

WALLACE

OF RICCARTON & CRAIGIE

SIR RICHARD LE WALYS, frequently appears as both the granter and a witness to a number of documents in the first-half of the 12th century and is said to have established the town of Riccarton on lands he held in Ayrshire. Although he is generally accepted to have been the ancestor of Wallace of Riccarton,¹ there is no evidence for that, and the first for whom there is definitive proof is;

SIR JOHN WALLACE OF RICCARTON, who, in 1371/72, had a charter under the Great Seal of Robert II for the lands of Hahurystona, in the barony of Innerwick, Thornlee, in the barony of Renfrew, and an annualrent from those of Ingliston, in the barony of Durrisdeer, which had belonged to Sir John Lindsay of Cragy but which had lapsed and fallen to the crown.² He had *d.* by May 1394 and was father of,

1. **SIR HUGH WALLACE OF CRAIGIE**, succeeded and was in possession of Craigie and other lands by 24 May 1394 when he disposed those of Ingliston to Sir Robert Stewart of Durrisdeer³ and had a confirmation under the Great Seal for the lands of Craigie, Riccarton, Thurstoun and Thornwell dated about 1397.⁴ He donated his lands of Thornley to the monks of Paisley Abbey on 20 February 1403⁵ and *dsp* soon after.

2. William Wallace of Craigie, (*see below*).

WILLIAM WALLACE OF CRAIGIE, is styled brother and heir to Sir Hugh Wallace of Craigie when he consented to that brother's donation of the lands of Thornley to Paisley Abbey in 1403. He had succeeded that brother by 1416¹ and was given over as a replacement hostage in England for the Earl of Crawford on 9 July 1427.² He *d.* by 1434 and had issue;

1. Sir John Wallace of Craigie, (*see below*).

2. Adam Wallace of Craigo, who is styled "frater domini de Cragyn" in 1446 and is apparently identical to the person of that name who was appointed Royal Comptroller and founded the junior stirpes of Wallace of Craigo.

SIR JOHN WALLACE OF CRAIGIE, had succeeded by 1434 when, as Baillie of Kyle, he submitted accounts of the rents due to him from the lands of Linlithgow. He had a safe-conduct from Henry VI of England on 13 February 1443/44, allowing him to travel with Master John Ralston and twelve attendants to the shrine of St Thomas of Canterbury,³ and *d.* in 1449,⁴ and after 30 January of that year when, following a dispute, he renounced the lands of Thornley to the monks of Paisley.⁵ Sir James Balfour records that Sir John accompanied Hugh Douglas, Earl of Ormond, in an expedition into Northumberland and defeated Lord Percy at the battle of Sark on 23 October 1449 but that "*The Scots lost no man of note in this batell, bot only 600 comon shouldiours, save Sir William [sic] Wallace of Cragey, shortly after his returne home, deyed of his woundes received ther.*"⁶

He *m.* Margaret, daughter of Sir Henry Douglas of Lugton and Lochleven, and was father of,

1. Sir William Wallace of Craigie, (*see below*).
2. George Wallace of Elderslie, whom John Wallace of Craigie styles his “eme” (uncle) in a charter by that person to George’s son and apparent heir, Patrick, of the lands of Ellersle dated 3 February 1499.¹ He *m.* Katherine Graham, who had a liferent reserved to her in March 1499,² and had issue, (*see Wallace of Elderslie*).

SIR WILLIAM WALLACE OF CRAIGIE, had Sasine for the lands of Thurston and Woodhall in 1449³ and was Baillie of Kyle for which he submitted his accounts in 1455.⁴ He was a witness to a charter by Alexander, Lord Hume, grating the lands of Castleton, and others, to his son, Thomas Hume, on 14 October 1476⁵ and witnessed a charter by Alexander Cathcart of Cardiston by which he conveyed the lands of Gass to his natural son, Roger Cathcart, and Christine Lockhart, his wife, dated 13 July 1477.⁶

He *m.* after 1453, to Margaret, daughter and heiress of Sir David Dunbar of Cockburn, Countess of Crawford, and relict of Alexander Lindsay, 4th Earl of Crawford, with whom he is named in a complaint brought by them before the Lords Auditors on 13 March 1479, for payment due by Hugh, Lord Lovat,⁷ and was killed by cannon shot the following May during the siege of Dunbar, while serving under James III in his campaign against his brother, Alexander, Duke of Albany.⁸ He was father of,

1. **JOHN WALLACE OF CRAIGIE**, succeeded his father and had Sasine for the lands of Thurston and Elderslie in 1480. He *m.* by 24 February 1472/73, to

Katherine, daughter of Gilbert, Lord Kennedy,¹ when on his father, Sir William's resignation, they had a conjunct charter to them for the lands of Thornle, Camyshell, Blar and other, in the lordship of Riccarton.² He had *dsp* by October 1504 and was succeeded by his brother, Hugh.

2. **HUGH WALLACE OF CRAIGIE**, was a witness with his brother William to their eldest brother, John Wallace of Craigie's charter to their uncle, George Wallace of Elderslie, and his son and heir Patrick for those lands, dated 24 March 1499.³ He succeeded that brother John in the lands of Craigie by 4 October 1504, when he is named in a redemption by William Housone, minister of Fulfuird, of parts of those lands⁴ and *m.* Margaret, daughter of Robert Rutherford of Chatto, with whom, on his own resignation, he had a conjunct charter for the lands of Thuirston and Woodhall on 22 September 1505.⁵ He *d.* after then and before 13 November of that same year,⁶ having had had issue;

2a) **JOHN WALLACE OF CRAIGIE**, who being under age at his father's death, had his ward granted by the King to Hugh Campbell of Loudon and Isabel Wallace, his wife, on 13 November 1505.⁷ He *m.* firstly, to Sibella, Sibella, daughter of John, 2nd Lord Cathcart,⁸ and secondly, to Janet Logan who survived him and had a pension of 40 merks Scots from the king on 29 December 1538.⁹ He *d.* without apparent issue by 18

September 1531, when his cousin, William Wallace of Craigie, is styled nephew and heir to the late Hugh Wallace of Craigie.

3. William Wallace, is styled brother to John Wallace of Craigie in a charter by that person to Patrick Wallace, son and apparent heir of George Wallace of Elderslie, for the lands of Elderslie dated 3 February 1499¹ and gave a Bond of Manrent to James, Earl of Arran, on 18 July 1515.² He served as tutor to his his nephew, John Wallace of Craigie, being is so-styled in a number of writs up to his death in 1530, and had the rental of the crown lands of Dundonald, with the mill, fishings and fortalice, on 31 January 1520,³ which were confirmed to him in feu under the Great Seal on 15 August 1526.⁴ He *m.* Elizabeth, daughter and heiress of John Campbell of Wester Loudoun, (she survived him and *m.* secondly, to Robert, 4th Lord Crichton of Sanquhar,⁵ and also surviving that husband, she *m.* by 27 July 1543, as a second wife, Sir William Cunningham, 3rd Earl of Glencairn⁶), and *d.* in 1530. He had issue;

3a} **William Wallace of Craigie**, (*see below*).

3a} John Wallace of Dundonald, had a Tack with his mother, Elizabeth Campbell, Countess of Glencairn, for the lands of Dundonald on 27 July 1543⁷ and had those lands confirmed to him under the Great Seal on 10 July 1545.⁸ He had a gift of ward of the lands of Craigie on 8 August 1545⁹ until the entry of his nephew, John Wallace. He *m.* after 26 September 1543,¹⁰ and before 21 August 1545, to Katherine, daughter of James Kennedy of Blairquhan, (she was widow of William Herries, 3rd

Lord Herries of Terregles), when on his resignation, they had a conjunct charter for the lands of Dundonald,¹ and *d.* in 1563/64. He had issue,

3b) John Wallace of Dundonald, who, succeeding his father, had a gift of the nonentry of his lands of Dundonald on 11 July 1568² and was served heir general to him on 16 October 1572,³ and had Sasine Sasine for the lands of Dundonald on 18 January 1572/73.⁴ He *m.* firstly, to Agnes, daughter of Sir John Stewart of Minto, with whom he had a conjunct charter under the Great Seal for the lands of Burnside on 24 October 1573,⁵ and secondly, to Jean Mure, and was father of,

3c) John Wallace of Dundonald, who, on his father's resignation, had a confirmation under the Great Seal for the lands and castle of Dundonald dated 27 February 1596/97.⁶ He *m.* Dorothy Sempill, with whose consent he and their son, John, disposed the lands of Dundonald to Matthew Wallace of Gaskaddin who had a confirmation of them on 31 January 1617,⁷ and was father of,

3d) William Wallace, fiar of Dundonald, who consented to his father's disposing of Dundonald to Matthew Wallace in 1617.

3c) Jean Wallace, *m.* James Mowat of Busbie, (*c/m* 29 December 1582⁸).

- 3b) William Wallace, had a gift of the chaplainry of St. Ninian of Dundonald on 5 December 1571 and is then styled brother to John Wallace of Dundonald¹.
- 3b) Thomas Wallace, is styled brother to John Wallace of Dundonald when witness to a charter by his cousin, John Wallace of Craigie, dated 28 December 1575.²
- 3b) John Wallace, is styled brother to John Wallace of Dundonald when witness to his niece, Jean Wallace's liferent charter following marriage contract with James Mowat dated December 1582.³
- 3b) James Wallace, *d.* before 7 February 1610.
- 3a) Mr Michael Wallace of Wausford, is styled brother to the late William Wallace of Craigie in a charter to he and his wife, Janet Adair, for the lands of Wausford, in the sheriffdom of Ayr, dated 19 October 1549.⁴ He had issue, (*see Wallace of Wausford*).
- 3a) Hugh Wallace, is styled uncle to John Wallace of Dundonald when witness to a charter by John Wallace of Craigie dated 28 December 1575.⁵

4. Adam Wallace, is styled brother to John Wallace of Craigie when witness to a notarial instruments dated 12 July 1499.⁶
5. Isobel Wallace, *m.* by 13 November 1505, to Sir Hugh Campbell of Loudoun, when they had the gift of the ward of her nephew, John Wallace of Craigie,⁷ and had issue.

WILLIAM WALLACE OF CRAIGIE, succeeded to the lands of Craigie but being under age, the ward of his lands and his marriage was gifted by the King to Alexander Kennedy of Bargany on 18 September 1531, and in which he is styled nevoy (nephew) and heir of the deceased Hugh Wallace of Craigie.¹ He was entered into the crown lands of Dundonald as heir to his late father on 24 August 1531 and succeeding his cousin, John Wallace of Craigie, he had Sasine for those of Riccarton on 12 December 1532 and Craigie on 20 October 1535, then Thurston on 8 November 1536.²

He *m.* Margaret, daughter of Alexander Kennedy of Bargany, (she survived him³ and *m.* secondly, to Gilbert Kennedy, 3rd Earl of Cassils, by whom she had further issue), and *d.* before 6 January 1537/38⁴ having had issue;

JOHN WALLACE OF CRAIGIE, succeeded his father but being under age at that time, his grandmother Elizabeth Campbell, relict of William Wallace, Tutor of Craigie, had a gift of the ward of the lands of Nether Riccarton until his entry of the rightful heir on 6 January 1537/38.⁵ He had Sasine for the lands of Riccarton and Craigie on 28 April 1552⁶ and was appointed Baillie of Kyle on 28 December following.⁷

He was contracted in October 1532, to marry Grisel, daughter of Robert, 3rd Lord Sempill,⁸ but the terms of that arrangement were not fulfilled and she, instead, married before 10 March 1539/40, to James Hamilton, younger of Raploch. He had *m.* by 8 August 1552, to Margaret, daughter of Alexander Cunningham, 4th Earl of Glencairn, (she survived him and *m.* secondly, as a

second wife, to Andrew Stewart, 2nd Lord Ochiltree¹ ; and *d.* in June 1573), when they had a conjunct charter under the Great Seal for the lands of Riccarton, Brighthouse and numerous others, all in Ayrshire.² They had a further conjunct charter for the lands of Preveck on their own resignation and confirmed under the Great Seal on 2 July 1558.³ He disposed the lands of Thornlie to Robert Graham of Knockdoliane by charter of 20 May 1570⁴ and *d.* in August following.⁵ He had had issue;

1. **JOHN WALLACE OF CRAIGIE**, who, being under age at his father's death, had Hugh Wallace of Carnell, John Wallace of Dundonald and Mr Michael Wallace of Wausfuir, appointed his curators. He had Sasine for the lands of Riccarton and Craigie on 25 January 1573/74⁶, then for those of Thuirston, Woodhall and Woodlie on 29 June 1575⁷ and was appointed bailie of the lordship and barony of Monkton on 12 July 1588. He *m.* firstly, to Margaret, daughter of Sir Matthew Campbell of Loudoun, (she *d.* on 5 May 1597⁸), and secondly, to Elizabeth, daughter of David Douglas, 7th Earl of Angus, (*c/m* 31 October 1597. She was widow of John, 8th Lord Maxwell⁹), whom, in contemplation of their marriage, he infert in a liferent from his lands on 29 November 1597. He *d.* before June 1616 and was father of,

1a) **JOHN WALLACE, YOUNGER OF CRAIGIE**, consented to his father's marriage to Elizabeth Douglas in 1597. He *m.* Margaret, daughter of

John, 8th Lord Maxwell, (*c/m* November 1597¹), and *d.* by 18 February 1608 having had issue;

1b) **SIR HUGH WALLACE, 1ST BARONET, OF CRAIGIE**, succeeded his grandfather, John Wallace of Craigie, by June 1616 and had a charters under the Great Seal for the lands of Riccarton, Craigie and others, firstly, on 21 December 1620² and again on 26 March 1631.³ He is styled a Knight-Baronet, firstly, in a Disposition by him to Thomas Tait of the nonentry and ward of the lands of Knockindail on 21 August 1633,⁴ then in a notarial instrument dated 11 November 1639⁵ and again in a precept of clare constat issued by himself on 3 March 1643, in favour of Mr Alexander Neilson for his infetment in the lands of Auchrugland.⁶ He *m.* Esther, daughter of Sir John Kerr of Littledean, and *d.* before March 1660. His issue was;

1c) Hugh Wallace, younger of Craigie, who is styled eldest son and apparent heir to Sir Hugh Wallace when witness to a Notarial Instrument dated 1 November 1639⁷ and consented to his father's precept of clare constat in favour of Mr Alexander Neilson dated 3 March 1643. He *m.* Christine, daughter of James Pringle of Smailholme, (she was widow of Archibald Douglas of Cashogle by whom she had issue), with whom, on his own resignation, he had a conjunct charter under the Great Seal for the lands of Riccarton and Craigie on 1 March 1644, and which the king united into the barony of

Craigie.¹ His relationship with his father had deteriorated by 29 June 1649, when parliament considered a supplication by he and his wife “showing that where upon a false rancour or malice conceived against them by Sir Hugh Wallace of Craigie, his father, without any ground or reason, has to his great disgrace most unnaturally caused charge him and his said spouse before the justice general upon criminal letters to underlie the law for the alleged breaking up of his study door and taking away certain sums of money within the place of Craigie, the supplicants being most innocent of that fact, but in the contrary they being at the alleged time of the committing thereof three or four miles from that place, riding upon his horse, whereupon the said Sir Hugh, not being content to cause charge them, being innocent, but also has detained and withdrawn their means and estate upon which they and their children and family should live on. Through which and sundry other unnatural and rigorous dealing has made him distracted these 12 months bygone and is not yet settled in mind, that he is neither able to govern himself nor his affairs, as is well-known to the whole gentlemen where they live and to some of the said estates of parliament present of his distracted condition. After which charge, he, out of his foolish humour, he being necessitated by his taking of the means of his life from him, went over to Ireland and coming back again, thinking to have some of his friends act as cautioner for him, they seeing his present condition refuse. Upon this advantage, his father has caused denounce him to the horn, so that he has not only detained his means but also has detained 3,500 merks of moveables due to his said spouse

by her first husband, whereupon his said spouse came to Edinburgh, by reason of his inability, with her young children and family to let the said estates of parliament know their present distressed estate and condition.”¹ It is said that following those events his father disinherited him and conveyed his estate to his heir-male, Thomas Wallace, younger of Failford, but there is no evidence for that, and his male issue, if any, was considered to be extinguished by the beginning of the 18th century when Sir Thomas Wallace of Craigie was considered Chief of the surname.² He was father of,

1d) Margaret Wallace, *bap.* at Edinburgh, on 26 August 1644.

1a) William Wallace, who is styled uncle to Hugh Wallace of Craigie and possessor of the 5 merklands of Dulleris in a charter in favour of Mr William Wallace, son of William Wallace of Brighouse, for the lands of Brighouse, and others, dated 31 July 1629.³

1a) Robert Wallace, who is included with his father and his brother William in lawburrows subscribed by Adam Ritchie, burges of Ayr, against them on 27 February 1610.⁴

1a) Katherine Wallace, *m.* by 18 February 1608, to William Wallace, younger of Elderslie, when she pursued John Maxwell of Kirkconnell and George Maxwell of Drumcolteran for sums of money due by the terms of her late brother, John Wallace, younger of Craigie’s marriage contract of 5 December 1597.⁵

2. Mr William Wallace of Failford, had a grant from the King of the benefice of Failfurd on 18 April 1576 and is then styled brother to John Wallace of Craigie.¹ He had a further grant from the king for the manor and lands of Failfurd on 2 June 1591² and *d.* before 1 December 1616, when Walter Stewart was appointed Minister of Failf as successor to him.³ He was father of,

2a) William Wallace of Failfurd, succeeded his father and had special service as heir to him in the manor and lands of Failfurd on 22 April 1617.⁴ He *m.* Agnes, daughter of Sir Thomas Boyd of Bonshaw, who is named with him in a charter to him for the lands of Camsiscan dated 20 February 1643,⁵ and was buried on 21 September 1675.⁶ He was father of,

2b) **Sir Thomas Wallace, 2nd Baronet, of Craigie, (see below).**

2b) Sir Hew Wallace of Wolmet, became a merchant and burges of Edinburgh and acquired the lands of Wolmet. He *m.* Christian MacFarlane and *d.* before 18 April 1692 having had issue;

2c) Thomas Wallace, *bap.* at Edinburgh, on 10 February 1666 and *d.* young.

2c) James Wallace, *bap.* at Edinburgh, on 5 January 1667 and was buried in the Greyfriars, Edinburgh, on 23 January 1672.⁷

2c) Hew Wallace, *bap.* at Edinburgh, on 20 May 1669 and is included with his siblings in a Sasine to them for the lands of Carberry dated 18 April 1692⁸

- 2c} Adam Wallace, *bap.* at Edinburgh, on 1 October 1680 and *d.* young.

Jean Wallace, with whom brother, John Wallace of Craigie, entered into a contract John Carmichael of Meadowflat, William Crichton, tutor of Sanquhar, and James Carmichael of Paddockshaws and for which John Moffat, burges of Edinburgh, was pursued for breach, with his escheat being gifted to Robert Hudson, musician, on 1 March 1583/84.³
5. Margaret Wallace, *m.* Alan, 4th Lord Cathcart, (he survived her and *m.* secondly, to Florence MacDowall, relict of John Kennedy of Baltersane ; and *d.* in December 1618).

SIR THOMAS WALLACE, 2ND BARONET, OF CRAIGIE, was trained to the law and admitted advocate some time before 1660 and following the Restoration, he was readmitted on 4 July 1661. SIR THOMAS WALLACE, 3RD BARONET, OF CRAIGIE, *bap.* at Ayr, on 29 January 1665 and succeeded on his brother, Sir William's death in January 1700. He *d.* at Edinburgh, on 21 January 1728,² having *m.* in 1702, to Rachel, daughter of Sir Hew Wallace of Wolmet, by whom he was father of,

2. William Wallace, *bap.* at Ayr, on 6 February 1704 and *dsp* before 31 January 1737 when his brother, Sir Thomas, was served heir of conquest to him.³

SIR THOMAS WALLACE, 4TH BARONET, OF CRAIGIE, *bap.* at Ayr, on 25 February 1702 and succeeding his father, he had service as heir general to him on 27 April 1736.⁵ He also had service as heir general to his grandfather, Sir Thomas Wallace, Lord Justice Clerk, on 8 November 1743. He *m.* Eleanor, half-sister and heiress of Thomas Agnew of Lochryan, (she *d.* at Glasgow, on 19 August 1761⁶), 1761⁶), and *d.* at Craigie House, on 21 August 1770⁷ having had issue;

1. Thomas Wallace, the only son, was *bap.* at Edinburgh, on 19 March 1729 and served as a Lieutenant in the 3rd Regiment of Foot Guards. He *dsp* at London, on 9 October 1755.¹
2. Frances Anna Wallace, *b.* on 16 April 1730 and was served heir to her mother in the barony of Lochryan on 22 June 1767.² She *m.* John Dunlop of Dunlop, and had with other issue;
 - 2a} **SIR THOMAS DUNLOP WALLACE OF CRAIGIE**, *bap.* at Dunlop, on 20 September 1750 and succeeding his maternal grandfather, he had service as heir provision general, on 22 February 1771³ and assumed the surname and arms of Wallace of Craigie. He also assumed the baronetcy but this was disallowed on the basis that its destination was limited to heirs male, however, that notwithstanding, he continued to use the title up to the time of his death.
