

CAMPBELL

OF ARDCHATTAN

JOHN CAMPBELL, BISHOP OF THE ISLES, was a younger son of John Campbell, 1st of Cawdor, and was elected Bishop of the Isles for which he had Royal assent on 22 January 1573.¹ He *m.* Isobel, daughter of Duncan Lamont of Inveryne, whom, as his future spouse, he infeft in various lands on 12 August 1575, and subscribed his Will on 3 October 1585, by which he appointed John Campbell of Cawdor, whom he styled his brother's son, his executor.² He was father of,

1. Colin Campbell of Inveresregan, is named in his father's Will and the keeping of whom father entrusted to his nephew, John Campbell of Cawdor. He succeeded to the lands of Blaircherin, in the Lordship of Lorne, as well as those of Meikle Slaines, in Nairnshire, as heir to Colin Campbell of Boith, his *father's brother's son*, which he assigned to his son John by Disposition dated 1 January 1616.³ He was father of,

1a) John Campbell, to whom his father assigned the lands of Blaircherin and Meikle Slaines on 1 January 1616, and, being then a minor, he had Colin Lamont of Inveryne and John Campbell of Rachean appointed Tutors. He *m.* Mary, daughter of Archibald Campbell of Inverawe, (*c/m* at Inverawe on 12 May 1631⁴).

He was also father of several natural children :

4. Margaret Campbell, all of whom had legitimations under the Great Seal on 12 September 1582.¹

ALEXANDER CAMPBELL OF ARDCHATTAN, had been appointed Rector of Killininvie by 8 May 1580 when he was a charter witness with his father.² He had resignations from his father of (1) the Commendatorship and Priory of Ardchattan which was confirmed under the Great Seal on 5 June 1580,³ and (2) the Abbacey and Commendatorship of Iona with the churches, lands, mansions, fortalices, mills, fishing etc, which was also confirmed under the Great Seal on 6 June 1581.⁴ He had letters of legitimation under the Great Seal on 12 September 1582, and *d.* in 1628,⁵ having *m.* firstly, to Elizabeth Aissoune, by whom he was father of,

1. John Campbell, *bap.* at Stirling, on 7 August 1589 and *d.* young.

He *m.* secondly, Katherine MacDonnell, said to be a daughter of the Earl of Antrim, (she survived him and is included in a contract between her son John Campbell of Ardchattan and Hector Maclean of Keldin, for the seven year tack of the churchlands of Kirkcapoll, dated 7 December 1640⁶), and by her he had further issue,

2. John Campbell of Ardchattan, (*see below*).

3. Archibald Campbell, 1st of Lerags, is styled second son when cautioner to a Bond by his father to Gavin Croce, Burgess of Edinburgh, for 1000 merks, dated 11 January 1619.⁷ He obtained the lands of Lerags by 20 January 1634 when he wrote to Sir Colin Campbell of Glenorchy notifying him of “their”

brother, Donald's, death and that the writs pertaining to the lands of Cregans were being taken by his brother, "Ardchattan," to Edinburgh and therefore Glenorchy's brother Robert, on whom they were entailed, could view them there.¹ He *m.* Beatrix Campbell, who is styled his spouse in an action she raised against John MacGillespie in Craigintaggart, on 5 July 1637,² and was father of,

3a} John Campbell, 2nd of Lerags, had a charter under the Great Seal dated 5 February 1662, confirming anew to him the lands of Over and Nether Lerags which had been held by he and his predecessors for a period of over thirty years and the writs of which, for their safe keeping, had been deposited in 1654, with John Campbell of Ardchattan, his being the most secure house in the area but it having been burned "by certain English soldiers" they were lost.³ In 1665, he forcibly broke into the house of Duncan Campbell at Coulnadalloch and carried off Jean Campbell, relict of Archibald Campbell, fiar of Ardchattan, taking her, firstly, to the island of Inchbean where they remained in a cave for two days before moving her around various other locations for the next month or so. She eventually made her escape to Inverary where criminal proceedings were brought against him and John Campbell of Ardchattan who knew of the affair and yet did nothing.⁴

6. Mr. William Campbell, is styled brother to John Campbell of Ardchattan in a Bond in which he agrees to keep a contract of wadset of the lands of Culdallich dated 27 October 1627, and to make it forthcoming to his sister Mary, in her lifetime and thereafter to her heirs by her deceased husband Donald Campbell of Creagans, dated 5 June 1635.¹
7. Alexander Campbell, was a witness to a Discharge by his father to Douglas MacArthur, Notary, dated 1 June 1609.²
8. Mary Campbell, *m.* Donald Campbell of Creagans, (*c/m* 8 October 1623³).

He was also father of several natural sons :

9. Alexander Campbell, is styled a natural son of Alexander, Commendator of Ardchattan, when he had a Bond from Hugh Campbell of Balnagowan for 470 merks dated November 1611.⁴
10. Colin Campbell, is styled as natural son to Alexander Campbell of Ardchattan when witness to a Bond by Duncan MacDougal of Ardayne to John Campbell, fiar of Ardchattan, for £304, dated 9 May 1621.⁵
11. John Campbell,
12. John Campbell. He and his brother John are styled natural sons to Alexander Campbell of Ardchattan when included in an action raised against them and others by Hugh MacDougall of Craiganiche on 10 February 1619, for spoilation of the lands of Sellachan.⁶

JOHN CAMPBELL OF ARDCHATTAN, was a witness with his father and brother, Archibald, to a Bond of Friendship between Sir John Campbell of Cawdor and Sir John MacDougal of Dunnollie, dated 31 September 1619 and was served heir

to his father in the lands of Ardchattan on 16 September 1631.¹ He is included with his mother, Katherine “NeinDonald” in a nineteen year Tack for the fishing in the Awe from Sir Colin Campbell of Glenorchy on 2 June 1634.² He *m.* Janet, daughter of Archibald Campbell, 3rd of Lochnell, (*c/m* in December 1624), and was father of :

1. Archibald Campbell of Ardchattan, (*see below*).
2. John Campbell, is named in his sister-in-law, Jean Campbell’s contract of marriage with John Campbell of Lerags in 1664. He settled at Coulnadalloch and had *m.* Florence Campbell by 18 April 1691, when his nephew, John Campbell of Ardchattan, disposed the lands of Craigdurnish to them.³ He *d.* by 8 January 1708 and was father of,
 - 2a} John Campbell, who is styled son to the deceased John Campbell of Coulnadalloch in a Bond to him of 305 merks Scots by John Campbell of Ardchattan dated 8 January 1708.⁴
3. Duncan Campbell of Culnadalloch, is styled uncle to John Campbell of Ardchattan when he granted a receipt to Robert Grant, Bailie to Lord Neil Campbell, for £40 Scots on 10 April 1679.⁵ He granted a Bond for £50 Scots to Gilbert MacArthur, change keeper at Cladich, on 19 December 1694, and *m.* Florence Campbell with whom he had a Disposition from John Campbell of Barcaldine for the lands of Craigdurnish in security for 2000 merks on 18 April 1691. He *d.* by January of 1708 and was father of :
 - 3a} John Campbell, is styled eldest lawful son to the deceased Duncan Campbell of Coulnadalloch when he had a Bond from John Campbell of Ardchattan for 305 merks on 8 January 1708.⁶ He *m.* Beatrix Campbell and was father of :

ARCHIBALD CAMPBELL, FIAR OF ARDCHATTAN, *m.* Jean, daughter of Patrick Campbell, 1st of Edinample, (*c/m* 23 April 1654. She survived him and was carried off and forced to make a second marriage, in 1665, to John Campbell, 2nd of Lerags), *d.* in July of 1661¹ and was father of:

JOHN CAMPBELL OF ARDCHATTAN, who was under age at his father's death in 1661 and was served heir to him in the manor, monastery and patronage of Ardchattan on 19 May 1697.³ He *m.* in 1680, Susanna, daughter of Sir John Campbell, 10th of Glenorchy, and sister to John Campbell, 1st Earl of Breadalbane, *d.* on 8 December 1721 and was father of :

1. Archibald Campbell, fiar of Ardchattan, who *d. vita patris* before 8 February 1709 when his brother Charles is styled eldest son to John Campbell of Ardchattan.

CHARLES CAMPBELL OF ARDCHATTAN, is styled eldest lawful son to John Campbell of Ardchattan when he witnessed a Bond of Relief by Colin Campbell, brother to Donald Campbell of Ballinbuy, to his father dated 8 February 1709,¹ and as younger of Ardchattan, he granted a Tack of the teinds of Tiree to Archibald Campbell of Barnacarry on 18 July 1718.² He *m.* Anna, daughter of Patrick Campbell, 4th of Barcaldine, (*c/m* 3 November 1719³), and *d.* on 8 December 1730/31 having had issue;

1. Patrick Campbell of Ardchattan, (*see below*).
2. Alexander Campbell, who settled at Worton, Middlesex, and died without apparent issue before 22 May 1787 when his brother, Patrick, was served heir general to him.⁴

PATRICK CAMPBELL OF ARDCHATTAN, succeeded his father when an infant and *m.* on 26 June 1753, Lilius McFarlane, (she *d.* in March 1783). He *d.* at Edinburgh, on 30 June 1801, aged 73 years,¹ and was father of :

1. Charles Campbell, entered the army and served as a Captain during the American wars. He was *ksp* at the battle of Camden, South Carolina, on 16 August 1780.
2. Colin Campbell, is styled second son of Patrick Campbell of Ardochattan in the remainder contained within a Disposition by John Campbell, only son and heir of Donald Campbell, Tacksman of Ballimore, in favour of Louisa Campbell, his wife, dated 20 August 1765.² He entered the H.E.I.C.S. and *dsp* on 15 May 1792. His brother Robert was served heir to him on 24 August 1801.³
3. Patrick Campbell, is styled younger son of Patrick Campbell of Ardochattan in a remainder contained within a Disposition by John Campbell, only son and heir of Donald Campbell, Tacksman of Ballimore, in favour of Louisa Campbell, his wife, dated 20 August 1765. He entered the army and was *ksp* at Pont du Cherry, in October 1779.
4. Frederick Campbell, was also included in the remainder contained within a Disposition by John Campbell, only son and heir of Donald Campbell, Tacksman of Ballimore, in favour of Louisa Campbell, his wife, dated 20 August 1765. He *dsp*.
5. **ROBERT CAMPBELL OF ARDCHATTAN**, who succeeded and was served heir to his father on 29 July 1801,⁴ then to his brother, Lieutenant Colin Campbell, on 24 August 1801⁵ and to his grandfather, Charles Campbell of Ardochattan, on 23 August 1824.⁶ He *m.* on 29 March 1819, Jean, daughter of Archibald Campbell,

Campbell, younger son of William Campbell, 3rd of Glenfalloch, and *dsp* at Ardchattan, on 29 March 1840.¹

6. **THOMAS DUNDAS CAMPBELL OF ARDCHATTAN**, *b.* on 18 August 1767, entered the army and served as Colonel in the 50th Regiment. He *dsp* at London, on 6 February 1846.

7. **ALEXANDER CAMPBELL OF GATCOMBE PARK**, *b.* on 5 May 1776 and *m.* on 30 June 1795, to Jane, daughter and co-heir of Edward Meaux Worsley of Gatcombe,² (she *d.* at Gatcombe Park, Isle of Wight, on Friday 17 December 1819, in her 45th year³). He was father of :

7a) Alexander Glynn Campbell, the only son, who *dsp* at Florence, Italy, on 5 November 1836.⁴

7a) **JANE ELIZABETH MARY CAMPBELL OF ARDCHATTAN**, *b.* on 3 April 1803 and *m.* at Florence, on 30 January 1841, to Strachan Irving Popham, fourth son of Admiral Sir Home Popham,⁵ (he *d.* at Hyde Park, London, on 27 February 1861, aged 51 years). She succeeded her uncle, Thomas Dundas Campbell, in the lands of Ardchattan in 1846 where she *dsp* on 12 September 1878.⁶

7a) Sophia Margaret Ann Campbell, *b.* in 1805 and *d.* at the Mount, Harrow, on 11 November 1827.⁷

8. Laurence Dundas Campbell, *m.* at Stoneham Church, Hants, in August of 1800, Emma Maria, second daughter of John Courtney, M.P. for Appleby,⁸ and *d.* in 1809. He was father of,

- 8a) John Courtney Campbell, *b.* in 1803 and was appointed Curate of Hawling and domestic Chaplain to the Duke of Argyll. He *dsp* at Bourton-on-the-Water in October of 1835.¹
- 8a) Emma Courtey Campbell, *b.* on 7 May 1802, and *d.* unmarried, at Albert Place, near Worcester, on 19 March 1861, aged 58 years.²

10. Anna Campbell, *m.* in 1775, to Andrew Clarke of Comrie and had issue;

- 10b) Andrew Clarke Wellwood of Comrie, *b.* on 14 September 1804, was served heir to his father in the lands of Comrie on 3 July 1843⁷ 1843⁷ and, on 20 May 1847, he had a Royal Licence to assume the the additional surname of Wellwood upon succeeding as heir to the Garvock estate.⁸ He *m.* first, at Castle Hill, Perthshire, on 2 July 1827, to Jane, daughter of Sir John Wardlaw, Baronet of Pittreavie,⁹ (she *d.* at Morningside on 23 May 1855¹⁰), and secondly, at Auchterless, on 29 July 1856, Margaret, youngest

He *m.* at Fitzroy, Canada West, on 15 June 1856, to Anne Charity, daughter of William Piggot, Dysart, Queen's County, Ireland,⁵ (she *d.* at Henlade House, Taunton, on 2 February 1917⁶), *d.* at Valleyfield House, on 7 December 1870⁷ and was father of,

10c) **ROBERT WILLIAM PIGOTT CAMPBELL PRESTON OF VALLEYFIELD AND ARDCHATTAN**, *b.* on 17 June 1865 and succeeded to the Ardchattan estate on the death of his cousin, Jane Elizabeth Mary Campbell Popham of Ardchattan, in September of 1878. He *m.* at St Mark's Church, North Audley Street, London, on 1 June 1905, to Mollie, daughter of Augustus Thorne, of Dunconusg,⁸ and *d.* at Archattan, on 27 October 1929.⁹

10c) Arthur Clarke Preston, *b.* on 6 November 1869 and *d.* unmarried at Taunton in March 1925, while visiting his
