

# PHILP OF GREENLAW

**JOHN PHILP OF GREENLAW**, was appointed Auditor of the Exchequer and acquired the lands of Greenlaw for which he had a charter under the Great Seal dated 13 February 1721. He *m.* at Edinburgh on 16 October 1705, to Sophia, daughter of Daniel Robertson, Merchant and Burgess of Edinburgh, *d.* on 29 December 1760, and was father of :

1. **JAMES PHILP OF GREENLAW**, *b.* on 9 February 1716, was appointed judge-admiral of Scotland and was served heir to his father in the lands of Greenlaw and others, on 11 May 1761. He *m.* on 20 November 1757, to Margaret, daughter of Alexander Monro, 4<sup>th</sup> of Auchenbowie,<sup>1</sup> and *dsp* at Edinburgh on 1 May 1782.<sup>2</sup>
2. Daniel Philp, *b.* at Edinburgh on 23 October 1721, and *dsp* prior to 1782.
3. William Philip, *bap.* at Glencorse on 25 February 1723, and *dsp* prior to 1782.
4. Elizabeth Philp, *b.* at Edinburgh on 20 March 1714, *m.* at Edinburgh on 29 April 1733, to John Sivewright of Southouse,<sup>3</sup> and had issue.
5. Jean Philip, *b.* at Edinburgh on 14 December 1717, *m.* in July of 1740, to Archibald Inglis of Auchendinny,<sup>4</sup> and had issue, two daughters who were also served co-heirs to their uncle James Philip in the lands of Greenlaw, on 12 February 1783, (*see Monro of Auchenbowie*).
6. Barbara Philip, *b.* at Edinburgh on 13 February 1720. She and her sisters Elizabeth and Isobel, were served heirs portioners to their brother James, in the lands of Greenlaw on 12 February 1783.
7. Isobel Philip, *b.* at Edinburgh on 1 July 1726, *m.* at Edinburgh on 21 June 1761, to Captain John Wood, fifth son of Jasper Wood of Warriston,<sup>5</sup> (*he d.* at Edinburgh on 2 March 1792<sup>6</sup>), and had issue.
8. Margaret Philp, *b.* at Edinburgh on 7 May 1729, and *dsp* prior to 1782.
