

TYRIE

OF DRUMKILBO

1. James Tyrie of Drumkilbo, (*see below*).
2. Gilbert Tyrie, appointed Vicar of Cargill and *dsp* prior to 22 June, 1504, when his nephew Walter Tyrie of Lunan, acted as his executor.¹

JAMES DE TYRIE OF DRUMKILBO, *m.* Egedia, daughter and co-heiress of Sir Walter Stewart of Burleigh, with whom the family acquired the ½ of the lands of Lunan, in the Sheriffdom of Forfar, Pitfour, in the Sheriffdom of Aberdeen, and Forteviot, in the Sheriffdom of Perth. He *d.* in 1475/6 and was father of,

1. Walter Tyrie of Lunan and Drumkilbo, (*see below*).
2. William Tyrie,
3. David Tyrie, who with his brothers Walter and William Tyrie were served heir provisional to their kinsman John Tyrie, younger, in a tenement in Perth on 10 June, 1479.²

WALTER TYRIE OF LUNAN AND OF DRUMKILBO, had a charter from his mother for the lands and Barony of Lunan, in the Sheriffdom of Forfar, those of Forteviot, in the Sheriffdom of Perth, and Petfour, in the Sheriffdom of Aberdeen, on 20 April, 1476. He *d.* about December of 1531, being described in the retour of his grandson William Tyrie as his heir on 13 April 1532, as having been dead for about four months, and was father of,

1. Andrew Tyrie of Drumkilbo, (*see below*).
2. Egedia Tyrie, *m.* Tristram Gorthy, 6th of that Ilk, (he was widow of Marjory, daughter of Sir Robert Douglas of Lochleven, and was *k.* at the battle of Flodden in September of 1513), and by

whom she was infeft in a liferent of the lands of Upper Gorthy in implementation of their contract of marriage on 5 December, 1511.¹

ANDREW TYRIE OF DRUMKILBO, styled as eldest son and heir to Walter Tyrie of Drumkilbo when witness to a Charter by Sir William, Lord Ruthven, of an annualrent for his lands of Ballinbreich in favour of the Chapel of St. Peter at the Manor of Ruthven on 14 June, 1509,² and *d.* by 13 April 1532. He was father of,

WILLIAM TYRIE OF DRUMKILBO, retoured heir to his grandfather Walter Tyrie in the half-lands of Lunan on 13 April 1532,³ and *m.* Elizabeth Abercromby, (she *m.* secondly, to James Fenton of Ogil, who *d.* in November of 1563). He was *k.* at the battle of Pinkie in September of 1547⁴ and was father of,

1. David Tyrie of Drumkilbo, (*see below*).
2. James Tyrie, said to be a son of William Tyrie of Drumkilbo, who was a Jesuit Priest and was an envoy during various negotiations with Queen Mary. He was appointed Professor of Philosophy at the Jesuit College of Clermont, Paris, and in 1590 he became Provincial of the Jesuit Order in France. After many exploits in the cause of his religion, he *d.* at Rome in 1597.
3. Margaret Tyrie, *m.* James Moncrieff, 4th of Easter Rhynd, and had issue.
4. Helen Tyrie, to whom her mother Elizabeth Abercromby, relict of James Fenton of Ogil, granted £30 for her support until “God willing” she is married, on 20 June 1564.⁵

DAVID TYRIE OF DRUMKILBO, succeeded his father and as heir of whom he had Sasine of the half lands of Lunan on 26 October 1548,⁶ and was infeft in the lands of Pitenweem on 29 October following.⁷ He *m.* Margaret, daughter of Thomas Fotheringham, 7th of Powrie, with whom he had an annualrent from the lands of Ruthven from John Crichton,

of Ruthven, on 28 June, 1571, and *d.* between this date and prior to May of 1572. He was father of,

DAVID TYRIE OF DRUMKILBO, succeeded his father and was retoured his heir in the middle lands of Forteviot on 20 May, 1572. He was infeft in the middle-part of the barony of Lounan and the middle-part of the lands of Forteviot on 7 October 1572, which had been in the King's hands since the previous Pentecost,¹ and was killed by Adam Crichton, of Ruthven in 1581. He *m.* a daughter of William Graham of Fintry, and was father of,

1. David Tyrie of Drumkilbo, (*see below*).
2. Thomas Tyrie, who acted as Tutor to his nephew William Tyrie of Drumkilbo following the death of his elder brother David Tyrie of Drumkilbo.
3. Margaret Tyrie, *m.* David Lindsay, 2nd of Balgavies, and had issue.

DAVID TYRIE OF DRUMKILBO, succeeded his father and took revenge for his murder by killing Adam Crichton of Ruthven in around 1590. He *m.* Lillas, daughter of Patrick, Lord Gray, (*c/m* 23 August, 1582. She *m.* secondly by *c/m* 20 October, 1592, John, Master of Oliphant, and had issue), *d.* prior to May of 1591 and was father of :

SIR WILLIAM TYRIE OF DRUMKILBO, was under age at his father's death and had his uncle Thomas Tyrie appointed his Tutor. He was infeft in the lands of Forteviot on 9 May 1591, and in which he retoured heir to his father on 19 May, 1608.² He sold his lands of Drumkilbo to Patrick, Master of Oliphant, on 27 July, 1624, *m.* Elizabeth, daughter of Andrew Herring of Little Blair, and *d.* on 18 September, 1633. He was father of,

1. Sir Thomas Tyrie of Drumkilbo, (*see below*).
2. David Tyrie, to whom his brother Sir Thomas Tyrie of Drumkilbo disponed the lands of Blacklock on 6 March, 1640.³

3. Andrew Tyrie, a cautioner and consenter to his brother Sir Thomas Tyrie's disposition for the lands of Glasclune and Lethendie to John Blair of Pittendreich, on 22 May 1638.¹
4. Helen Tyrie, *m.* Sir Adam Gordon of Park, (he was widow of Christian Gordon and *d.* in September of 1629).

SIR THOMAS TYRIE OF DRUMKILBO, retoured heir to his father in the lands of Glasclune on 19 November, 1635, and was a Royalist supporter during the Civil war. He was compelled to part with the majority of his estate and sold the lands of Drumkilbo. He *m.* by 6 May, 1634, Margaret, daughter of Francis Ogilvy of Newgrange,² *d.* by 1657³ and was father of,

ISABEL TYRIE OF GLASCLUNE, succeeded her father in his lands of Glasclune and *m.* James Blair of Lethendie, (*c/m* 8 December, 1654⁴). They had issue.
