

DRUMMOND

OF COLQUHALZIE

MALCOLM DRUMMOND, 1ST OF COLQUHALZIE, the founder of this stirpes, was second son of Sir Maurice de Drummond, 1st of Concraig. William, Viscount Strathallan, states that he and his brother Sir John Drummond of Concraig received the lands of Inverramsay as a reward for having fought under the Earl of Mar at the battle of Harlaw, in 1411, although this is incorrect. Instead, Sir Robert de Erskine of that Ilk granted the lands of Peche, Inverramsay and Newlands, in the Lorship of the Garioch, to Sir John de Drummond of Concraig, brother to Malcolm, which was confirmed by Alexander Stewart, Earl of Mar, on 20 April 1406, fully five years before the battle was fought.¹ His wife is said to have *m.* a daughter of John Barclay of Collernie, although there is no evidence of this. He was father of :

JOHN DRUMMOND, 2ND OF COLQUHALZIE AND INVERRAMSAY, succeeded his father and granted Letters of Reversion to Patrick Comrie of that Ilk for the lands of Meggar in 1446.² He had a Charter of Confirmation under the Great Seal confirming a grant in his favour of the lands of Duchlage and Petharry by Thomas de Builly, Rector of Crieff, on 27 March, 1450.³ He is said to have *m.* Elizabeth Campbell, niece of Colin Campbell, 1st Earl of Argyll, but there is no proof of this. He was father of :

1. Thomas Drummond, 3rd of Colquhalzie, (*see below*).
2. William Drummond,
3. Walter Drummond, to whom his father disponded the lands of Duchlage, Petquhar and the third part of the west lying lands of Meggar and which lands he granted to his brother Andrew Drummond, Vicar of Muthill, for his good counsel and service dated at Muthill 21 November, 1475.⁴

4. Andrew Drummond, appointed Minister of Muthill and had a grant of the lands of Duchlage, Petquhar and the third part lands of Meggar from his brother Walter Drummond on 21 November, 1475. These lands reverted on his death to the senior line of the family in the person of Thomas Drummond of Colquhalzie and his eldest daughter and heir Margaret who's husband John Inglis, following marriage, received infeftment.
5. Elizabeth Drummond, *m.* in 1447, John de Comrie, 4th of that Ilk,¹ and had issue.
6. Sybilla Drummond, *m.* William Bell, merchant in Stirling.

THOMAS DRUMMOND, 3RD OF COLQUHALZIE, was witness with his father to an Instrument of Sasine of the lands of Comrie, and others, in favour of John de Comrie of that Ilk on 18 December 1455, and sold his lands of Dalchirla and Sermir to Maurice Drummond of Concraig on 20 April, 1455.² He was a natural son as was mentioned in a charter under the Great Seal for the lands of Duchlage in favour of his son-in-law John Inglis in 1480 and *m.* to a daughter of Andrew Cunningham, fiar of Glengarnock. He was father of :

MARGARET DRUMMOND, 4TH OF COLQUHALZIE, was the sole heiress of her father. She was under age at her father's death and was placed under the care of Humphrey Cunningham, grandson and heir of William Cunningham of Glengarnock, by 30 April 1474, when she had a transumpt made of a previous charter granted by King James II., in favour of her grandfather John Drummond of Inverramsay, for the lands of Colquhalzie.³ She *m.* John Inglis, Sheildbearer to King James III., brother to Alexander Inglis, Archdeacon of St. Andrews, (he *d.* by 30 March 1491), with whom on 21 November 1480, she had a confirmation under the Great Seal for the lands of Duchlage and Colquhalzie as heir to her father, and entered into a dispute with John of Comrie of that Ilk regarding the ownership of the lands of Meggar on 4 May 1482. She was still living on 10 October 1521, when a liferent of the middle-part of Colquhalzie was reserved for her.⁴ They had issue :

1. William Inglis of Colquhalzie, succeeded and on 30 March 1491, he had a charter under the Great Seal confirming for the lands of Colquhalzie, the third part of the west lying lands Meggar, Duchlage and Croftnappoch¹ He was complained of to the Lords Auditors by Thomas Drummond, 1st of Drummonderinoch, for wrongful occupation of his lands of Drummonderinoch in 1498, and *dsp*.
2. Alexander Inglis, served heir provisional to his brother William Inglis in the lands of Colquhalzie on 30 May, 1491, and was killed at the battle of Flodden in September of 1513.
3. John Inglis, served heir provisional to his brothers in the lands of Colquhalzie on 30 May, 1491, and *dsp*.
4. Margaret Inglis, (*see below*).
5. Marion Inglis, *m.* Patrick Murray, younger son of Sir William Moray, 9th of Tullibardine, prior to 4 November, 1516. She is styled as Lady of a third part of the lands of Colquhalzie on 30 October, 1521, when she made a grant of certain lands to Alexander Drummond of Carnock.

MARGARET INGLIS, became heir to her mother in the lands of Colquhalzie and Duchlage and had Sasine for the lands of Duchlas and Meggar on 8 October 1516, on the terms given by the King for those killed at Flodden.² She *m.* David Drummond, third son of Thomas Drummond, 1st of Drummonderinoch, who in her right, succeeded to the lands of Colquhalzie. He was witness to a charter by Andrew Tosheoch of Monzie granting the quarter part lands of Monzie in favour of Andrew Tosheoch, his son, on 5 November 1553, and is then styled as of Colquhalzie. They had issue :

1. John Drummond, 5th of Colquhalzie, (*see below*).
2. George Drummond, mentioned with his parents in a charter concerning the lands of Colquhalzie on 13 December, 1546, and resided at Strogeith by 14 September, 1582, when he was witness to a Charter by Sybilla Comrie, of that Ilk, granting the lands of Comrie to her uncle John Comrie.
3. Elizabeth Drummond, *m.* in around 1542, John Drummond, 5th of Pitkellony, and had issue.

JOHN DRUMMOND, 5TH OF COLQUHALZIE, succeeded his father and was appointed “custodian of the lands, Baronies with the eastland Fortalice of Dunkeld, and other houses, castles, fortalices thereof with the power to create offices and baillies” on 16 October 1551. He was complained of in 1553 by Mr James Hepburn, dean and vicar of

Dunkeld, for his wrongful occupation of the Bishop's Castle, and had Sasine of Colquhalzie and Duchlas on 30 May 1560.¹ He *m.* in around 1548, to Janet, daughter of Donald Campbell, Abbot of Coupar Angus Abbey, with whom he had a charter from her father for the lands of Blacklaw, Cotyards and the Mill of Blacklaw, in the Lordship of Cupar, on 10 January 1558,² (she *d.* by 23 September 1583), and was father of :

1. John Drummond, 6th of Colquhalzie, (*see below*).
2. Thomas Drummond, 1st of Drummawhence (*see Drummond of Drummawhence*).
3. Sybilla Drummond, *m.* firstly, William Reidheugh, 2nd of Aberlednock, (he *d.* on 27 February, 1572³), by whom she had issue. She survived him and *m.* secondly, to Archibald Campbell, 2nd of Lochnell, by whom she further had issue, and, surviving him, she *m.* thirdly, to Duncan MacDougall of Dunollie.
4. Elizabeth Drummond, *m.* Patrick Drummond, 4th of Milnab, and had issue.
5. Isabella Drummond, *m.* Alexander Inglis, 1st of Byres, and had issue.
6. Agnes Drummond, *m.* her brother-in-law Archibald Campbell, 1st of Persie, son of David Campbell, 1st of Denhead, natural son to Donald Campbell, Abbot of Coupar Angus, and had issue.
7. A daughter, *m.* Duncan Tosheoch, 4th of Pittenzie, and had issue.
8. A daughter Drummond, *m.* John Muschet of Annat, third son of George Muschet of Tolgarth, and had issue.

He was also father of a natural son :

9. James Drummond, who resided in Glenlednock and had Letters of Legitimation under the Great Seal on 26 March, 1594. He had a Tack of the lands of Drumscape from his father, and *m.* Janet MacGregor by whom he was father of :

9a) James Drummond, mentioned as deceased in a renunciation by John Drummond of Colquhalzie, in 1634, and that his tack had been taken from him through bastardy.

JOHN DRUMMOND, 6TH OF COLQUHALZIE, styled as heir apparent of his father on 18 April, 1576, when he was granted his deceased brother-in-law, William Reidheugh's,

lands of Wester Aberlednock to be held by himself until the entry of the rightful heir to avoid further dispute with the pretended heirs thereof.¹ He had a grant from William Drummond, vicar of Cargill, of certain lands belonging to the church of Cargill on 3 January, 1581, *m.* in around 1576, Barbara, daughter of Mr. David Campbell, 1st of Denhead, and *d.* in about 1587, being father of :

1. John Drummond, 7th of Colquhalzie, (*see below*).

He was also father of a natural son :

2. Henry Drummond, styled as natural son of the deceased John Drummond of Colquhalzie in a Bond dated 18 April, 1620.

JOHN DRUMMOND, 7TH OF COLQUHALZIE, who was underage at the time of his father's death and was placed in the care of his paternal uncle Thomas Drummond. He succeeded his father and was infeft in the lands of Colquhalzie on 16 November 1598, which had lapsed and been in the King's hands for about twelve years.² He *m.* in around 1600, Jean, daughter of Henry Maule, 1st of Melgund, *d.* by March of 1658 and was father of :

1. John Drummond, 8th of Colquhalzie, (*see below*).

2. James Drummond, served in the Swedish army of Gustavus Adolphus in which he attained the rank of a Second Lieutenant in the Kalmar Regiment. He was later promoted to the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel and was appointed Commandant of the Island of Fehmarn. He *m.* Elizabeth, daughter to Admiral Clerk, *d.* in 1645 and was father of :

2a) John Drummond,

2a) _____ Drummond,

2a) _____ Drummond, all of whom were nobilitated four years after their father's death.

3. David Drummond, educated at the University of St-Andrews and graduated Master of Arts in 1632. He was admitted Minister of Moneydie and is styled as brother to John Drummond of Colquhalzie and Harie Drummond when he appears as witness to the christening of the former's daughter Isobel Drummond at Trinity Gask on 15 May, 1641. He *m.* Catherine, daughter of

Patrick Smythe, 3rd of Braco and sister of Patrick Smythe, 1st Methven, (she was widow of John Cowan of Tailortown), and was father of :

3a) David Drummond, *bap.* at Moneydie on 1 January, 1657, and was admitted a Member of the Faculty of Advocates. He was appointed Treasurer of the Bank of Scotland, was a Jacobite supporter at the revolution in 1689 and met with John Graham of Claverhouse while raising his forces in Lochaber dressed, as was remarked by Dundee himself "in Highland habit." He was responsible for the transferal of large amounts of money from this Bank in order to assist the Jacobite army and was one of those who assisted in the collection of genealogical material concerning the family of Drummond on behalf of William, 1st Viscount Strathallan. He *m.* Jean, daughter and coheirress of Charles Learmonth, *d.* in February of 1741¹ and was father of :

3b) David Drummond, alias Blair of Balthayock, *m.* at Edinburgh on 11 August, 1723, Margaret, daughter and heiress of John Blair of Balthayock, (she was retoured heir to her father on 3 October, 1723) and thereafter assumed the surname and arms of Blair of Balthayock. He *d.* in 1728 and had issue, (*see Blair of Balthayock*).

3b) John Drummond, *m.* at Edinburgh on 2 October, 1726, Catherine, daughter of Sir David Threipland, 2nd of Fingask, (she *m.* secondly on 17 May, 1741, Rev. William Harper and *d.* in April of 1764) and *dsp* "abroad."

3b) Mark Drummond, styled as son of David Drummond, Treasurer of the Bank of Scotland, in information as heir to his maternal grandfather Charles Learmonth on 7 December 1714.²

3a) Robert Drummond, *bap.* at Moneydie on 22 September, 1659.

3a) John Drummond, *bap.* at Moneydie on 22 December, 1663, became a physician in Edinburgh and *dsp* there on 2 January 1741.³

4. Harold Drummond, styled as brother german to John Drummond, fiar of Colquhalzie and David Drummond, Minister, when he was witness to the baptism of his niece Isabel Drummond, at Trinity Gask on 15 May, 1641. He *m.* at Trinity Gask on 5 September, 1641, Margaret Moncrieff, said to have been daughter of Gilbert Moncrieff, 2nd of Myreside and Westwood but this is doubtful, and resided at the Milntown of Machany where he *d.* in 1672.⁴ He was father of:

4a) John Drummond, *bap.* at Trinity Gask on 10 January, 1647, and was educated at the University of St. Andrews where he graduated M.A. on 22 July, 1665. He was deprived

by the Privy Council on 10 October, 1689, for not having read the proclamation of King William and Mary but instead he read that of King James and was ordered to prison.

4a) David Drummond, *bap.* at Trinity Gask on 23 April, 1650, and is mentioned alongside his mother and brother Henry in Discharge dated 16 December, 1675.

4a) Ludovick Drummond of Wester Feddall, *b.* in 1651 and was named in his father's Testament in 1672. He was admitted a Burgess of Dumbarton on 14 October, 1682, in which entry he is styled as brother to Mr. John Drummond, Minister of Foulis, had a charter under the Great Seal for the lands of Wester Feddall on 24 July, 1702, and held the office of Chamberlain to James, Earl of Perth, by 1706. He and his sons were active in the Jacobite army of John Erskine, Earl of Mar, in 1715 and fought at Sheriffmuir in November of that year. In the aftermath he was instrumental in zealously carrying out the "scorched earth" orders of King James by overseeing the burning of the towns of Blackford, Auchterarder, Dunning and Crieff during the latter of which he took advantage of the situation to settle a grievance with a prosperous merchant family of the name of Caw, then resident there, upon which he boasted that "he hoped to get a fitt season for Glencoing the Caws of Crieff." He *m.* Anna Dewar, whom he infert in a liferent of the lands of Wester Feddalls on 11 November, 1701,¹ *d.* in January of 1738 and was father of:

4b) **JAMES DRUMMOND, 2ND OF WESTER FEDDALL**, succeeded to the lands of Colquhalzie, (*see below*).

4b) William Drummond, served in the Jacobite army of 1715, *m.* Grizell McLeish and *dsp* in 1748.²

4b) Ludovick Drummond, became a Doctor of Medicine which he practiced in Edinburgh and *dsp vita patris* in December of 1729.³

4b) Edward Drummond, became a Teacher of French in Edinburgh and *m.* at Edinburgh on 18 January, 1719, Christian, daughter of Edward Hodge, Shipmaster in Grangepans.⁴ He *dsp vita patris* on 25 January, 1725.⁵

4b) Mary Drummond, who, with her husband John Mitchell, had a 19 year tack of the Haugh of Strogeith from George Drummond of Broich on 17 November, 1732 and is then styled as only daughter of Ludovick Drummond, of Feddall. She entered a Petition upon the forfeited estate of Perth for payment of a Bond for 8050 merks in

which she is styled as daughter of the deceased Ludovick Drummond of Wester Feddalls.¹

- 4a) Harold Drummond, *bap.* at Trinity Gask 25 August, 1652, and is mentioned with his brother David in a Discharge dated 16 December, 1675. He resided in Dunbarton, *m.* at Edinburgh on 29 April, 1680, Margaret Haliburton and *d.* by 1706. He had issue :
- 4b) John Drummond, *b.* on 18 and *bap.* at Dunbarton on 20 January, 1681. He was underage at the time of his father's death and was placed under the care of his uncle Ludovick Drummond in 1706.
- 4a) William Drummond, *bap.* at Trinity Gask on 4 April, 1654, all of which sons are mentioned in their father's Litterwill in 1672. He was apprenticed to John Somerville, Skinner in Edinburgh, on 26 July, 1671.²
- 4a) Jean Drummond, *bap.* at Trinity Gask on 7 August, 1642.
- 4a) Helen Drummond, *bap.* at Trinity Gask on 17 September, 1644, and *m.* at Kilspindie on 15 March, 1668, to Mr. John Blair, Minister of Kilspindie, son of John Blair of Pittendreich.³ They had issue.
- 4a) Catherine Drummond, *bap.* at Trinity Gask on 8 November, 1658, and *m.* at Edinburgh on 2 June, 1679, Archibald Cameron, a Kirk and Session Clerk. They had issue.
5. William Drummond, styled as brother of John Drummond of Colquhalzie in a bond dated 2 July, 1661. He *m.* Geilis, daughter of Patrick Murray of Woodend, *d.* by 1709 and was father of,
- 5a) William Drummond, who was nominated as next of kin on the mother's side to Laurence Oliphant, Merchant, who had *dsp* in March of 1709 and is then styled as son of the deceased William Drummond, brother german to the deceased John Drummond of Colquhalzie.⁴
6. Margaret Drummond, *m.* James Drummond, 2nd of Drumduie, and had issue.
7. Catherine Drummond, *m.* at Trinity Gask on 6 July, 1641, Robert Lawrie, Bishop of Brechin,⁵ (he *d.* in March of 1678), and was buried in Greyfriars, Edinburgh, on 9 October, 1667. They had issue.
8. Isobel Drummond, *m.* John Graham of Gartur, (he was widow of Catherine, daughter of Duncan Buchannan of Cashlie whom he had *m.* in 1626 and by whom he had no issue), and had issue.
9. Elspeth Drummond, *m.* in around 1640, James Gray of Easthill, and had issue.

JOHN DRUMMOND, 8TH OF COLQUHALZIE, retoured heir to his grandfather John Drummond of Colquhalzie on 3 March, 1658, and *m.* by 21 November, 1631, Barbara, daughter of William Blair, 1st of Tarsappie, when they were infeft in the lands of Colquhalzie on his father's resignation.¹ He *d.* prior to May of 1658 and was father of :

1. John Dummond, 9th of Colqualzie, (*see below*).
2. David Drummond, *c.* at Trinity Gask on 19 September, 1643.
3. Thomas Drummond, *c.* at Trinity Gask on 29 October, 1646.
4. George Drummond, *c.* at Trinity Gask on 9 May, 1648.
5. Elizabeth Drummond, *m.* firstly in September of 1660, to Mr. George Wemyss, Minister of Scone, (he *d.* in July of 1666). She survived him and *m.* secondly, Major James Stewart of Easter Banchrie, (he was widow of Marjory, daughter of George Graham, 1st of Gorthy, then widow of George Drummond, 4th of Blair, and of George Drummond, 6th of Balloch), and had issue.
6. Isobel Drummond, *bap.* at Trinity Gask on 15 May, 1641, and *m.* John Scott, Merchant in Edinburgh, son of Hugh Scott of Gallowscheils. She was buried at Greyfriars, Edinburgh, on 15 April, 1691,² having had issue.

JOHN DRUMMOND, 9TH OF COLQUHALZIE, succeeded his father and *m.* Anna, daughter of David Graham of Gorthy, (*c/m* 13 May 1658³). He *d.* in February of 1684⁴ and was father of :

1. John Drummond, 10th of Colquhalzie, (*see below*).
2. David Drummond, was included in a Bond of Provision by his father narrated in the latter's Testament in 1684 and had issue :
 - 2a) John Drummond of McCorrastone, qualified as a surgeon and obtained the lands of McCorrastone, in Menteith. He *dsp* prior to 28 January, 1724, when his sisters were retoured his heir. His cousin Mungo Graham, styled as nephew to James Graham of Braco was also retoured his heir on 7 August, 1724.

- 2a) Grissell Drummond, who acted as executor to her sister Mary and is therein styled as spouse to Duncan Stewart, brother german to Alexander Stewart of Glenbuckie.
 - 2a) Janet Drummond, in who's Testament she is styled as "daughter of David Drummond, brother german to Colquhalzie." Her sister Grissell was appointed her executor.
 - 2a) Mary Drummond, all of these sisters were served heir to their brother John Drummond of McCorrastone on 28 January, 1724.
3. James Drummond, mentioned in his father's Testament in 1684 as having been included in a Bond of Provision and is included with his brother Robert in a complaint by Sir Robert Moray of Abercairney in 1690 in which he is styled as nephew to David Graham, Tutor of Gorthy.
4. Robert Drummond, mentioned in his father's Testament as having been included in a Bond of Provision and is styled as nephew to David Graham, Tutor of Gorthy, in a complaint raised against the latter and John Graham, his brother, by Sir Robert Moray of Abercairney for the wrongful possession of lands in 1690. He had an annualrent of £100 to be uplifted from the lands of Grange of Aberbothrie from David Donald, younger of Schanzie, on 11 July, 1698.¹

JOHN DRUMMOND, 10TH OF COLQUHALZIE, was appointed executor to his father in 1684 and to whom he was served heir in the lands of Colquhalzie on 18 April, 1688, following which he was infeft in these lands on 1 July, 1688.² He *m.* on 6 January 1687, Lillias, eldest daughter of James Graham, 4th of Orchill, (she *d.* in August of 1732), whom he infeft in a liferent of his lands on 17 August 1688,³ and *d.* prior to 20 December 1726.⁴ He was father of :

1. **JOHN DRUMMOND, 11TH OF COLQUHALZIE**, *b.* in around 1690 and *m.* on 22 January 1719, Agnes, daughter of James Oliphant, 5th of Gask, (she was *b.* on 22 April, 1696, and *d.* on 6 April, 1740). He sold the lands of Colquhalzie to his cousin James Drummond of Wester Feddalls by 1 December, 1748, when the latter had adopted this designation at the retour to his deceased father Ludovick Drummond of Wester Feddall, and was father of :
- 1a) Oliphant Drummond, *b.* on 16 March 1738.
 - 1a) William Drummond, *b.* on 28 March 1740.

- 1a) Lillias Drummond, *m.* at Edinburgh on 2 December 1759, Andrew Ferrier, Writer, and is then styled as daughter to the deceased John Drummond of Colquhalzie.¹
- 1a) Catherine Drummond, *c.* at Trinity Gask on 12 August 1733.
2. James Drummond, *c.* at Trinity Gask on 25 May 1692.
3. David Drummond, *c.* at Trinity Gask on 20 May 1694.
4. Lillias Drummond, acted as executor to her mother in 1732 and by which date she had *m.* David Gall, Writer in Edinburgh.

He was also father of a natural son :

5. James Drummond, was a son by Ellen Faichney and whom his father acknowledged paternity before the Trinity Gask Parish Session. He was *bap.* at Trinity Gask on 13 May, 1685, and *m.* at Madderty on 4 December, 1709, to Isabel Black.²

JAMES DRUMMOND, 11TH OF COLQUHALZIE AND 2ND OF WESTER FEDDALLS, *b.* in around 1685, obtained the lands of Colquhalzie from his cousin John Drummond and was served heir to his father in the lands of Wester Feddalls on 1 December, 1748. He was active with his father and brother in the Jacobite rising of 1715 and fought at the battle of Sheriffmuir on 13 November of that year. Mounting debts compelled him to sell the lands of Colquhalzie to Robert Bisset and he was also forced to dispoised those of Wester Feddall. He *m.* Elizabeth, daughter of Alexander MacGregor *alias* Drummond, 4th of Balhaldie, *d.* at Stirling in January of 1767³ and was father of :

1. John Drummond, *fiar* of Colquhalzie, served in the Jacobite army during the rising 1745-6 and on 17 October 1755, he was "brought prisoner from Crieff, and committed to the City Gaol, for being concerned in Practices prejudicial to the Government"⁴ but released on 20th following. He *dsp* between then and the time of his father's death in January of 1767.
2. Mary Drummond, *m.* Philip Robertson and is mentioned as one of the creditors in her father's Testament in 1767.
