

# DRUMMOND

## OF CARNOCK & MONZIE

**WILLIAM DRUMMOND, 1<sup>ST</sup> OF CARNOCK**, was younger son of John Drummond of Stobhall, by his wife Mary, heiress of Sir John de Montifex. He *m.* Elizabeth Airth with whom he obtained a portion of the lands of Carnock, near Stirling, *d.* by 20 November 1465, and was father of :

**DAVID DRUMMOND, 2<sup>ND</sup> OF CARNOCK**, succeeded his father and had Sasine for the lands of Quhiltlaw, Durrishall, Carnock in the sheriffdom of Stirling and others in 1466.<sup>1</sup> He *m.* by 31 March, 1476, Marion, daughter of Alexander Cunningham of Auchenbowie, when she had a charter from her father for the 42s. lands of Carnock, in the barony of Plean, for the duration of her life.<sup>2</sup> He and his son Robert were infeft in the lands of Erthbeg as legitimate heirs to Elizabeth de Erth, his mother, on 27 June 1476,<sup>3</sup> and is styled as deceased and heritable proprietor of the lands of Airthbeg in a charter under the Great Seal confirming a charter of endowment by Robert Bruce of Stenhouse on 11 October, 1485.<sup>4</sup> He was father of :

**ROBERT DRUMMOND, 3<sup>RD</sup> OF CARNOCK**, had an Instrument of Sasine for the lands of Plean as heir to his father on 5 April, 1476.<sup>5</sup> He *m.* firstly, Marion, daughter of William Menteith, eldest son and heir of William Menteith of Kerse and Alva, and secondly, Isabel, daughter of Alexander Stewart of Galstoun, and *d.* by 18 April, 1502.<sup>6</sup> He was father of :

**ALEXANDER DRUMMOND, 4<sup>TH</sup> OF CARNOCK**, had Sasine for the 17 merk lands of Armore as heir to his deceased father on 24 February, 1506,<sup>1</sup> and as heir to his father he was infeft in the lands of Plean on 16 April of that same year. He sold his 1/7 part of the lands of Fordell to James Henderson, Burgess of Edinburgh, on 6 September, 1510,<sup>2</sup> was a compatriot of Archibald Douglas, Earl of Angus, for which he was banished from the Kingdom in 1529 however, this was short-lived and on the accession of King James V. he was called home and had Letters of Remission for all previous transgressions against the Crown on 31 March of that same year. He and his eldest son, Robert, granted part of the lands of Carnock to Sir John Drummond of Innerpeffrey and Margaret Stewart, his wife, in 1546 and *m.* Marjory, daughter of John Bruce, 2<sup>nd</sup> of Auchenbowie. He was father of :

1. Sir Robert Drummond, 5<sup>th</sup> of Carnock, (*see below*).
2. Sir Alexander Drummond, 1<sup>st</sup> of Medhope, obtained the lands of Medhope, in the parish of Linthithgow, on 29 October, 1561, and was a provisional heir to his brother Sir Robert Drummond in the lands of Carnock in a charter in favour of the latter's eldest son and heir Patrick Drummond dated 15 February, 1569. He *m.* Margaret Bruce and was father of :
  - 2a) Sir Alexander Drummond, 2<sup>nd</sup> of Medhope, succeeded his father in the lands of Medhope and was appointed a Senator of the College of Justice on 17<sup>th</sup> May 1608. He *d.* on 15 July 1618,<sup>3</sup> being described by Sir James Balfour as "a very learned judge," and was father of :
    - 2b) Alexander Drummond, styled as eldest son in life of his father when he was admitted a Burgess of Glasgow on 23 August, 1618, and is styled as "sometime of Medhope" in a charter by James, Earl of Abercorn, for these lands in favour of his uncle Robert Drummond in Waterstoun on 28 November, 1623.<sup>4</sup>
    - 2b) James Drummond, witness to a charter by Alexander, Master of Elphinston, for the lands of Pittendreich in favour of Alexander Linton on 3 November, 1628, and in which he is styled as son of the deceased Sir Alexander Drummond of Medhope.<sup>5</sup>
    - 2b) Robert Drummond,

- 2b) William Drummond, all of whom, excepting Alexander, are described in their father's Testament as being then minors and as such, they were placed under the care of their uncle Robert Drummond who was appointed sole executor.
- 2b) John Drummond, witness with his brother James to a charter by Alexander, Master of Elphinstone, on 3 November, 1628.
- 2b) Jean Drummond, *m.* Sir John Bruce of Kincavil, and had issue.
- 2a) John Drummond of Woodcockdale, included in a bond of caution by George Lundy of Gorthy in 1593 and obtained the lands of Woodcockdale by 1613 which he was compelled to grant to his brother Robert Drummond of Medhope and James Gibb of Carriber in consideration of his debts on 10 July, 1636. He *m.* at Dunfermline on 19 November, 1605, Isobel, sister of James Gibb of Carriber.<sup>1</sup>
- 2a) James Drummond, styled as a son of Alexander Drummond of Medhope in a charter by Alexander, Lord Urquhart, on 16 February, 1596.
- 2a) William Drummond, witness to a charter in favour of his brother Robert Drummond, for the lands of Medhope, resigned in his favour by James, Earl of Abercorn, on Edinburgh, 28 November, 1623, and in which he is styled Captain William Drummond, sergeant major in the regiment of Sir William Broig Colonel in Holland.<sup>2</sup> He attained the rank of Sergeant-Major in the army and *d.* from wounds received at the siege of Groll, in Holland, in August of 1627. The following letter concerning his death is to be found, Report from Groll.  
August 2nd 1627.  
Noble Mighty Lords, . . . those within kept up a hot musketry fire both night and ay, but did little damage. Yesterday Drummond, sergeant-major of Colonel Brog, was shot in the head and mortally wounded. . . , Your Honourable Mightinesses obedient servant R. Hyghens, P. de Roovene. The army before Groll on this the 2nd of August, 1627.
- 2a) Sir Robert Drummond, 3<sup>rd</sup> of Medhope, had a Disposition from Alexander Abercromby, eldest son of James Abercromby, fiar of Kersie, for the two-third share of the ship "Capbar" on 28 July, 1612, and acted as executor to his brother Sir Alexander Drummond of Medhope upon his death in 1619. He obtained the lands of Medhope with the turret thereof, in the barony of Abercorn, from James, Earl of Abercorn, on 28 November, 1623,<sup>3</sup> and was father of,

- 2b) Sir Alexander Drummond, who was a steady supporter of the Royalist Cause and is said by William, Viscount Strathallan, to have been *ksp* at the battle of Auldearn in 1645.
- 2b) Sir William Drummond, 4<sup>th</sup> of Medhope, succeeded to the lands of Medhope and was father of,
- 2c) Sir Robert Drummond, 5<sup>th</sup> of Medhope, succeeded his father and *m.* Marjory Renton, with whom he is mentioned in a Discharge registered on 17 November, 1671.
- 2b) Robert Drummond, who was father of,
- 2c) John Drummond, styled as son of Robert Drummond, brother of Sir William Drummond of Medhope, in a Bond registered on 23 April, 1664.
- 2a) Marion Drummond, *m.* by 24 February, 1614, John Hay, 2<sup>nd</sup> of Easter Kennet, when they had a charter for the lands of Easter Kennet from King James VI. They had issue.
- 2a) Helen Drummond, *m.* Robert Bruce of Baldrig, with whom she had a charter for the lands of Middle-Baldrig from his brother Sir Alexander Bruce of Airth, on 4 January, 1583. They had issue.
3. Charles Drummond of Kingsfield, redeemed the lands of Mehope for his brother Alexander Drummond on 29 October, 1561, and became a Burgess in Linlithgow for which town he served for many years as Provost. He *m.* Janet Hamilton, *d.* by 5 December, 1604, and was father of,
- 3a) Henry Drummond, 2<sup>nd</sup> of Kingsfield, styled as son and heir of the deceased Charles Drummond of Kingsfield in a contract between Sir John Drummond of Hawthornden and Robert Abercromby of Pilton dated 5 December, 1604. He *m.* Agnes, daughter and heiress of Alexander Mauchane of Barnton, (she was widow of George Carkettle, Burgess of Edinburgh, and with Henry's consent she resigned her lands of Barnton in favour of James Elphinstone, Lord Balmerino, on 13 June, 1605), by whom he was father of;
- 3b) Catherine Drummond, *bap.* at Edinburgh on 1 January, 1607.
- 3b) Margaret Drummond, *bap.* at Edinburgh on 5 November, 1609.
- 3a) Margaret Drummond, *m.* firstly, Aulay MacAulay of Ardincaple, and, secondly, Colonel Bartholomew Balfour of Carraldston, and had issue by both husbands.
- 3a) Elizabeth Drummond, *m.* Robert Craigie, brother of Mr. Thomas Craigie, Advocate, (*c/m* 2 November, 1586<sup>1</sup>).
- 3a) A daughter, *m.* Richard Abercromby, 1<sup>st</sup> of Pilton.
4. Marion Drummond, *m.* Thomas Bruce, 1<sup>st</sup> of Larbertscheills, and had issue.

**SIR ROBERT DRUMMOND, 5<sup>TH</sup> OF CARNOCK**, who, with Marjory Bruce, his mother, had a Charter of Confirmation under the Great Seal for the lands of Carnock, Touchill, Carbrok, Durisdaile, Erthmor and the middle-part of the lands of Colquhalzie on 20 November, 1531,<sup>1</sup> and was appointed Master of Works to King James VI. He *d.* in 1592 aged 74 years, having *m.* firstly, by 5 July, 1542, Agnes, sister of Sir James Kirkcaldy of Grange, when they had a Crown Charter for the lands of Easter Row, and, by her, he had issue :

1. Margaret Drummond, *m.* Adam Erskine, Commendator of Cambuskenneth, natural son of Thomas, Master of Erskine, son of John Erskine, 4<sup>th</sup> Earl of Mar. They had issue.

He *m.* secondly, by 21 April 1550, to Marjory, daughter of Alexander Elphinstone, 2<sup>nd</sup> Lord Elphinstone, (she was *b.* on 6 February, 1533), when, on his resignation, they had a charter under the Great Seal for the lands of Armoir and various parts of the barony of Plean,<sup>2</sup> and by her he was father of :

2. Patrick Drummond, 6<sup>th</sup> of Carnock, (*see below*).
3. Sir John Drummond, 1<sup>st</sup> of Hawthornden, *b.* in 1553, and was served heir provisional to the lands of Carnock in a Charter by his father in favour of his elder brother Patrick Drummond, dated 15 February, 1569. He was appointed Gentleman Usher to King James VI. and by whom he was Knighted in 1603, purchased firstly the lands of Slipperfield followed by those of Hawthornden from James Douglas of Hawthornden, on 29 December, 1597,<sup>3</sup> and was appointed tutor to his nephew Alexander Drummond of Carnock by 1593. He *m.* Susanna, daughter of Sir William Fowler, Secretary to the Queen, *d.* in around 1610, and had issue, (*see Drummond of Hawthornden*).
4. Robert Drummond, styled as third son to his father when he was a provisional heir to his elder brother Patrick in the lands of Carnock on 15 February, 1569, and is included in a bond of caution by George Lundy of Gorthy in 1593.<sup>4</sup>

5. William Drummond, styled as fourth son of his father when he was named as a provisional heir to his elder brother Patrick in the lands of Carnock on 15 February, 1569, and was gifted the vacant prebendaries of the Chapel of Stirling in around 1573 while still a student at St. Andrews.
6. Agnes Drummond, *m.* James Lockhart of Lee, eldest son and heir of James Lockhart of Lee, (he survived her and *m.* secondly to Isabel Weir by whom he had issue ; and thirdly in 1607, to Jean, daughter of Sir George Auchinleck of Balmanno, by whom he had further issue. He *d.* in 1633), and from whom she had a charter for the liferent lands of Lee on 10 November 1581.<sup>1</sup> They had issue.
7. Elizabeth Drummond, *dsp* by 21 November, 1598, when her niece Margaret Drummond, daughter of Patrick Drummond of Carnock, wife of James Kinross of Kippenross, was served her heir.
8. Jean Drummond, *m.* George Multrae of Seafield, (*c/m* 5 May 1587<sup>2</sup>), and had issue.

He was also father of a natural son :

9. Malcolm Drummond, styled as natural son to Sir Robert Drummond of Carnock when on 19 July, 1582, he had a remission under the Privy Seal for the slaughter of Robert Richardson in Ochterbannock in November of 1575.<sup>3</sup>

**PATRICK DRUMMOND, 6<sup>TH</sup> OF CARNOCK AND 1<sup>ST</sup> OF MONZIE**, had a charter for the lands of Carnock, with the Turret and Fortalice thereof, the fifth part of the lands of Touchill, and the fifth part of the lands of Plean from his father on 15 February, 1569. He is styled as Master of the King's Stables on 1 November, 1579, when he received £10 worth of the lands of Balgraden, in the Stewartry of Kirkcubright, which had been forfeited by James Muirhead of Lauchope and granted the lands of Glasschorrie, Duntarvie, Farness and Dalmarkglen to George Drummond of Balloch, by resignation dated 21 August, 1579. He was charged with treason for having been in the Ruthven party during the Raid of Ruthven and for which he had his entire estate sequestrated by Act of Parliament and thereafter granted to Alexander Stewart of Glennis by gift under the Privy Seal dated 24 August, 1584. He *d.* on 16 August, 1587,<sup>4</sup> having *m.* firstly,

Marion, eldest daughter of Alexander Bruce of Airth, (c/m 13 May, 1557<sup>1</sup>), by whom he had no apparent issue.

He *m.* secondly, to Margaret, eldest daughter and coheirress of Patrick Scott, 4<sup>th</sup> of Monzie, (she *m.* secondly, Patrick Graham, 3<sup>rd</sup> of Inchbraikie, and had issue), from whom, with the consent of her curators, he had a resignation of the lands of Glaschorrie, the middle-part lands of Dalmarkglen, the middle-part lands of Farness and the lands of Duntarf, all in Strathearn, which was confirmed by a Charter under the Great Seal on 17 April, 1576, to be held jointly by Patrick and Margaret and their heirs male, whom failing, by the heirs male of Patrick.<sup>2</sup> He had another Charter of Confirmation dated as above following a resignation by Margaret, his wife, and Isobella Scott, her sister and coheirress, in his favour for the three-quarter lands of Monzie; the quarter-part lands of Dalpatrick called Scott's Quarter and the northern middle-part of the lands of MalarMaknab, which, for the good and faithful service rendered by Patrick and his father to the King, were erected into the Free Barony of Monzie. By her he was father of :

1. Sir Alexander Drummond, 7<sup>th</sup> of Carnock, (*see below*).
2. James Drummond, acted as executor to his father and is styled as brother to Alexander Drummond of Carnock in their sister, Agnes's contract of marriage with John Abercromby, younger of Throsk on 10 August, 1604. He was part of the Drummond force assembled by the Privy Council in 1614 to seek out and apprehend certain members of the then proscribed ClanGregor in Upper Strathearn, and was father of,
  - 2a) Patrick Drummond, both of whom are described thus by William, Viscount Strathallan  
"Mr. Patrick, a learned scholar and religious gentleman, Robine his brother, a courtly youth, both died unmarried."
  - 2a) Robert or Robin Drummond,
  - 2a) Jean Drummond, stated by Viscount Strathallan to have *m.* although he neglects to give her husband's name.
3. Patrick Drummond of Galivmor, had a charter for the lands of Galivmoir from Patrick Drummond of Milnab on 7 March, 1611, is styled as brother to the deceased Sir Alexander Drummond of Carnock, when was a witness to a Renunciation by Margaret Comrie, daughter of John Comrie of that Ilk and Duncan Fergusson of Moulin, her spouse, of all rights they had to

the lands of Comrie in favour of John, Earl of Perth, on 5 June, 1628. He *m.* Liliias, daughter of Thomas Drummond, son of John Drummond, 3<sup>rd</sup> of Drummonderinloch with whom he had a charter for the lands of Kirktoun of Strogeith, and which lands they gave a Letter of Reversion to John, Lord Drummond, on 16 May, 1627. He *d.* by 1630 and was father of,

3a) James Drummond, who *d. vita patris* and had issue,

3b) Patrick Drummond, styled as grandson and heir to Patrick Drummond of Galivmor when he granted a Procuratory of Resignation for the Mill of Dundurn to James, Earl of Perth, in 1630.<sup>1</sup>

4. John Drummond, appointed Chancellor of Strathearn and is styled as brother of Patrick Drummond of Galivmoir in a charter for the lands of Balloch in favour Beatrix Drummond, wife of Henry Drummond of Balloch, on 26 January 1613. He *m.* Elizabeth Annand and was father of,

4a) Margaret Drummond, named in her sister Anna's Testament

4a) Bessie Drummond, *m.* Ludovick Marshall, son of Gavin Marshall, portioner of Mains of Dollar, (*c/m* 15 July 1638<sup>2</sup>).

4a) Anna Drummond, *m.* William Murray, 1<sup>st</sup> of Keilour, (*c/m* at Broich on 13 November 1648<sup>3</sup>), and had issue.

5. William Drummond, was a provisional heir to his maternal kinsman's lands of Balloch on 26 January, 1613.

6. Agnes Drummond, *m.* John Abercromby, younger of Throsk eldest son and heir of John Abercromby of Throsk, (*c/m* at Throsk on 10 August 1604<sup>4</sup>).

7. Margaret Drummond, served heir to her aunt Elizabeth Drummond on 21 November, 1598, and *m.* James Kinross of Kippenross. They had issue.

**SIR ALEXANDER DRUMMOND, 7<sup>TH</sup> OF CARNOCK**, who was underage on his father's death and had Alexander, Master of Elphinstone, James Drummond, Commendator of Inchaffray and John Drummond of Hawthornden appointed curators. He was retoured heir to his father on 1 December, 1596, was knighted by King James VI., and had a Charter under the Great Seal for the lands of Carnock, the seventh part of Touchill, Plean, Culquarter, Carbrok, Gartincabar and Durishill, with the fortalice of Carnock, the lands of

Bannockburn with the Mill thereof, and the three-quarter part lands of Monzie, which were erected into the Barony of Carnock on 15 December 1608. He resigned his share of the lands of Plean in favour of Alexander Somerville, younger of Plean, on 19 February 1611, *m.* Elizabeth, third daughter of Sir Patrick Hepburn of Lufness, (*c/m* at Holyrood, Edinburgh and Wauchton on 26 March 1601<sup>1</sup>), and *d.* in January of 1613.<sup>2</sup> He was father of,

1. Sir John Drummond, 8<sup>th</sup> of Carnock, (*see below*).
2. Patrick Drummond,
3. Jean Drummond, *m.* Sir William Cunningham of Caprington, (*c/m* at Stirling on 29 July 1647<sup>3</sup>).
4. Isabel Drummond, *m.* Alexander Multrae, Tutor of Seafield, brother of Robert Multrae of Seafield, with whom she had an annualrent of 300 merks from the lands of Mains of Carnock in recognition of the sum 4000 merks due in the name of Tocher from her brother John Drummond of Carnock on 28 June 1632.<sup>4</sup> They had issue.
5. Marie Drummond, all of whom are named in their father's Testament.

**SIR JOHN DRUMMOND, 8<sup>TH</sup> OF CARNOCK**, *b.* in around 1604 and was retoured heir to his father in the lands of Malar MacNab on 16 May, 1627.<sup>5</sup> He sold his lands of Carnock to Sir Thomas Nicholson, Advocate, on 15 February, 1634, and sold the lands of Bannockburn to John Rollo, second son of Sir Andrew Rollo of Duncrub, on 18 June, 1636, afterwards being styled of Drummondhall. He *m.* Margaret, daughter of Sir Andrew Rollo, 1<sup>st</sup> Lord Rollo, and was *k.* at the battle of Alford in 1645. He was father of an only apparent child, son :

**SIR JOHN DRUMMOND OF DRUMMONDHALL**, succeeded on the death of his father in 1645 and served in the life Guards of King Charles II. He *dsp* in 1680.<sup>6</sup>
