

# THREIPLAND

## OF FINGASK

**ANDREW THREIPLAND**, was a Merchant and Burgess in Perth and to whom an annualrent to be uplifted from the lands of Fingask was granted by Janet Gibson, wife of William Bruce of Fingask, on 4 June 1636.<sup>1</sup> He was father of,

1. Sir Patrick Threipland, 1<sup>st</sup> Baronet of Fingask, (*see below*).
2. John Threipland, became a Merchant and Burgess in Perth and *d.* before 4 October 1706.
3. Agnes Threipland, *m.* Andrew Jackson, eldest son of Henry Jackson, Glover Burgess of Perth, (*c/m* 29 August 1657<sup>2</sup>).
4. Margaret Threipland, is styled sister to the deceased John Threipland, Merchant in Perth, uncle to Sir David Threipland of Fingask, in a discharge by Sir David Threipland to Robert Anderson, Glover Burgess of Perth, dated 4 October 1706.<sup>3</sup>

**SIR PATRICK THREIPLAND, 1<sup>ST</sup> BARONET OF FINGASK**, was a successful Merchant and Provost in Perth and is styled brother to Agnes Threipland, daughter of Andrew Threipland, Merchant and Burgess of Perth, in her contract of marriage with Andrew Jackson in August of 1657. He purchased the lands of Fingask from Lawrence Bruce of Fingask in 1672 and was created a Baronet on 10 November 1687 with remainder to the heirs-male of his body. He *m.* Euphemia, sister of George Conqueror of Friarton, *d.* in 1689 and was father of,

1. Patrick Threipland, *b.* on 1 December 1667 and *dsp vita patris*.
2. David Threipland, 2<sup>nd</sup> of Fingask, (*see below*).
3. Mungo Threipland, *b.* on 4 February 1671 and *d.* young.
4. Margaret Threipland, *b.* on 29 May 1655, *m.* on 19 November 1676, to Alexander Pitcairn of that Ilk,<sup>1</sup> and had issue.
5. Marjory Threipland, *b.* on 16 January 1662 and *m.* on 1 November 1682, to Patrick Carnegie, 1<sup>st</sup> of Lour,<sup>2</sup> (he *d.* on 7 December 1723). They had issue.
6. Euphame Threipland, *b.* on 28 November 1657 and *m.* Dr. Alexander Rose, Bishop of Edinburgh.
7. Agnes Threipland, *b.* on 3 March 1660.
8. Elizabeth Threipland, *b.* on 15 February 1663 and *m.* Captain Patrick Bruce, second son of William Bruce, 2<sup>nd</sup> of Newton. They had issue.
9. Rebecca Threipland, *b.* on 25 December, 1664.
10. Jean Threipland, *b.* on 25 on 27 May 1666 and *m.* on 14 October 1686, to Alexander Linton, 2<sup>nd</sup> of Pittendreich,<sup>3</sup> (*c/m* at Fingask, on 1 and 2 October, 1686<sup>4</sup>). She *m.* secondly, John Pearson, 3<sup>rd</sup> of Kippenross, (he *d.* in March of 1720), and had issue.

**SIR DAVID THREIPLAND, 2<sup>ND</sup> OF FINGASK**, *b.* on 9<sup>th</sup> and *c.* at Perth on 19 August, 1669, was served heir to his father in the lands of Fingask on 2 April 1690<sup>5</sup> and to whom he is styled his only son and executor when he granted an assignation of a Bond to James, Earl of Airlie, on 7 January 1692.<sup>6</sup> He as active as a Jacobite during the rising of 1715 for which he was attainted and his estate put up for sale by the Commissioners and Trustees for the forfeited estates in Scotland on 17

September 1720.<sup>1</sup> He *d.* in 1746, having *m.* firstly, Elizabeth, daughter of Sir James Ramsay of Bamff, (*c/m* 19 September 1688<sup>2</sup>), by whom he was father of,

1. David Threipland, *bap.* at Kilspindie on 27 February 1694 and was attainted for his part in the Jacobite uprising of 1715. He was *ksp* at the battle of Prestonpans in September of 1745.
2. Alexander Threipland, *bap.* at Kilspindie on 13 October 1695 and *d.* young.
3. John Threipland, *bap.* at Kilspindie on 16 May 1697 and *d.* young.
4. George Threipland, *bap.* at Kilspindie on 28 August 1698 and *d.* young.
5. Thomas Threipland, *bap.* at Kilspindie on 31 December 1699 and *d.* young.

He *m.* secondly in 1707, Katherine, daughter and heiress of David Smith, 1<sup>st</sup> of Barnhill, (she was widow of James Williamson, 1<sup>st</sup> of Barnhill, whom she had *m.* on 19 April 1694. She *d.* at Fingask, on 18 March 1762, aged 83<sup>3</sup>), and by her he was father of :

6. Sir Stuart Threipland, 3<sup>rd</sup> of Fingask, (*see below*).
7. James Threipland of Barnhill, who *dsp* before 27 January 1797 when his brother, Sir Stuart Threipland, was served heir to him.<sup>4</sup>
8. Catherine Threipland, *m.* firstly, at Edinburgh, on 2 October, 1726, John Drummond, second son of David Drummond, Advocate,<sup>5</sup> and secondly at Edinburgh on 17 May, 1741, Rev. William Harper.<sup>6</sup> She *d.* in April of 1764.
9. Elizabeth Threipland, *m.* firstly, on 7 April 1728, to Henry Smith, second son of James Smith of Camno,<sup>1</sup> (*c/m* 29 March 1728<sup>2</sup>), by whom she had no issue ; and secondly, on 29 May 1736, to Robert Graham of Camno,<sup>3</sup> and had issue.

**SIR STUART THREIPLAND, 3<sup>RD</sup> BARONET OF FINGASK**, was a child by his father's second marriage and was *b.* on 18 May 1716. He served in the Jacobite army during the rising of 1745/6 for which he was attainted and his estates forfeited. He afterwards took advantage of the Act of Indemnity and purchased his estates back in 1782. He *d.* at Fingask, on 2 February 1805,<sup>4</sup> having *m.* firstly, at Edinburgh, on 10 February, 1753, Janet, eldest daughter and heiress of David Sinclair of Southdun, by whom he was father of;

1. David Threipland Sinclair of Southdun, *bap.* on 3 December 1753 and *dsp* at Menil le Roy, France, "whither he had gone for his health" on 25 June 1773.<sup>5</sup>
2. Janet Threipland, *bap.* at Edinburgh on 24 January 1755.

He *m.* secondly, at Edinburgh, on 19 July 1761, Janet, daughter of Richard Murray of Pennyland,<sup>6</sup> (she was served heir to her brother, Peter Murray of Pennyland, on 2 April 1771<sup>7</sup>), by whom he was father of ;

3. Sir Patrick Murray Threipland, 4<sup>th</sup> Baronet of Fingask, (*see below*).
4. Stewart Moncrieff Threipland, of Middleton, *b.* in 1771 and was admitted a Member of the Faculty of Advocates and appointed Queen's Counsel in Bombay. He *m.* on 5 July 1817, to Elizabeth, daughter of Walter Campbell, of Shawfield, (she *dsp* at Edinburgh, on 14 November 1865<sup>8</sup>), and *dsp* at Middleton, on 12 April 1838, his nephew Sir Patrick Murray Threipland of Fingask being executor as next of kin.<sup>9</sup>

5. Richard Threipland, *bap.* at St. Paul's Edinburgh, on 7 December 1763 and to whom his brother Stewart Moncrieff Threipland was appointed Tutor on 1 June 1796. He became Merchant in Calcutta and *dsp* there on 1 February 1807, "of a fever, after ten days illness."<sup>1</sup>

**SIR PATRICK MURRAY THREIPLAND, 4<sup>TH</sup> BARONET OF FINGASK AND PENNYLAND**, *bap.* at Edinburgh on 9 November 1762, and was served heir to (1) his elder half-brother David Sinclair-Threipland of Southdun on 19 January 1775 (2) his father, on 28 April 1809 and (3) his grandfather, Sir David Threipland of Fingask, on 15 December 1824.<sup>2</sup> He *m.* at Edinburgh, on 26 March 1792, to Janet, third daughter of William Kerr of Chatto,<sup>3</sup> (she *d.* on 19 January 1855), *d.* at Fingask, on 11 January 1837<sup>4</sup> and was father of,

1. Sir Patrick Murray Threipland of Fingask, (*see below*).
2. Jessie Murray Threipland, *d.* unmarried, at Fingask Castle, on 9 May 1871.<sup>5</sup>
3. Elizabeth Murray Threipland, *d.* unmarried, at Fingask, on 10 January 1881.<sup>6</sup>
4. Catherine Murray Threipland, *d.* unmarried, at Fingask, on 3 February 1863.<sup>7</sup>

**SIR PATRICK MURRAY THREIPLAND, 5<sup>TH</sup> BARONET OF FINGASK AND PENNYLAND**, *b.* on 26 May 1800 and succeeded his father, being served heir to him on 8 May 1838.<sup>8</sup> He *dsp* at Fingask on 30 April 1882,<sup>9</sup> when the Baronetcy became extinct and his estates devolved upon his maternal cousin, William Scott-
