dated 20 September, 1594.³ He had an Assignation from Sir John Bellenden of Auchinoull of the gift of his own marriage to Beatrix, daughter of Sir Colin Campbell of Glenorchy, and failing her to any other honourable party that he may choose on 13 September, 1559.⁴ He *m.* Beatrix, daughter of Sir Colin Campbell, 6th of Glenorchy, (Dispensation dated 19 November, 1559⁵), *d.* prior to 14 February, 1611, and was father of :

1. Sir James Campbell, 4th of Lawers, (*see below*).
2. Colin Campbell, 1st of Aberuchill, (*see Campbell of Aberuchill*).
3. Duncan Campbell, *m.* Barbara Campbell with whom he was infet in the lands of Lawermor by his brother Sir James Campbell of Lawers on 5 July, 1620,⁶ and was witness to the contract of marriage of his niece Marjory, daughter of Sir James Campbell of Lawers, to Colin Campbell on 5 February, 1622, in which he is styled as brother to Colin Campbell of Aberuchill. He had issue :
 - 3a) Beatrix Campbell, *m.* Duncan Campbell, fiar of Duncrosk, (*c/m* 14 November 1634), and had issue.
4. Sir Archibald Campbell, 1st of Glencarradale, (*see Campbell of Glencarradale and Kinpunt*).
5. Andrew Campbell, styled as brother to Sir James Campbell of Lawers in 1618.
6. John Campbell, 1st of Ardeonaig, Innergeldie and Clathick, (*see Campbell of Ardeonaig, Innergeldie and Clathick*).

7. William Campbell, *bap.* at Perth on 9 October, 1575, and is named with his parents and brother Colin in an action raised by them against Anna Keith, Countess of Moray, and Archibald, Earl of Argyll, relating to the rights to the teind sheaves of the kirk of Aberdalgie, dated 9 July 1586.¹
8. Marjory Campbell, *m.* firstly, Edward Tosheoch of Monzievaird, and had issue ; and secondly by 1622, William Graham of Geddochie.²
9. Beatrix Campbell, *m.* firstly, Colin Campbell, 3rd of Glenlyon, (*c/m* 8 February, 1589), from whom she was divorced ; and secondly, Peter Kennoway of Kettleston, (*c/m* at Linlithgow on 6 August 1604), and had issue.
10. Dorothy Campbell, *bap.* at Perth on 12 October, 1574, *m.* Ewen Campbell of Lix, and had issue.
11. Marie Campbell, *bap.* at Perth on 28 February, 1578.

He was also father of at least two natural children :

12. Colin Campbell, styled as a natural son when witness to an Instrument of Sasine by Archibald Campbell of Murthly in favour of Duncan Campbell of Glenorchy for the lands Kilcarne and Cultranny on 18 January 1587.³
13. John Campbell of Dundurn, is styled as a natural son to the deceased Sir John Campbell of Lawers when he was witness to a Contract between Colin Campbell, fiar of Glenorchy, and John Campbell of Innergeldie for the lands of Innergeldie on 10 March, 1625, and is styled as natural brother to Sir James Campbell of Lawers when witness to the marriage contract between Patrick Campbell, 1st of Edinample, and Margaret, daughter of the deceased Colin Campbell, 1st of Aberuchill, dated 19 November 1625.⁴ He wadset of the lands of Dundurn from Drummond of Perth in 1647, *m.* Susan Burdon⁵ and *d.* by October of 1657. He was father of :

13a) Colin Campbell of Dundurn and Easter Duncrosk, is styled as son of the deceased John Campbell of Dundurn in an Inhibition raised against Sir James Campbell of Lawers by Archibald MacCarlich alias Campbell on 17 October 1657, for repayment of a Bond dated January of 1640 to which his father had been cautioner.⁶ He obtained the lands of

Easter Duncrosk with the grazings and sheilings at Finglen, in Glenlochry, from Sir James Campbell of Lawers by contract dated 6 January 1663,¹ and on 6 August 1678,, he was one of the curators chosen by John Stewart of Dalguise, being then named as a ner relation on his father's side.² On the death of his brother-in-law, Mr. William Ramsay, he became embroiled in the financial difficulties which befell his sister, Margaret, on account of his having stood cautioner to Bonds raised by them. In 1684, they were pursued and put to the horn by Sir Thomas Stewart of Grantully for payment of £4634 Scots contained in a Bond dated 10 Februry 1676, and at length, this resulted in his financial ruin. He *m.* by 6 January 1663, to Jean Fleming, who, on 25 July 1687, was compelled by judicial decree to resign her liferent right to the lands of Easter Duncrosk and they are then styled as residing at Dundurn,³ and was father of :

11b) John Campbell, who is styled as eldest son and heir to Colin Campbell, portioner of Duncrosk, in a Disposition in his favour by James Campbell of Glendaruel, for the lands of Glentoun, in Argyleshire, dated 19 March 1675,⁴ which he afterwards disposed to James, Earl of Perth, on 10 January 1683.⁵ He purchased lands in the at Perth Amboy, in the couny of Middlesex, and state of New Jersey from John Drummond of Lundin in April of 1684, and acquired further lands which he named "Duncrosk." He settled there with his wife and three children in October following, and making his Will on 5 December 1689,⁶ he *d.* there by 1690. He *m.* Mary Campbell, who acted as his executor and administrator of his estate behoof of their children, and was father of :

11c) John Campbell, who is named in his father's Will and of whom nothing further is known.

11c) Ann Campbell, also named in her fathr's Will. She *m.* on 28 November 1706, to John Stevens, and had issue.

11c) Gavinetta Campbell, also named in her father's Will. She *m.* William Harrison, and *d.* in 1758 having had issue.

13a) Archibald Campbell, styled as brother to Colin Campbell of Duncrosk when included in a Horning at the instance of James Campbell of Glendaruel against John, Earl of Breadalbane, dated 4 April 1681.

13a) Margaret Campbell, *m.* Mr. William Ramsay of Murthly and sometime Writer in Edinburgh, and is styled as sister to Colin Campbell of Duncrosk and Dundurn on a number of occasions following her husband's death. They had issue.

SIR JAMES CAMPBELL, 4TH OF LAWERS, styled as eldest son and heir to his father in a charter for the lands of Abercairney on 20 September, 1594, and *m.* Jean, daughter of James, 1st Lord Colville of Culross, by his first wife Isabel, daughter of Patrick, 3rd Lord Ruthven, (*c/m* at Edinburgh and Tillicoultry on 21 and 23 June, 1595¹). He *d.* in January of 1645 and was father of :

1. John Campbell, 1st Earl of Loudoun, *b.* in 1598, and *m.* in 1620, Margaret, eldest daughter and coheiress of George Campbell, Master of Loudoun (pre-nuptial *c/m* at Edinburgh, Dalkeith, Donipace, Keir, Fordell, Inchaffray, Wemyss, Dunkeld, Perth, Fingask, Methven and Culross on 29 July, 2, 3, 4, 6, 7, 9, 11, 15, 19, 24, 25, 28, 30 and 31 August and 3 September, 1619²), with whom he acquired these lands by charter dated 26 July, 1620. He was created Earl of Loudoun, Lord Tarrinyean and Mauchline on 12 May, 1633, *d.* at Edinburgh on 15 March, 1663, and had issue :

1a) James Campbell, 2nd Earl of Loudoun, succeeded his father in these lands and *m.* after 25 November 1666, Margaret, daughter of Hugh Montgomery, 7th Earl of Eglinton. He *d.* in 1684 and was father of :

1b) Hugh Campbell, 3rd Earl of Loudoun, *bap.* at Loudoun on 14 January, 1674. He was appointed Joint Secretary of State for Scotland in 1704, and held the office of Keeper of the Great Seal of Scotland from 1708 until 1713. He *m.* on 6 April, 1700, Margaret, daughter of John Dalrymple, 1st Earl of Stair, (she was *b.* on 4 February 1677, and *d.* on 3 April 1777), *d.* 18 November, 1731, and was father of :

1c) John Campbell, 4th Earl of Loudoun, *b.* on 5 May, 1705, and served as one of the senior officers in the army of William, Duke of Cumberland, during the Jacobite uprising of 1745/46. He *dsp* at Loudoun Castle on 27 April, 1782, and was succeeded by his cousin James Campbell of Lawers.

1c) Elizabeth Campbell, *dsp* at Sorn Castle on 19 April, 1771.

- 1c} Margaret Campbell, *m.* at Edinburgh on 30 August 1728, John Campbell, 2nd of Schawfield, (he was *b.* in 1696 and *m.* secondly at Edinburgh on 27 April, 1735, Henrietta, daughter of William Cunningham, 12th Earl of Glencairn. He *d.* at Kilsyth on 22 July, 1746).
- 1b} John Campbell of Shankston, *bap.* at Loudoun on 8 March, 1675, obtained these lands and attained the rank of Colonel in the army. He *m.* on 22 June, 1699, Janet, daughter of James Morton, and was father of :
- 1c} Hugh Campbell, *bap.* at Loudoun on 4 March, 1705, and *dsp.*
- 1c} John Campbell, *bap.* at Loudoun on 7 July, 1706, and *dsp.*
- 1c} Margaret Campbell, *bap.* at Loudoun on 11 July, 1700.
- 1c} Janet Campbell, *m.* Robert Barclay of Preston.
- 1b} **JAMES CAMPBELL, 9TH OF LAWERS**, succeeded his cousin in these lands and *m.* at Edinburgh on 27 February, 1720, Jean, daughter of David Boyle, 1st Earl of Glasgow, by his second wife Jean, daughter and heiress of William Mure of Rowallan, (*c/m* 29 March, 1720. She *d.* at Lawers on 19 December, 1729). He had the command of the British Cavalry at the battle of Fontenoy during which he received wounds from which he *d.* on 30 April, 1745. He was father of :
- 1c} James Campbell, 5th Earl of Loudoun, *b.* at Edinburgh on 11 February, 1726. He was retoured heir to his mother Jean Boyle, on 9 May 1733, following which he assumed the name of Mure and succeeded to the estate of Rowallan. He *m.* at Redhall on 30 April, 1777, Flora, daughter of John MacLeod of Raasay, (she *d.* at Hope Park 2 September, 1780), and *d.* on 28 April, 1786. He was father of :
- 1d} Flora Campbell of Loudoun, *bap.* on 5 December, 1780, and was retoured heir to her father in the lands of Rowallan on 30 July 1787. She *m.* on 12 July, 1804, Francis Rawdon Hastings, 2nd Earl of Moira and 1st Marquis of Hastings, (he *d.* on 28 November, 1826), *d.* 8 January, 1840, and had issue :
- 1e} Francis George Augustus Campbell, *b.* at London on 13 February, 1807, and *d.* the day after.
- 1e} George Augustus Francis Campbell, 2nd Marquess of Hastings, *b.* at London on 4 February, 1808, and succeeded his father.
- 1e} Flora Elizabeth Campbell, *b.* at Edinburgh on 11 February, 1806, and *d.* unmarried on 5 July, 1839.
- 1e} Sophia Frederica Christina Campbell, *b.* on 1 February, 1809.

- 1e) Selina Constantinia Campbell, *b.* on 15 April, 1810, and *m.* on 25 June, 1838, Charles John Henry, son of John Joseph Henry of Straffan. She *d.* on 8 November, 1867.
- 1e) Adelaide Augustus Levinia Campbell, *m.* on 8 July, 1854, Sir William Keith Murray, 7th Baronet of Ochtertyre, and had issue.
- 1c) Jean Campbell, *bap.* at Edinburgh on 28 June, 1722.
- 1c) Margaret Campbell, *b.* on 17th and *bap.* at Edinburgh on 20 May, 1727.
- 1b) Jane Campbell, *m.* in 1705, Sir James Campbell, 4th of Aberuchill, (he was widow of Jean, daughter of Sir John Dempster of Pitliver, by whom he had issue. He *d.* on 10 May, 1754), and had issue.
- 1b) Margaret Campbell, *m.* Colin Lindsay, 3rd Earl of Balcarres, (he was widow of Mauritia, third daughter of Louis de Nassau by whom he had no issue, and of Jean, daughter of David Carnegie, 2nd Earl of Northesk, by whom he had issue. Also of Jean, daughter of William Ker, 2nd Earl of Roxburgh, by whom he had issue and *d.* in 1722 aged about 70 years), and had issue.
- 1b) Christian Campbell, *m.* George Ross of Galstoun and had issue.
- 1b) Eleanor Campbell, *m.* firstly, on 10 June, 1697, James, 1st Viscount Primrose, (he *d.* on 13 June, 1706), and secondly, John Dalrymple, 2nd Earl of Stair, (he *d.* at Queensberry House on 9 May, 1747). She *d.* at Edinburgh on 21 November, 1759.
- 1a) George Campbell, styled as second lawful son to John, Earl of Loudoun, when witness to a Disposition by his father of annuities from the lands of Fodderance in favour of Alexander Haliburton of Fodderance on 25 February, 1659.¹
- 1a) Jean Campbell, *m.* George Maule, 2nd Earl of Panmure, (*c/m* 7 March, 1645.² He *d.* on 24 March, 1671), and had issue.
- 1a) Margaret Campbell, *m.* at the Abbey of Holyrood on Tuesday 30 October 1649, John Elphinstone, 3rd Lord Balmerino, (he was *b.* on 18 February, 1623, and *d.* on 10 June, 1704), *d.* in January of 1666 and had issue.
2. Mungo Campbell, 5th of Lawers, (*see below*).
3. James Campbell, styled as a legitimate son of Sir James Campbell of Lawers when witness to a charter by Colin Campbell of Aberuchill granting to Sir Archibald Campbell, his brother, the lands of Kingarth and Ardbeck on 2 January, 1623.³

4. William Campbell, witness to a Tack by his uncle Archibald Campbell in 1607, and assigned a Bond due to him by John Stewart of Ardsheil for 200 merks Scots (dated 4 July 1617) to William Hutton, burghess of Edinburgh, on 25 April 1620.¹
5. Colin Campbell, is styled as brother to Mungo Campbell, fiar of Lawers, when witness to an Assignation in favour of this Mungo dated 30 January 1634.²
6. Janet Campbell, *m.* John Ban MacNab, younger son of Finlay MacNab of Bovaine, (he *d.* by 1649), and had issue.
7. Marjory Campbell, *m.* Colin Campbell, *alias* Bishop, lawful son of Duncan Campbell *or* Bishop in Glenlyon, (*c/m* at Fordew 5 February 1622³).
8. Anna Campbell, *m.* Alexander Reidheugh of Tulliechettill, (*c/m* at Fordell on 4 September, 1626.⁴ He *m.* secondly in 1630, Beatrix, daughter of Colin Campbell, 1st of Aberuchill.).
9. Katherine Campbell, *m.* Robert Buchannan of Leny, (*c/m* 29 December, 1629⁵), and had issue.
10. Beatrix Campbell, *m.* Alexander Menzies of Comrie, (*c/m* at Lawers on 9 October, 1631⁶).
11. Elizabeth Campbell, *m.* Hugh Dunbar, son and heir of David Dunbar of Enterkine, (*c/m* 7 March & 6 June 1627⁷), and had issue.

He was also father of a natural son :

12. William Campbell, was witness to a Bond by his father to Charter Murray in Cowden dated 30 April 1613, and in which he is styled as a natural son.⁸ He was also witness to a contract by which Alexander Menzies of Weem and Duncan Menzies, his son, agreed to dispense their lands of Duncrosk to James Campbell of Lawers, his father, dated at Perth on 16 June 1615.⁹ He *m.* Janet MacGruther, *d.* by 22 December, 1638, and was father of :

11a) James Campbell, is styled as son to Janet NicGruther, relict of William Campbell of Turbrich, in a Tack by William Menzies of Schian and Minister of Kenmore, for half the meadow of Dalkillin on 22 December, 1638.¹

11b) Barbara Campbell, *m.* John MacDowell, eldest son and heir of JohnMacDowell of Gairlochane, (*c/m* at Perth on 14 April 1648²).

MUNGO CAMPBELL, 5TH OF LAWERS, had a Disposition for the lands of Lawers from his father upon his elder brother succeeding to those of Loudoun and *m.* Helen, eldest daughter of Sir Alexander Menzies of Weem, (*c/m* 6 July 1624³). He was *k.* at the battle of Auldearn on 9 May, 1645, and was father of :

1. James Campbell, 6th of Lawers, (*see below*).
2. Colin Campbell, served as Lieutenant-General in the Lawers Regiment and is so styled in 1649.
3. Jean Campbell, *m.* at Perth in 1645, to Captain James Campbell.
4. Marjory Campbell, *m.* firstly, John Campbell, 2nd of Edinample, (he *d.* in December of 1668⁴), and had issue ; and secondly, to Nicol Bontein of Ardoch.
5. A daughter, *m.* Gilbert MacNab, son of Patrick MacNab in Acharn, and had issue.

JAMES CAMPBELL, 6TH OF LAWERS, retoured heir to his father in the lands and Barony of Lawers on 4 March, 1653, and was appointed Lord Lyon King of Arms on 13 May, 1658. He *d.* about 1689 and certainly before December of 1692, having *m.* firstly at Kenmore on 24 April, 1653, Margaret, sister of Rorie MacLeod of Dunvegan,⁵ by whom he was father of :

1. **JAMES CAMPBELL, 7TH OF LAWERS**, succeeded his father and sold the lands of Lawers to John, Earl of Breadalbane, on 24 February, 1693. He *dsp* by 12 July, 1703, when his half-brother James Campbell was served his heir.
2. Roderick Campbell, *bap.* at Perth on 9 July, 1654, and *dsp.*
3. Archibald Campbell, *bap.* at Perth on 9 July, 1654, and *dsp.*

4. Margaret Campbell, *bap.* on 13 May, 1655, and *m.* Colonel Patrick Vaus of Barnbarroch.

He *m.* secondly, in August of 1678, to Ann, daughter of William Stewart, 1st of Innernytie, who, as his relict, granted a Bond of Provision in favour of their children, James, Thomas, Liliass and Katherine, on 31 December 1692, by whom he was father of :

5. James Campbell, 8th of Lawers, (*see below*).

6. Thomas Campbell, *bap.* at Edinburgh on 14 March, 1686, and is named with his siblings in a Bond by their mother, Anna Stewart, in their favour dated 31 December 1692.

7. Liliass Campbell, *m.* firstly on 13 October, 1701, Archibald Campbell, 7th of Inverawe, (he was widow of Mary, daughter of Hector MacNeil of Taynish, whom he had *m.* on 20 July, 1657. He *dsp* on 21 May, 1705), and secondly in 1719, Angus Campbell of Dunstaffnage, (he *d.* at Edinburgh on 1 April 1742, in his 63rd year), and had no issue.

8. Katherine Campbell, included in her mother's provision in December 1692.

JAMES CAMPBELL, 8TH OF LAWERS, retoured heir to his half brother James Campbell on 12 July, 1703, and is then styled as "*son by a second marriage of James Campbell of Lawers.*" He was murdered by Duncan Campbell of Edramuckie while asleep in lodgings in Greenock on 22 April, 1723, and had no issue.
