

GRAHAM

OF INCHBRAIKIE

PATRICK GRAHAM, 1ST OF INCHBRAIKIE, was a younger son of William Graham, 1st Earl of Montrose by his third wife Christian, daughter of Thomas Wavan of Stevenson, and had a grant of the lands of Inchbraikie from his father in early 1513. He *m.* Margaret, daughter of Alexander Stewart, Bishop of Moray, son of Alexander Stewart, Duke of Albany, (she *m.* secondly, Sir Colin Campbell, 6th of Glenorchy), *d.* in 1538 and was father of :

1. George Graham, 2nd of Inchbraikie, (*see below*).
2. Robert Graham, styled as brother of George Graham of Inchbraikie in a charter by Alexander, Lord Home, to John Wemyss of that Ilk on 23 August, 1564, was appointed Archdeacon of Ross and was ancestor of the Grahams of Dyrnie.
3. Janet Graham, *m.* firstly, Dougal Campbell, brother of Sir Colin Campbell of Ardkinglass, and had issue ; and secondly, by 22 June 1557, to Robert Buchannan, 7th of Leny,¹ (he *m.* secondly, Barbara, daughter of George Muschet of Burnbank, who *m.* secondly, Robert Moray, 4th of Buchanty, and had issue), and had issue.

GEORGE GRAHAM, 2ND OF INCHBRAIKIE, witness to a charter by Andrew Murray of Arngask granting the lands of Letterbannochy to William Murray on 14 January, 1553,² and was served heir to his father in the lands of Inchbraikie in 1555. He *m.* Marjory, daughter of Andrew Rollo, 6th of Duncrub, (she *m.* secondly, John Graham, 1st of Balgowan and *d.* on 24 February, 1625), and *d.* in November of 1575.³ He was father of :

1. Patrick Graham, 3rd of Inchbraikie, (*see below*).
2. George Graham, appointed Bishop of Orkney in 1615 and had a Charter of Confirmation for the Barony of Gorthy, the middle-part lands of Dalpatrick, the lands of Myreside with the office of

Sergeant of the Lordship of Methven, and the lands of Pitmurthlie to be held by himself in liferent and David Graham, his eldest son in fee on 23 December, 1631.¹ He *m.* against her father's wishes to Marion, daughter of Sir Robert Crichton of Cluny, King's Advocate, (she *d.* in April of 1633) and *d.* in the closing months on 1643. He had issue, (*see Grahams of Gorthy, Breckness & Graemeshall*).

3. John Graham, said to have been in the Colquhoun force at the battle of Glenfruin against the ClanGregor in 1603 during which he was killed.
4. Nicolas Graham, *m.* firstly, Patrick Murray, 5th of Ochertyre, and had issue ; and secondly, by 7 August 1587, Patrick Maxton, 6th of Cultoquhey, (he was widow of Katherine, daughter of David Murray, 2nd of Dollerie), and had issue.
5. Beatrix Graham, *m.* Harold Drummond, 5th of Balloch, (*c/m* 13 January, 1590), and had issue.
6. Annas Graham, *m.* Edward Tosheoch of Monzievaired, (he was widow of Marjory, daughter of John Campbell, 3rd of Lawers, by whom he had issue).
7. Katherine Graham, *m.* Archibald Campbell, 1st of Monzie, (*c/m* 14 April, 1602. He *m.* secondly, Margaret, daughter of Alexander Robertson of Lude and had issue). She *d.* in 1607 and had issue.
8. Elizabeth Graham, *c.* at Perth in February of 1574.

PATRICK GRAHAM, 3RD OF INCHBRAIKIE, who was underage at the time of his father's death with his ward being granted to John, Earl of Montrose, on 20 October, 1575.² He had Sasine of the lands of Strathboys and Nether Pirny on 21 January 1585,³ was of age by 24 May 1596, when he witnessed a charter by John Stewart, Earl of Atholl, for the lands of Balgowan in favour of his mother Margaret Rollo and her second husband John Graham of Newraw and had a charter for the lands of Drumphingalle from David Murray of Lettirbannochy and Walter Murray of Cassoquhey, with consent of their respective spouses, on 20 December, 1598. He *d.* in 1635, having *m.* firstly, Nicolas, daughter of John Brown of Fordell, by whom he was father of :

1. George Graham, 4th of Inchbraikie, (*see below*).
2. Lillias Graham, *m.* firstly, William Colville of Condie, and secondly, in 1606, Laurence Oliphant, 1st of Gask, and had issue.

3. Marjory Graham, *m.* by 3 December 1605, Sir James Oliphant of Newton, (he *m.* secondly, Giles, daughter of George Moncrieff of Readie, who was then widow of James Bennet, Minister of Auchermuchty, and *d.* in 1648), when they were infeft in the lands of Kildonning by Mr William Oliphant of Newton, his father.¹ They had issue.

He *m.* secondly, Margaret, daughter and coheir of Patrick Scott, 4th of Monzie, (she was widow of Patrick Drummond, 5th of Carnock and 1st of Monzie, whom she had *m.* in around 1576), by whom he was father of :

4. James Graham, 1st of Monzie, (*see Graham of Monzie and Pitcairns*).

5. Beatrix Graham, *m.* firstly, Alexander Robertson of Inchmagranoch and Lude, (*c/m* 20 July, 1615.² He *d.* in 1639), and had issue ; and secondly, Donald Robertson, Tutor of Struaan.

6. A daughter, said to have *m.* Finlay MacNab of Bovaine.

GEORGE GRAHAM, 4TH OF INCHBRAIKIE, infeft by his father in the lands of Inchbraikie and for which the superior John, Earl of Montrose, granted a confirmation on 30 April 1615.³ He was nominated one of the curators of William Brown, eldest son and heir of John Brown of Fordell, in which capacity he is found in a charter in favour of this William, as heir to his father, for the lands and barony of Dewglie on 24 December, 1634. He *m.* Margaret, daughter of Sir Alexander Keith of Ludquhairn, (*c/m* at Braco on 31 March 1608⁴), *d.* in 1654⁵ and was father of :

1. Patrick Graham, 5th of Inchbraikie, (*see below*).

2. John Graham, became a Writer in Edinburgh and one of the Clerks of the Chancery and is styled as brother of Patrick Graham of Inchbraikie when entered a Burgess of Edinburgh on 2 September, 1674. He *m.* Maria Fleming, *d.* in December of 1700 and was father of :

2a) John Graham, 2nd of Glendoick, acted as executor to his father in 1700 and is then styled as his only son. He became a Writer in Edinburgh, obtained the lands of Glendoick and

was, for many years, factor to the children of his sister Margaret Graham by her first husband Henry Cheap following the latter's death in 1705. He had issue :

- 2b) Colin Graham, *c.* at Kinfauns on 25 April, 1707, and *d.* young.
 - 2b) David Graham, *c.* at Glendoick, on 1 January, 1709.
 - 2b) James Graham, *c.* at Glendoick on 6 July, 1710.
 - 2b) Colin Graham, *c.* at Glendoick on 10 December, 1712, and was apprenticed to William Reoch, Wright in Edinburgh, on 5 June, 1728.
 - 2b) Charles Graham, *c.* at Glendoick on 25 March, 1721.
 - 2b) Anne Graham, *c.* at Glendoick on 14 December, 1713.
 - 2b) Lilius Graham, *c.* at Glendoick on 11 July, 1722.
- 2a) Helen Graham, *m.* at Edinburgh on 31 August, 1685, Patrick Murray of Dollerie, (*c/m* 12 October, 1685¹), and had issue.
- 2a) Margaret Graham, *m.* firstly, Henry Cheap, 2nd of Rossie, (*c/m* 4 June, 1691. He was widow of Ann, daughter of Sir William Murray, 8th of Ochertyre, whom he had *m.* in 1676 and by whom he had issue. He *d.* in 1705), and had issue. She *m.* secondly, Charles Adair, Merchant in Perth.
3. Margaret Graham, *m.* firstly, Alexander Robertson of Struan, eldest son and heir of Robert Robertson of Struan, (*c/m* at Dunkeld in July of 1626²), and had issue ; and secondly in 1643, Alexander Balnevis, Minister of Tibbermore, (he *m.* secondly, Katherine, daughter of James Reid, Provost of Dunfermline, relict of William Oliphant of Balgonie and Carpow,) by whom she had issue.

PATRICK GRAHAM, 5TH OF INCHBRAIKIE, succeeded his father and was a constant adherent of his kinsman James Graham, 1st Marquis of Montrose, with whom he served with the rank of Colonel during the Royalist wars. He *m.* Jean, daughter of John Drummond, 2nd Lord Madderty, *d.* in 1687 and was father of :

1. George Graham, 6th of Inchbraikie, (*see below*).
2. Patrick Graham, appointed Captain of the town guard of Edinburgh and Colonel of Dragoons to King James VII. He was admitted a Burgess of Edinburgh on 23 August, 1682, 'for good service rendered as officer of the new company raised for guarding this city,' *m.* Agnes, daughter of Patrick Smythe, 5th of Methven, and *d.* in August of 1720. He was father of :

- 2a) Patrick Graham, became a Monk of the Mendicant Order of the Capuchins in France and *d.* in France in 1721.
- 2a) James Graham,
- 2a) Robert Graham,
- 2a) William Graham, *c.* at Edinburgh on 6 October, 1682, and acted as executor to his father in 1720 and in which he is described as then residing in Perth.
3. John Graham, appointed Postmaster General of Scotland in 1681 and commander of the King's Horse sent west to apprehend Campbell of Argyll in 1685. He *m.* firstly to his cousin Margaret, eldest daughter of David Drummond, 3rd Lord Madderty, and secondly at Edinburgh on 30 March, 1680, Alison, daughter of Sir John Fletcher of Newcranston.¹ He had issue by his first wife,
- 3a) David Graham, served as a Captain in the Marquis of Tullibardine's regiment who *d.* in around 1710.
- 3a) Amilia Graham, *m.* Sir Neil Campbell of Island Greig, (*c/m* 5 December, 1689), and had issue.
4. David Graham, followed a military life and *d.* while in Dutch service.
5. James Graham, obtained the lands of Newton from Sir George Oliphant in 1691 and was appointed Solicitor General for Scotland during the reign King James VII. He *m.* in 1669, Ann Drummond, *d.* on 26 March, 1740, and had issue,
- 5a) John Graham, was served heir to his father and his sister Margaret on 11 June 1748.
- 5a) Patrick Graham, was apprenticed to Alexander Allander, Merchant in Edinburgh, on 11 March, 1713.
- 5a) David Graham of Newton, *bap.* at Forgandenny on 31 May, 1707, and was an Advocate. He *m.* Elizabeth, daughter of William Moray, 12th of Abercairney, (she *d.* on 10 January, 1771), *d.* at Edinburgh on 26 March, 1785,² and was father of :
- 5b) James Graham, *b.* in 1737 and *d.* young.
- 5b) Christian Graham, *bap.* at Edinburgh on 22 July, 1739, *m.* on 13 August, 1768, Henry Smith of Smithfield,³ (he was widow of Emelia, daughter of Sir William Nairne of Dunsinane, whom he had *m.* on 8 November, 1761, and by whom he had no issue), and had issue.
- 5b) Ann Graham, *bap.* at Edinburgh on 24 November, 1740.
- 5b) Mary Graham, *bap.* at Edinburgh on 26 December, 1741.

5b) James Graham, *b.* in 1744.

5b) Charlotte Graham, *bap.* at Edinburgh on 26 November, 1746.

5b) John Graham, *bap.* at Edinburgh on 3 October, 1747, and after serving for a time in the 54th Regiment he and Alexander Wright set up a wine business in Edinburgh, in 1785.¹

5b) Elizabeth Graham,

5b) Grizel Graham, *bap.* at Forgandenny on Saturday 10 October, 1743, and acted as executor to her father in 1785.

5a) Elizabeth Graham, *bap.* at Forgandenny on 20 August, 1704.

5a) Margaret Graham, *dsp* prior to June of 1748.

6. Anne Graham, *m.* firstly, Patrick Smith of Rapness, and secondly, Sir Robert Moray, 11th of Abercairney, (he *d.* in 1704) and *d.* in 1699 having left issue by both husbands.

7. Margaret Graham, *m.* Sir Robert Nairne, 1st Lord Nairne, and *d.* in January of 1704,² having had issue.

8. Jane Graham, *bap.* at Perth on 25 October, 1649.

He was also father of two natural sons :

9. David Graham, *bap.* at Scone on 14 March, 1629. The entry reads; "David Grahame, sone natural to Patrik Grahame, eldest lawful sonne and apparend air of Mr George Grahame, apparend of Inchbraikie was baptised."

10. John Graham, was a son by Margaret Haldane. He was *b.* and *bap.* at Auchterarder on 11 August, 1672.

GEORGE GRAHAM, 6TH OF INCHBRAIKIE, succeeded his father and *m.* at Edinburgh on 16 March, 1665, Margaret, daughter and heiress of Patrick Nicol, Lord Royston. Although in Government service during the revolution of 1688-89, he was imprisoned in the Bass Rock for having toasted the health of the exiled King James VII. at an Inn in Dunning and with certain accomplices including George Graham of Pitcairns and David Oliphant of Culteuchar, threatened several local gentlemen, amongst whom was Andrew, 3rd Lord Rollo. He *d.* in July of 1706³ and was father of :

1. Patrick Graham, 7th of Inchbraikie, (*see below*).
2. George Graham, served as a Coronet of Horse and *dsp* in around 1717. His brother Patrick Graham of Inchbraikie was served his heir on 13 December 1717.
3. Thomas Graham, *bap.* at Auchterarder on 1 July, 1676.
4. Amilie Graham, *bap.* at Auchterarder on 14 October, 1678.
5. Isobel Graham, *m.* William Bryce, Clerk of Strathearn, and had issue.
6. Margaret Graham, *m.* on 4 June, 1693, her cousin George Graham, 2nd of Pitcairns, and had issue.

PATRICK GRAHAM, 7TH OF INCHBRAIKIE, succeeded his father and was compelled to flee the country for some of years for having murdered John, Master of Rollo, on the roadway between Innermay and Dunning on 20 May, 1695. He was active in the Jacobite army in 1715 and fought at the battle of Sheriffmuir in November of the same year after which, as a reprisal by the Government troops under John Campbell, Earl of Argyll, the old house of Inchbraikie was burned. He *m.* on 13 November, 1691, Janet, daughter of James Pearson, 2nd of Kippenross, (she was *bap.* at Dunblane on 11 April, 1665), *d.* in 1740 and had issue :

1. George Graham, *fiar* of Inchbraikie, (*see below*).
2. Patrick Graham, *c.* at Auchterarder on 11 August, 1694, and acted as factor of the Inchbraikie estate during the time his young nephew was in military service in Holland. He *m.* Helen, daughter of John Pearson, 3rd of Kippenross, *d.* on 5 August 1753, and was father of :
 - 2a) Helen Graham, *m.* Alexander Robertson of Faskally.
3. John Graham, served as an officer in the 42nd Regiment and was killed at Edge Hill, America, in 1763.

GEORGE GRAHAM, FIAR OF INCHBRAIKIE, *bap.* at Auchterarder on 17 April, 1693, and *m.* Catherine, daughter of William Lindsay of Cavill. He *d. vita patris* in 1737 and was father of :

1. Patrick Graham, 8th of Inchbraikie, (*see below*).
2. George Graham, *b.* at Aberuthven on Thursday 13 January 1720.
3. John Graham, *b.* at Ryecroft on 5 June 1723.
4. Helen Graham, *d.* in infancy.

5. Ann Graham, *b.* at Ryecroft on Monday 16 February 1719, and *d.* unmarried at Orchill in April 1801.¹
6. Katherine Graham, was a twin with her sister Ann and was *b.* at Ryecroft on Monday 16 February, 1719.
7. Jean Graham, *b.* at Ryecroft on Monday 7 June, 1725, and *d.* on 3 August 1800.²

PATRICK GRAHAM, 8TH OF INCHBRAIKIE, *b.* at Gorthy “at about two o’clock in the morning, Saturday, 25th January, 1717” and was served heir to his grandfather in the lands of Inchbraikie and heir to Patrick, 1st of Inchbraikie, in 1770. He attained the rank of Captain in the Dutch army and *m.* on 5 June, 1758, Margaret, eldest daughter of Laurence Oliphant, 6th of Gask,³ (she *d.* at Inchbraikie on 6 July 1785⁴). He *d.* on 7 February 1796,⁵ and was father of :

1. George Graham, 9th of Inchbraikie, (*see below*).
2. Patrick Graham, *bap.* at Crieff on 17 February, 1755, served as Lieutenant-Colonel in the 42nd Highlanders and *dsp* in India.
3. Laurence Graham, *bap.* at Crieff on 4 June, 1758, and attained the rank of Captain in the Royal Navy. He later drowned on return from the West Indies while in command of the prize ship *Ville de Paris* in 1782.
4. Æmelia Graham, *bap.* at Crieff on 13 July 1750, and *m.* firstly at Inchbraikie House on 19 January 1777, to James Campbell, 10th of Monzie,⁶ (he *dsp* in August of 1777). She *m.* secondly at Crieff on 24 September 1778, William Graham, 6th of Orchill,⁷ (he *d.* on 14 July 1825), and had issue.
5. Margaret Graham, *bap.* at Crieff on 22 July 1756, and *d.* at Edinburgh on 12 November 1819.⁸
6. Louisa Graham, *bap.* at Crieff on 30 November 1760, and *m.* at Crieff on 18 November 1792, to Robert Stewart, 12th of Fincastle.⁹ They had issue.

GEORGE GRAHAM, 9TH OF INCHBRAIKIE, *bap.* at Crieff on 23 May, 1753, and succeeded his father. He attained the rank of Captain in the 72nd Highlanders, was appointed Colonel of the Perthshire Cavalry and was present at the siege of Gibraltar where he was wounded. He *m.* at Crieff on 23 April, 1786, Margaret, daughter of Laurence Oliphant, 6th of Condie,¹ (she *d.* at Inchbraikie on 10 January 1840²), *d.* at Inchbraikie on 7 September 1840,³ and was father of :

1. Patrick Graham, *b.* at Perth on 9th and *bap.* at Crieff on 16 June, 1789, and was *ksp* in action near Delaware, America, on 4 March 1814.⁴

2. George Drummond Graham, 10th of Inchbraikie, (*see below*).

3. Laurence Graham, *b.* at Bishop's Auckland, Durham, and was *bap.* at Crieff on 5 May 1797. He was appointed Governor of Tobago, *m.* at Longford on 9 July 1827, to Frances Sarah, daughter of Joseph Ridgeway of Ballindery, Count Meath,⁵ (she *d.* at Bath on 29 November 1893), and *d.* at Tobago in December of 1850. He was father of :

3a) George Graham, *bap.* at Crieff on 17 September, 1829, and *d.* the same year.

3a) Patrick St. George Graham, *c.* at Crieff in January of 1831, and served in the Royal Horse Artillery, in India. He *d.* at Cawnpore on 20 March 1866, from injuries sustained in a driving accident.⁶

3a) Laurence Anthony Murray Graham of Fonthill, *b.* in November of 1834, and served in the Madras Fusiliers, in India. He *m.* on 19 December, 1871, Catherine, daughter of David Glas Sandeman of Springfield, (she *d.* on 12 March 1931), *d.* on 13 September 1918,⁷ and was father of :

3b) Lawrence Oliphant Graham, *b.* on 29 October, 1872, served as Lieutenant-Colonel in the Cameron Highlanders and *m.* in August of 1906, Penelope, younger daughter of Rev. W. Hopkins of Sutton Grange. He was given command of the 1st Battalion of the Cameron's in May of 1915, and was *k.* in action in March of 1916.

- 3b) David Henry Graham, of Fluder House, *b.* on 3 April 1874, and *m.* Agnes Mary, daughter of Rev. R. D. Cooke, Vicar of Ipplepen. He had issue.
- 3b) Mary Violet Graham,
- 3a) James Drummond Graham, *c.* at Crieff in June of 1838 and entered the 37th Hampshire Regiment. He contracted an illness during a march through the Terai, in India, from which he never recovered and came home to Inchbraikie where he *dsp* in 1862.
- 3a) Alexander Graham, *bap.* at Crieff on 6 October, 1843, and *d.* young.
- 3a) Henry James Blair Oliphant Graham, *b.* in London and *bap.* at Crieff on 28 July, 1845, and *d.* in the summer of 1846 aged 10 months.
- 3a) Margaret Oliphant Graham, *c.* at Crieff in March of 1833, and *d.* unmarried at Perth, on 2 April 1924.¹
- 3a) Louisa Grace Graham, *b.* in Tobago in 1848 and *d.* unmarried at Fonthill, Shaldon, in January of 1921.
- 3a) Frances Sarah Graham, *c.* at Crieff in September of 1829 and *m.* firstly at Crieff on 25 May 1846, to John Thornton, Colonial Secretary for Tobago, and son of Thomas Thornton, Consul General of Constantinople. She *m.* secondly, William Kelso Martin, Antigua, *d.* in 1894 and had issue.
- 3a) Georgina Furlonge Graham, *bap.* at Crieff in September of 1836, and *d.* aged 11 months.
- 3a) Helen Graham, *bap.* at Crieff on 29 February 1840, and *d.* that same year.
- 3a) Mary Anne Graham, *bap.* at Crieff on 19 June 1842, and *d.* young.
- 3a) Emily Susan Graham, *b.* at Tobago in 1850 and *d.* unmarried at Aberuthven Lodge, Auchterarder, on 15 January 1926.²
4. Alexander John Graham, *bap.* at Crieff on 20 February 1799, and attained the rank of Commander in the Royal Navy. He *m.* at St. Nicholas's Church, Liverpool, on 28 October 1827, to Ellenora, daughter of John Johnson, Liverpool,³ and *d.* at Fonthill, Devon, on 14 November 1884.⁴
5. Anthony James Graham, *bap.* at Crieff on 18 November, 1801, and *dsp* at Prince of Wales' Island in November of 1824.⁵
6. Grace Anne Sophia Graham, *b.* at Orchill on 5 May 1794, and *d.* unmarried in 1854.
7. Margaret Graham, *bap.* at Crieff on 6 June 1803.

GEORGE DRUMMOND GRAHAM, 10TH OF INCHBRAIKIE, *b.* at Stirling, *hap.* at Crieff on 17 April 1796, and succeeded his father on his death in 1840. He entered the army at a young age, being commissioned Ensign in 1812, and joined the German Legion in the Peninsula. He was present at the battle of Waterloo in 1815 during which he was badly wounded when defending the position at La Haye Sainte, and afterwards entered the Hanovarian Guards, being promoted to Major then retiring in 1841. He *m.* at Strathallan Castle on 18 January 1842, Marianne, eldest daughter of James Drummond, 6th Viscount Strathallan,¹ (she *d.* at Aberuthven on 19 May 1876²), *d.* at Tours, in France, on 20 December 1854, where he had gone in August for the benefit of his health,³ and was father of :

1. Patrick James Frederick Graham, 11th of Inchbraikie, (*see below*).

3. Beatrice Marianne Jane Graham, *c.* at Crieff on 12 February 1852, and *d.* unmarried at Perth on 9 October 1905.⁵

PATRICK JAMES FREDERICK GRAHAM, 11TH OF INCHBRAIKIE, *b.* at Inchbraikie on 16 March 1849, and served as an officer in the 79th Fraser Highlanders with whom he fought with distinction. He was compelled through mounting debts, to sell the lands of Inchbraikie to Charles Home-Drummond-Moray of Abercairney, in 1882, and had settled at Carradale, in Manitoba, by April 1887. He *dsp* in 1926.
