

STROGEITH

OF THAT ILK

SIR FINLEY DE STROGEITH, was witness to a donation to the monks of Paisley Abbey by Walter Stewart, Earl of Menteith, who for the weal of the souls of those of his ancestors buried at the monastery of Paisley, he confirms to them the church of Saint Columba with the chapel annexed to the castle at Skipnish, dated 1262.¹ He was succeeded by :

WILLIAM DE STROGEITH, was no doubt the son and heir of the former. He was a person of some note and was witness to a donation by Angus, son of Donald [Lord of the Isles], to the monks of Paisley of annual payments from his lands in pure alms, dated circa 1292.² From him descended :

FINLAY DE STROGEITH, of whom little is known other than his being named in his son John's patronymics :

JOHN DE STROGEITH, OF THAT ILK, who was nominated one of the Arbiters in an Indenture of Friendship between David de Moray of Tulliebardine and Malcolm de Drummond of Concraig on 4 July, 1441, to resolve all differences between them and is then styled as "*John Gilfulanson*" or "*John, son of Fillan the servant*."³ He was father of,

1. Finlay de Storgeith, of that Ilk, (*see below*)

2. Lawrence de Storgeith, entered into a contract of Wadset with Thomas Rogerson of Drumdewan for the lands of Ardquholane, in Balquhidder, on 29 November, 1464, in which he is styled as "Lawrence Johnson"⁴ and was appointed one of the shield-bearers to King James III.⁵

FINLAY DE STROGEITH, OF THAT ILK, witness to a charter by Humphrey Moray of Abercairney in 1465 and is styled as "*Felanus Johnson*" in a charter by himself for the lands of Aulichmor in favour of his son and heir "John Fulanson" on 28 July, 1468.¹ He was witness to a Notarial Instrument certifying that John de Comrie of that Ilk had given heritable Sasine of the lands of Auchinshelloch to John Adamson on 26 July, 1477, and appears as a witness to a Notarial Instrument by Humphrey de Moray of Abercairney narrating that at the Steward Court of Crieff he had produced a Charter, on parchment, giving him the right to the lands of Abercairney which had been erected into a Barony by the King in 1483. He *d.* by 7 July, 1490, and had issue,

1. John Strogeith, of that Ilk, (*see below*).
2. Robert Strogeith, appointed parish clerk of Strogeith and *d.* by 1 June, 1500, when William Drummond submitted a request to be appointed to this office.
3. Janet Strogeith, *m.* Maurice Drummond, 3rd of Pitkellony, and had issue.

JOHN STROGEITH, OF THAT ILK, had a charter from his father for the lands of Aulichmore which was confirmed under the Great Seal on 28 July, 1468,² and was witness to the above narrated Notarial Instrument by Humphrey Moray of Ogilvy in 1483 in which he is styled "*John de Strogeith, son and apparent heir of Felanus de Strogeith of that Ilk.*" He had a Charter of Confirmation under the Great Seal for his lands of Bordland of Strogeith, to be held by himself and Margaret Stewart, his spouse, on 16 August, 1495,³ became a personal servant of King James IV. and by way of a pension to him he was granted the lands of Gallowbeg. He exchanged the lands of Bordland-Strogeith, Auchinglen, Cuilt Nether and Over, Thomequhare, Kirkton-Strogeith with the Mill thereof, Aulichcroy, Aulichgrew and Aulichmore with John, 1st Lord Drummond, for the latter's lands of Calliechat and Annat, in Menteith, and Fornocht, in Strathearn, which was confirmed by King James IV. on 26 August, 1510,⁴ and *m.* by July of 1468, to Margaret Stewart. He was father of,

1. Finlay Strogeith, *m.* Elizabeth, daughter of Tristram Gorthy, 5th of that Ilk, which is alluded to a charter by Humphrey Moray of Ogilvy, in favour of Tristram de Gorthy, of Gorthy, of the 4 merk and 40 shilling lands called Bordland of Ogilvy “*for the relief of the said Tristram from 110 merks Scots on account of marriage of Felanus de Strogeith, son of John de Strogeith of that Ilk, and Elizabeth de Gorthy, sister of the said Tristram*” in 1491. He *d.* by 29 May, 1500, when a Gift of his ward and that of his brother Henry, was granted under the Privy Seal of King James IV. to John, 1st Lord Drummond, in which entry he is described as son and apparent heir to his father.¹ He *dsp* soon after with his brother Henry succeeding their father in the lands of Strogeith.
2. **HENRY STROGEITH OF THAT ILK**, styled as brother and heir to Felanus Strogeith when a gift of the ward of Felanus and Henry was granted to John, 1st Lord Drummond, by King James IV. on 29 May, 1500, and had a resignation from his father for the lands of Strogeith and Creagan for which he had a Charter under the Great Seal on 12 May, 1500, in which he is styled as son and heir.² He *d.* by 13 February, 1506, when a gift of the mailes, fermes and profits of the lands of Strogeith and Aulich was granted to James Reidheugh, Comptroller, by King James IV.³
3. Patrick Strogeith of Fornocht, succeeded his brother in the lands of Fornocht which were subsequently forfeited and gifted to Sir John Drummond of Innerpeffray for his having remained from an assembly of the Queen’s army in 1545. He afterwards resided in Scone and was father of :
 - 3a) Margaret Strogeith, *m.* by 20 March, 1549, George Drummond of Hollhill,⁴ and had issue.
4. William Strogeith, had a charter for the lands of Auchinglen, Cult Auchilroy and half the lands of Thomallair from his father which was confirmed by King James IV. on 28 October, 1497, and became a Chaplain.
5. Jean Strogeith, *m.* Gavin Drummond, younger son of Malcolm Drummond of Meggar, and had issue.
