

REDDIE OF REDHOUSE

DAVID REDDIE OF REDHOUSE, was a Shipmaster, Merchant and Bailie in Dysart. He acquired the lands of Muirton alias Redhouse in which he was infeft on 12 February 1729, followed by those of Over Pratis in which he was infeft on 23 February 1756, and *d.* in November of 1767. He was father of :

1. David Reddie, to whom his brother Andrew was served heir in the lands of Muirtown, in the parish of Auchterderran, on 17 April 1795.
2. Andrew Reddie of Redhouse, (*see below*).
3. James Reddie, was a merchant at Dysart and to whom his nephew, John Reddie of Redhouse, was served heir on 27 April 1811.

ANDREW REDDIE OF REDHOUSE, was served heir general to his father on 2 November 1780, and then in the lands of Over Pratis and Kearn, in the parish of Largo, on 28 April 1789. He *m.* at London on 3 March 1765, to Mary Share, (she *d.* at Topcliffe Vicarage on in September of 1825, in her 81st year), *d.* in January of 1797 and was father of :

1. David Reddie, *b.* on 6 August 1767, and *d.* young.
2. John Reddie of Redhouse, (*see below*).
3. James Reddie, *b.* on 20 May 1781.
4. Andrew Reddie, *b.* on 2 June 1783.
5. Peter Reddie, *b.* on 18 July 1785.
6. Catherine Reddie, *b.* on 5 August 1773.
7. Margaret Reddie, *b.* on 6 December 1777, and *m.* in 1810, to Rev. Thomas Allanson, of Market-Weighton.
8. Sarah Reddie, *b.* on 6 December 1779, and *m.* Walter Campbell of Carradale.

JOHN REDDIE OF REDHOUSE, *b.* on 4 September 1768, succeeded his father on his death and was served his heir in the lands of Muirtown or Redhouse, in the parish of

Auchterderran, on 18 May 1797. He *m.* at Bencoulan, Sumatra, in 1806, to Lavinia Salmond, *d.* at Dysart on 31 October 1826,¹ and was father of :

1. John Griffiths Reddie of Redhouse, (*see below*).
2. Andrew James Reddie, *b.* on 7 April 1809.
3. Elizabeth Reddie, *b.* on 20 February 1808, and *m.* on 1 November 1837, to William Millie, Pathhead, Kirkcaldy.² They had issue.
4. Mary Reddie, *b.* on 4 July 1812.
5. Lavinia Reddie, *b.* on 20 January 1814, and *m.* at Dysart on 11 September 1832, to Major Montague Perreau, Madras Army.³ They had issue.
6. Christian Hunt Reddie, *b.* on 16 June 1821, and *m.* at Calcutta on 6 January 1846, to James Dalrymple.⁴

JOHN GRIFFITHS REDDIE OF REDHOUSE, *b.* on 21 March 1811, entered the Royal Navy at the age of fourteen and spent some years in India where he was master of the H.E.I.C.S. ship Calcutta, before being appointed Master Attendant to the H.E.I.C.S. at Madras in June of 1814. He succeeded his father and was served his heir in the lands of Redhouse on 4 January 1834, but returning to Scotland in 1865, he resided mostly in Aberdeenshire, firstly at Woodend Cottage, Banchory, and then at the mansion house of Rikkarton, near Stonehaven, where he *d.* on Monday 28 November 1892 in his 82nd year.⁵ He *m.* firstly, to Johanna, daughter of David Bryce, Calcutta, (she *d.* at Colombo on 4 November 1847⁶), by whom he had no apparent issue ; and secondly, on 9 February 1871, to Isabella Louisa, daughter of Anthony Murray, 10th of Dollerie,⁷ (she survived him and *d.* on 29 October 1925), by whom he was father of :

1. Sir John Murray Reddie, *b.* on 27 June 1872, and *m.* at Holy Trinity Church, Ardington, on 7 January 1897, to Constance Katherine Mary, only daughter of Colonel Colebrooke Carter, Ardington, Berkshire,¹ (she *d.* on 8 March 1954). He *d.* on 7 September 1954.
2. Anthony Julian Reddie, *b.* on 27 August 1873, and led a military life, being raised to Brigadier-General. He *m.* Rose, daughter of Colonel Robert L. Murray, and *d.* in 1960.
3. Georgina Frances Reddie, *d.* at Torquay on 2 February 1884, aged four-and-a-half years.²
